Dear Mayor Pangallo,

As previously reported, the gangway and float system at Charlotte Forten Park sustained significant damage during the several astronomical tide/weather events that occurred over the Winter. The height of tide caused the gangway rail to impinge against the platform rail and concrete sea wall cap breaking the welds and dislodging a section of railing on the turntable-platform for the gangway. Due to the missing section of rail, I have secured the gate to restrict access. I was able to retrieve the detached rail and store it in the Hangar. In addition to the damage to the aluminum, a mooring chain parted resulting in the float rotating 90 degrees and shifting off center. The damage was included in the submission to FEMA. However, it is my understanding that our claim did not reach the threshold for any reimbursement.

The rails will need to be re-fabricated to mitigate impingement during our frequently occurring weather and tide events. Additionally, the mooring system will need to be removed from the bottom sediment and re-connected as well as adjusted for length or renewed. I have obtained proposal (s), (enclosed) from North Shore Marine totaling \$9430.00. To ensure this park feature is available for use this season, I am respectfully requesting funds from Short Term Capitol (fund 2000) to complete the necessary repairs.

Technical Fix to Opioid Settlement Fund Account

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has entered into various statewide opioid settlements with opioid industry defendants. Certain agreements provide for municipal distributions to cities and towns for prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery services. Payments from these settlements began flowing to municipalities in FY23.

To take in these settlement funds and set them aside for their intended purpose, Salem complied with Mass General Law and set up an Opioid Settlement Special Stabilization Fund and dedicated all future settlement payments directly to said Stabilization Fund. However, since that time, a technical fix has been made by the state regarding the accounting options for these settlement funds. On December 4, 2023, Governor Healey signed Chapter 77 of the Acts of 2023, Section 9 of which allows cities and towns that have received or will receive funds in Fiscal Year 2024, or thereafter, pursuant to settlement agreements entered into by the Commonwealth with opioid distributors and opioid-makers, to place said funds into a special revenue fund. The proceeds can then be expended, without further appropriation, for the purposes identified in said settlement agreements.

I am recommending that the City of Salem avail itself of this accounting option and terminate the existing Opioid Settlement Special Stabilization Fund and associated dedication of settlement revenues to said Fund, and instead collect the settlement payments into a special revenue fund. Pursuant to the attached bulletin from the Department of Revenue – Division of Local Services, if settlement funds are already dedicated to a stabilization fund, said dedication can be revoked at any time by vote of the legislative body. Upon revocation, all statewide opioid settlement receipts previously received may be placed in the special revenue fund.

G.L. c. 44, § 53 Clause 4: Opioid Settlement Receipts

This guidance supersedes BUL-2023-6 and the July 7, 2022 edition of City and Town, Ask DLS: Treatment of Opioid Settlement Payments.

On December 4, 2023, Governor Healey signed Chapter 77 of the Acts of 2023, Section 9 of which provides, in part, for the following exception to the general rule that all receipts are to be recorded as general fund revenue per G.L. c. 44, § 53:

"(4) non-recurring, unanticipated sums received by multiple cities, towns or districts and not otherwise provided for by general or special law, may, upon the approval of the director of accounts, be expended at the direction of the chief executive officer without further appropriation only for the singular purpose for which the monies were received" (emphasis added)

The Director of Accounts has determined that cities and towns that have received or will receive funds in Fiscal Year 2024, or thereafter, pursuant to settlement agreements entered into by the Commonwealth with opioid distributors and opioid-makers for prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery, <u>may</u> place said funds into a special revenue fund. The proceeds can then be expended, without further appropriation, at the direction of the chief executive officer only for the purpose identified in said settlement agreements.

Section 197 of the Act further allows a community to consolidate all monies previously received for this purpose into the special revenue fund, mentioned above, in the following ways.

- 1. If prior year settlement funds have not otherwise been reserved (i.e., dedicated to a stabilization fund) or become part of certified free cash, then those funds may be placed directly into the special revenue fund.
- 2. If already dedicated to a stabilization fund, said dedication can be revoked at any time by vote of the legislative body. Upon revocation, all statewide opioid settlement receipts previously received may be placed in the special revenue fund.
- 3. If a community has settlement funds in a stabilization fund but did not dedicate future settlement receipts, the money currently in stabilization can be placed directly into the special revenue fund.

In the case of #2 or #3 above, once funds are moved from the stabilization fund, by virtue of having no remaining balance the stabilization fund can be removed from the balance sheet.

4. Settlement funds that have become part of free cash may be appropriated into the special revenue fund by vote of the community's legislative body.

Once placed in the special revenue fund, monies can be spent without further appropriation for purpose identified in the settlement agreements. Any interest belongs to the general fund.

The transfers of funds, noted in #1-#4 above, represent a limited ability to consolidate previously received opioid settlement monies into the newly allowed special revenue fund. These transfers are permitted only for this express purpose and should not be considered a general change to how monies are otherwise accounted for under the General Laws.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:

Section 3. Section 3.1 Table of Principal and Accessory Use Regulations of the Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended by:

- a. Replacing the "N" in the B1 zoning district column with a "BA" for two Commercial Uses, Commercial recreation and Indoor Restaurant, with service of alcoholic beverages;
- b. Replacing the commercial use text "Retail store, except department store, not elsewhere set forth" with "Retail or grocery store, except department store, not elsewhere set forth;"
- c. Replacing the "N" in the B1 zoning district column with a "Y" for the Accessory Use of Family day care, small; and
- d. Replacing the "N" in the B1 zoning district column with a "BA" for the Accessory Use of Home occupation.

Section 33. This Ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.

Dear Councillors,

The enclosed Ordinance makes modifications to the B1 zone to allow for additional types of neighborhood-centered commercial activity within walking distance from residential areas, with the goal of fostering more resident-serving amenities in these locations. B1 zones are transitional areas that reflect elements of both residential and commercial activity, and, in many cases, they provide a key part of the economic vibrancy and quality of life outside of the downtown.

In considering which approach to take for each of the uses below, we determined that if something is allowed in the abutting residential zone by right, it is appropriate to allow it in the adjacent B1 area by right. If the use is not allowed in the residential zone, but could reasonably serve the adjacent residents and provide a service or activity for them near their home, it is appropriate to allow it in the adjacent B1 area by special permit.

Indoor commercial recreation (currently: N, proposed: BA)

This category includes uses such as yoga studios, fitness spaces, martial arts studios, etc. The proposed amendment allows this use in the B1 zone by a special permit, which is identical to how it is allowed in the less-neighborhood centered business zones (B2 and B4).

Restaurant with alcoholic beverages (currently: N, proposed: BA)

This use is currently allowed by right in the B2 and B5 only, however there are some establishments of this type currently adjacent to several residential neighborhoods already. The proposed amendment would allow this use in the B1 zone by special permit.

Retail grocery (new use category)

This modification to the existing use category for "Retail store" allows for grocery stores (distinguished from "supermarket" and "convenience store" as a type of use) in the same zones and under the same conditions as retail stores: namely, allowed by right in the B1, B2, B4, B5, and I zones. This change comes with the favorable recommendation of the Food Policy Council, which views this as way to address food access by allowing for smaller scale grocery stores within walking distance to residences.

Small family daycare (currently: N; proposed: Y)

Small-scale family daycare use is already allowed in adjacent residential areas by right. The proposal is to extend that allowance into the nearby B1 zone, as well.

Home occupation (currently: N; proposed: BA)

This type of commercial activity is of less intensity than mixed-used development commercial, which is allowed in the B1 currently. It is also a use allowed, by special permit, in residential zones. The proposal is to extend that same allowance into the B1 zone.

Walkable commercial areas are a key part of cultivating a vibrant and livable community. We have identified these changes as ways to help make that more possible for Salem, by creating the structures to allow for these amenities – child care, small workplaces and entrepreneurial spaces, dining, grocery shopping, and recreation – to more easily flourish closer to where people live. I recommend adoption of the enclosed zoning Ordinance.

RESOLUTION - JEWISH AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

Whereas the United States is a melting pot of heritages and cultures and by honoring each other's cultures, we can educate ourselves about the rich diversity that makes up the United States; and

Whereas, Jewish American Heritage Month has its origins in 1980, when President Carter issued a proclamation designating April 21 through April 28, 1980 Jewish Heritage Week; and

Whereas, Congress has played a vital role in recognizing Jewish American Heritage Month by first introducing resolutions in the House of Representatives in 2005 and the U.S. Senate in 2006. Passing unanimously, on April 20, 2006 President George W. Bush proclaimed the national observation of the month of May recognizing the Jewish-American community; and

Whereas, since 2006, Presidents Bush, Obama, Trump, and Biden have all issued proclamations for Jewish American Heritage Month, which celebrates Jewish Americans and encourages all people of the United States to learn more about Jewish heritage and the contributions of Jewish people throughout the history of the United States; and

Whereas, it is critical to increase awareness of Jewish-American contributions, dating back to the founding of the United States we must tell the positive story of Jewish contributions to the United States and the World where generations of Jewish Americans have made significant contributions to the arts, entertainment, culinary traditions, sports, science, technology, military, government, business, and other fields to help shape our nation's history; and

Whereas, Vera Rubin, a trailblazer in the field of astronomy whose work established the existence of dark matter; Lillian D. Wald, a nurse who fought for public health care, women's rights, and children's rights; Jonas Salk, a virologist who developed a vaccine against polio; and Albert Einstein who was named Time magazine's "Person of the Century" for his contributions to the study of mathematics and physics; and

Whereas, Jewish-American athletes excelled at sports while staying true to their heritage such as Sandy Koufax, who was the first major league pitcher to pitch four no-hitters and chose not to pitch during a World Series game when it fell on Yom Kippur, and Hank Greenberg, who was the first Jewish inductee in the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1954; and

Whereas, Jewish-American women have made significant contributions to American politics and activism, including Ernestine Rose, a Jewish immigrant who raised her voice to resist slavery and fight for women's suffrage and Florence Prag Kahn, the first Jewish woman Member of Congress and first woman to serve on the House Military Affairs Committee; and

Whereas, Jewish Americans long advocated for the education of all including Julius Rosenwald, who partnered with Booker T. Washington to invest in the education of Black students and built thousands of schools for Black students in 15 States in the South; and

Whereas, the Jewish community has long been involved in the civil rights movement; as Henry Moskowitz joined with civil rights activists such as W.E.B. Du Bois and Ida B. Wells to found the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) in 1909; and

Whereas, Jack Greenberg argued against segregation in Brown v. Board of Education as co-counsel to Thurgood Marshall and succeeded Marshall as Director-Counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund; and

Whereas, during the Freedom Summer of 1964, half of the young people who went to Mississippi were Jewish, including Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner, who were murdered along with African American activist James Chaney due to their efforts to register Black voters; and

Whereas, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel served as a close ally and advisor to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., marching with him from Montgomery to Selma in 1964; and

Whereas, in 1964, 17 rabbis were arrested alongside Dr. Martin Luther King in Florida after challenging racial segregation in public accommodations; and

Whereas, with anti-Semitism on the rise in our country, fueled by the spread of hatred, disinformation and Holocaust distortion, this resolution both honors Jewish American heritage and sends a powerful message of solidarity and support to Jewish communities across the country. "By educating ourselves about Jewish history and culture, we deepen our understanding of America's diversity and reaffirm our commitment to combating hate and prejudice in all its forms;" and

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Salem City Council encourages elected officials, faith leaders, and civil society leaders to condemn and counter all acts of antisemitism; to take all possible steps to ensure the safety and security of Jewish-American communities by preventing terrorism and hate crimes; and urge our educators and administrators to combat hate in academic settings; and

And Be It Further Be Resolved, that the City Council make this resolution a matter of record of these proceedings, and a copy be sent to the New England Anti-Defamation League, the Combined Jewish Philanthropies, Boston, and the Lappin Foundation.

CHAPTER 268A, CONDUCT OF PUBLIC OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES

Chapter 268A: Section 20. Municipal employees; financial interest in contracts; holding one or more elected positions

Section 20. (a) A municipal employee who has a financial interest, directly or indirectly, in a contract made by a municipal agency of the same city or town, in which the city or town is an interested party of which financial interest he has knowledge or has reason to know, shall be punished by a fine of not more than three thousand dollars or by imprisonment for not more than two years, or both.

This section shall not apply if such financial interest consists of the ownership of less than one per cent of the stock of a corporation.

This section shall not apply (a) to a municipal employee who in good faith and within thirty days after he learns of an actual or prospective violation of this section makes full disclosure of his financial interest to the contracting agency and terminates or disposes of the interest, or (b) to a municipal employee who is not employed by the contracting agency or an agency which regulates the activities of the contracting agency and who does not participate in or have official responsibility for any of the activities of the contracting agency, if the contract is made after public notice or where applicable, through competitive bidding, and if the municipal employee files with the clerk of the city or town a statement making full disclosure of his interest and the interest of his immediate family, and if in the case of a contract for personal services (1) the services will be provided outside the normal working hours of the municipal employee, (2) the services are not required as part of the municipal employee's regular duties, the employee is compensated for not more than five hundred hours during a calendar year, (3) the head of the contracting agency makes and files with the clerk of the city or town a written certification that no employee of that agency is available to perform those services as part of their regular duties, and (4) the city council, board of selectmen or board of aldermen approve the exemption of his interest from this section.

Installation of a camera on First Street at the corner of Whalers Lane and Traders Way allowing the Department the ability to monitor the area for illegal dumping and deter such acts of illegal dumping.

Per the Ordinance, the above-listed security cameras will record video feed only: audio recording will not be conducted. Additionally, public notice of the installation and operation of video cameras will be posted along with the surveillance cameras.

It is my belief that installation of video surveillance cameras at the above locations will assist the Board of Health in preventing illegal dumping in these areas and should such acts occur, enable the Board of Health to take appropriate enforcement action to hold those who illegally dump in the City of Salem accountable.

A Petition Relative to The Banning of No-Knock Warrants

Be it enacted by the Salem City Council or the appropriate municipal department of Salem,

SECTION 1: For the purposes herein this document:

- (a) A "No-Knock Warrant" shall be defined as a legal warrant granting law enforcement the right of forcible ingress into a private residence without announcing their identity and presence beforehand.
- (b) "Jurisdiction" shall be defined as Salem, Massachusetts, and any other municipality Salem Police Department has authority thereover.
- (c) "By a preponderance of the evidence" shall be defined as the burden of proof that indicates more likely than not that a specific event occurred.
- (d) "Great bodily injury" shall be defined as an injury that is likely to result in long-term or permanent bodily disfigurement, loss of an imperative bodily function or organ, or death.

SECTION 2: Salem Police Department shall no longer execute, serve, or carry out No-Knock Warrants within its jurisdiction.

SECTION 3: Nothing shall require officers of the Salem Police Department to physically knock on the door of a residence before forcibly entering, so long as the declaration of their identity and presence is audible to occupants within said dwelling.

SECTION 4: Any officer of the Salem Police Department who is proven by a preponderance of the evidence to have violated any section hereinbefore, shall be subject to disciplinary action including but not limited to salary reduction or pay and unpaid suspension.

If proven by a preponderance of the evidence that the aforementioned violation resulted in great bodily injury or death to a person, the infracting officer shall have their employment by the Salem Police Department terminated.




