Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

The enclosed Order transfers \$1,693,972.50 in available funds between various accounts in order to close out FY2023. Pursuant to state law, municipalities can — within the first 15 days of a new fiscal year — transfer excess funds of the previous fiscal year from one department to another where a deficit exists at the end of that previous fiscal year.

While the complete list of transfers is summarized in the Order and the Finance Director's letter, also enclosed, I will point out that the largest component of this request, about 75% of the total amount in fact, is the transfer of \$1,276,172.50 from a handful of accounts to address the previous year's snow and ice deficit. This transfer means the City will not need to raise that amount on the tax recap, effectively saving Salem taxpayers nearly \$1.3 million. The remaining \$417,800 in transfers are detailed in the enclosed materials.

Per MGL Chapter 44, Section 33B the window for these transfers to take place ends on July 15, 2023; therefore, I am requesting that this matter not be referred to committee and that the Council vote on the Order at your July 13, 2023, meeting. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact Finance Director Anna Freedman.

Dear Honorable Mayor Pangallo:

Enclosed herewith is a request to transfer \$1,693,972.50 in available funds to cover remaining final costs necessary to close out FY2023. Under Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 44, Section 33B, communities may transfer during the first 15 days of the new fiscal year, to apply to the previous fiscal year, any amount previously appropriated in one department to another department to address any remaining deficits. If the technical transfers noted below do not occur, this will negatively impact Salem's free cash for FY2023, and deficits will need to be raised on the FY2024 tax recap per DOR requirements, adding to the upcoming tax rate. Please note, none of these transfers supports any new spending or initiatives at year-end.

- Enclosed herewith is a request to transfer a total of \$1,276,172.50 in available funds from the Human Resource Department's Medical Insurance Account (19141-5174), Police Personnel (12101-5111), and Recreation Personnel (16501-5111) to the Snow and Ice "Snow Removal" account (14232-5292) and "Overtime" account (14231-5131) to reduce the snow and ice deficit for FY2023. Under Massachusetts General Law, communities may spend in excess of appropriation during the fiscal year for snow and ice-related expenditures and must then raise any remaining deficit on the next fiscal year's tax recap or address the deficit with remaining funds at year-end. The current total snow and ice deficit (salaries plus expenses) for FY2023 is \$1,276,172.50. Transferring now at year-end to eliminate this deficit by using available FY2023 funds will eliminate the need to raise the revenue to offset this deficit on the FY2024 tax recap, saving taxpayers money.
- \$5,500 transfer to Assessor's Office Salaries Full-Time from the HR CB/Salary Reserve (11521-5171A) to fund salary costs associated with the most recent AFSCME collective bargaining agreement that were not previously funded this fiscal year.
- \$5,500 transfer to Clerk's Office Salaries Full-Time from the HR CB/Salary Reserve (11521-5171A) to fund salary costs associated with the most recent AFSCME collective bargaining agreement that were

Dear Councillors,

The enclosed Resolution expresses our City's support for proposed legislation that would ensure access to counsel for tenants in eviction proceedings and to promote housing opportunity and mobility through allowing tenants to petition the courts for sealing of eviction records. There are currently bills under consideration by the legislature (Bills S.864 and H.1731, as well as S.956 and H.1690) addressing both of these serious issues.

Over 96% of tenants in the Commonwealth facing a non-payment eviction in Housing Court do so without legal representation, while 90% of landlords are represented, creating a severe power imbalance between tenants facing eviction and their landlords. Additionally, regardless of outcome or underlying basis for a court filing, possessing any record of an eviction filing can affect a tenant's ability to secure housing, no matter how old the record is.

In 2013, the Massachusetts Trial Court began placing eviction record information online, making a tenant's court record free and easily accessible, and since 1988, over 1 million eviction cases have been filed in Massachusetts. Once filed, eviction cases become part of a tenant's eviction record, documenting the tenant's history of ever having sued or been sued by a landlord, even if the landlord's suit does not prevail. The proposed legislation would simply provide tenants the ability to petition the courts to limit access to certain eviction records.

I hope you will join me in urging our state legislature to support these bills, allowing the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to offer stronger protections for our most vulnerable renters. Please let me know if you have any questions.

Resolution in Support of Access to Counsel in Eviction Cases and Eviction Sealing Appeals to Promote Housing Opportunity and Mobility

WHEREAS:

- Eviction case filings between January June 2023 in Housing Court statewide are surpassing the number of eviction filings pre-pandemic;
- Over 96% of tenants in the Commonwealth facing a non-payment eviction in Housing Court are unrepresented, while 90% of landlords are represented;
- Northeast Legal Aid (NLA) represents and advises Salem residents about their eviction cases, but the need is far greater than the funding for NLA permits, and many tenants are turned away;
- Most tenants are unaware of their rights and legal protections both in and out of the courtroom;
- Access to critical legal resources, guidance, and support from a legal advocate prior to an
 eviction proceeding can protect people from being displaced by an eviction, prevent
 homelessness, and create a path to housing stability;
- The following 'Access to Counsel' bills, entitled "An Act promoting access to counsel and housing stability in Massachusetts," have been refiled for the 2023 Legislative Session: S.864, which is before the Housing Committee, filed by Senator Sal N. DiDomenico and H.1731, which is before the Judiciary Committee, filed by Representatives David M. Rogers and Michael S. Day. Since 1988, over 1 million such eviction cases have been filed in Massachusetts and once filed become part of that tenant's eviction record, documenting the tenant's history of ever having sued or been sued by a landlord;
- Regardless of outcome or underlying basis for a court filing, possessing any record of an eviction filing can affect a tenant's ability to secure housing, no matter how old the record is;
- In 2013, the Massachusetts Trial Court began placing eviction record information online, making a tenant's court record free and easily accessible,
- Landlords and tenant screening companies, routinely recommend rejections of tenants for having been in court, regardless of the outcome of the case or proof of clerical error; and
- Many landlords routinely file a notice to quit simply as a matter of course at the
 conclusion of a tenancy, and are unaware of the collateral consequences of eviction
 records or of the growing record of evictions they themselves are accumulating;
- Bills H. 1690 and S.956 'promoting housing opportunity and mobility through eviction sealing (HOMES),' sponsored by Representative Michael Moran and Senator Lydia Edwards respectively, are before the Judiciary Committee;
- These bills would protect tenants from being unfairly branded with an eviction record for life by allowing tenants to petition the court to seal their eviction records.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Salem hereby states its support of access to counsel in eviction proceedings and joins our state Senator Joan Lovely and Representative Manny Cruz who are co-sponsors, in supporting the acts establishing and ensuring those rights: S.864 and H.1731.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Salem also hereby supports with co-sponsors Senator Lydia Edwards and Representative Michael Moran S.956 and H.1690, the acts to promote housing opportunity and mobility through eviction sealing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Salem urges the Massachusetts State Legislature to enact pending "Access to Counsel" and "eviction sealing" legislation to ensure greater housing stability for Salem residents, and that a copy of this Resolution be sent by the City Clerk to Salem's State Representative and State Senator.
