Resolution: Creative Economy

Whereas the Creative Economy is vital to the continued success of Salem as a tourist destination, our local business community, and the economic well being of our region,

Whereas actors, artists, and other creative professionals vital to the success of our Creative Economy are workers whose employment adds real value to our local community and economy

Whereas like workers everywhere actors, artists, and other creative professionals deserve a living wage, access to healthcare, OSHA protections, sick leave, overtime protections, and all other benefits granted to employees

Whereas all too often actors, artists, and other creative professionals are intentionally mis-classified as independent contractors to deny them these benefits

Whereas under Massachusetts law employers who misclassify employees as independent contractors may face both civil and criminal charges for committing wage theft

Whereas wage theft is the most common form of theft in America and costs the Commonwealth of Massachusetts an estimated \$1 Billion annually in lost revenue

Whereas the city of Salem has an obligation to ensure fair and equitable employment practices both within our municipal workforce and those businesses and organizations we contract with,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the City of Salem not only opposes the misclassification actors, artists, and other creative professionals as independent contractors, but also actively supports efforts to organize actors, artists, and other working creative professionals to achieve a living wage, healthcare, and the basic protections employees are entitled to under the law in Massachusetts.

THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City of Salem strongly encourages both its local departments and private businesses that the city contracts with to engage with local labor organizations when engaging the services of an actor, artist, or other working creative professional when seeking to commission public service announcements, commercials, training videos, and other forms of media in order to both support the workers of our local creative economy and ensure compliance with Massachusetts law.

Upon ratification, a copy of this resolution shall be posted on the city's website, sent to all departments, businesses the city regularly contracts with, and included in all future RFPs.

Resolution: June Pride Month

WHEREAS, In the month of June, for over 50 years, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Questioning, Intersex, Asexual, A-romantic, and A-gender people across the country have commemorated and memorialized the anniversary of the “Christopher Street Uprisings” – of which the Stonewall Uprising is the most known – a pivotal moment in LGBTQIA+ history; and

WHEREAS, June was first historically and civically designated as Gay Pride Month by President Clinton in June 2000; and

WHEREAS, “Pride Month” is an opportunity to memorialize members of the LGBTQIA+ community who have been lost to us, and who are still dying every day, from the AIDS epidemic and the fallout ripple effects of those terrible days, from hate and violence, from suicide, and the perils of living on the streets when young people are neglected and excommunicated from their families and communities; and

WHEREAS, while society at large increasingly supports LGBTQIA+ equality, it is essential to acknowledge that the need for education and awareness remains vital to end discrimination and prejudice and “Pride month” is a life affirming opportunity to celebrate our diversity and bring awareness and strong allyship to the ongoing struggles of the LGBTQIA+ community – especially at this time of hostile legislation in parts of our nation and increasing legal and bodily threats to the dignity, humanity, and safety of transgender and non-binary people in America and;

WHEREAS, these times, in particular, are seeing increasing attacks – politically and physically – on trans individuals, including, trans children and youth, which demand action, allyship, and advocacy in support of trans lives; and

WHEREAS, Salem has long been a community of diversity, acceptance, and inclusion and acknowledges that Salem’s LGBTQIA+ residents make great contributions to all aspects of life in Salem as business owners, artists, public and private leaders, educators, doctors, lawyers, civil servants, volunteers, and more; and

WHEREAS, Salem wishes to honor the important history of the LGBTQIA+ liberation movement which includes the historic and ongoing fight for equitable treatment in healthcare, fair and equal legal rights, justice, and accurate education of the history and lives of the LGBTQIA+ community; and

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WHEREAS, Salem wishes to acknowledge, support, and actively work to advance the rights of the broadly intersectional diversity of our community, here in our City of Peace, to ensure all citizens experience equality and freedom from discrimination; and

WHEREAS, the City of Salem is once again raising the Inclusivity flag on Sunday, June 2nd in downtown Salem, painting crosswalks in Salem with Pride colors, and serving as host for the North Shore Pride Parade as means of showing support of the LGBTQIA+ community and to celebrate our diversity and shared humanity;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of Salem, in partnership with His Honor Mayor Dominick Pangallo, hereby proclaim the month of June 2024 as Pride Month in Salem, Massachusetts, and encourages all people to share in the Pride of our LGBTQIA+ neighbors.

Resolution – Jewish American Heritage Month

Whereas the United States is a melting pot of heritages and cultures and by honoring each other’s cultures, we can educate ourselves about the rich diversity that makes up the United States; and Whereas, Jewish American Heritage Month has its origins in 1980, when President Carter issued a proclamation designating April 21 through April 28, 1980 Jewish Heritage Week; and

Whereas, Congress has played a vital role in recognizing Jewish American Heritage Month by first introducing resolutions in the House of Representatives in 2005 and the U.S. Senate in 2006. Passing unanimously, on April 20, 2006 President George W. Bush proclaimed the national observation of the month of May recognizing the Jewish-American community; and

Whereas, since 2006, Presidents Bush, Obama, Trump, and Biden have all issued proclamations for Jewish American Heritage Month, which celebrates Jewish Americans and encourages all people of the United States to learn more about Jewish heritage and the contributions of Jewish people throughout the history of the United States; and

Whereas, it is critical to increase awareness of Jewish-American contributions, dating back to the founding of the United States we must tell the positive story of Jewish contributions to the United States and the World where generations of Jewish Americans have made significant contributions to the arts, entertainment, culinary traditions, sports, science, technology, military, government, business, and other fields to help shape our nation’s history; and

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Whereas, Vera Rubin, a trailblazer in the field of astronomy whose work established the existence of dark matter; Lillian D. Wald, a nurse who fought for public health care, women's rights, and children's rights; Jonas Salk, a virologist who developed a vaccine against polio; and Albert Einstein who was named Time magazine's "Person of the Century" for his contributions to the study of mathematics and physics; and

Whereas, Jewish-American athletes excelled at sports while staying true to their heritage such as Sandy Koufax, who was the first major league pitcher to pitch four no-hitters and chose not to pitch during a World Series game when it fell on Yom Kippur, and Hank Greenberg, who was the first Jewish inductee in the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1954; and

Whereas, Jewish-American women have made significant contributions to American politics and activism, including Ernestine Rose, a Jewish immigrant who raised her voice to resist slavery and fight for women's suffrage and Florence Prag Kahn, the first Jewish woman Member of Congress and first woman to serve on the House Military Affairs Committee; and

Whereas, Jewish Americans long advocated for the education of all including Julius Rosenwald, who partnered with Booker T. Washington to invest in the education of Black students and built thousands of schools for Black students in 15 States in the South; and

Whereas, the Jewish community has long been involved in the civil rights movement; as Henry Moskowitz joined with civil rights activists such as W.E.B. Du Bois and Ida B. Wells to found the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in 1909; and

Whereas, Jack Greenberg argued against segregation in Brown v. Board of Education as co-counsel to Thurgood Marshall and succeeded Marshall as Director-Counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund; and

Whereas, during the Freedom Summer of 1964, half of the young people who went to Mississippi were Jewish, including Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner, who were murdered along with African American activist James Chaney due to their efforts to register Black voters; and

Whereas, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel served as a close ally and advisor to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., marching with him from Montgomery to Selma in 1964; and

Whereas, in 1964, 17 rabbis were arrested alongside Dr. Martin Luther King in Florida after challenging racial segregation in public accommodations; and

Whereas, with anti-Semitism on the rise in our country, fueled by the spread of hatred, disinformation and Holocaust distortion, this resolution both honors Jewish American heritage and sends a powerful message of solidarity and support to Jewish communities across the country. "By educating ourselves about Jewish history and culture, we deepen our understanding of America's diversity and reaffirm our commitment to combating hate and prejudice in all its forms;" and

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Salem City Council encourages elected officials, faith leaders, and civil society leaders to condemn and counter all acts of antisemitism; to take all possible steps to ensure the safety and security of Jewish-American communities by preventing terrorism and hate crimes; and urge our educators and administrators to combat hate in academic settings; and

And Be It Further Be Resolved, that the City Council make this resolution a matter of record of these proceedings, and a copy be sent to the New England Anti-Defamation League, the Combined Jewish Philanthropies, Boston, and the Lappin Foundation.

Letter from the Health Agent and the Police Chief to install video surveillance cameras at various locations.

Dear City Council Members,

In accordance with Chapter 32; Article 5, Section 32-121 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Salem, the Salem Board of Health in concert with the Salem Police Department respectfully requests authority to install video surveillance cameras at the following locations:

Installation of cameras on Bridge Street at different locations allowing the Department the ability to monitor the area for illegal dumping and deter such acts of illegal dumping.

Installation of a camera on Broad Street at different locations allowing the Department the ability to monitor the area for illegal dumping and deter such acts of illegal dumping.

Installation of a camera on Loring Avenue at different locations allowing the Department the ability to monitor the area for illegal dumping and deter such acts of illegal dumping.

Installation of a camera on Sargent Street at different locations allows the Department the ability to monitor the area for illegal dumping and deter such acts of illegal dumping.

Installation of a camera on Burke Street at the corner of Schillaber Street allows the Department the ability to monitor the area for illegal dumping and deter such acts of illegal dumping.

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COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY OFFICIALS

Installation of a camera on First Street at the corner of Whalers Lane and Traders Way allowing the Department the ability to monitor the area for illegal dumping and deter such acts of illegal dumping.

Per the Ordinance, the above-listed security cameras will record video feed only: audio recording will not be conducted. Additionally, public notice of the installation and operation of video cameras will be posted along with the surveillance cameras.

It is my belief that installation of video surveillance cameras at the above locations will assist the Board of Health in preventing illegal dumping in these areas and should such acts occur, enable the Board of Health to take appropriate enforcement action to hold those who illegally dump in the City of Salem accountable.
