SUBJECT(S)
C. Hapworth stated that we were discussing the placement of a portrait representing the Naumkeag people in the Council Chambers, and the moving of the Andrew Jackson portrait to the anteroom, and time permitting we would begin a broader conversation around representation in the council chambers.
C. Hapworth introduced guests Professor Emerson Baker and Elizabeth Peterson to answer any historical questions councillors might have
C. Hapworth asked Prof. Baker to discuss an overview of Andrew Jackson and his involvement with indigenous people in America.
Prof. Baker gave an overview of Jackson, stating that he was most known in regard to native americans for his removal of them from their native lands. He questioned why Jackson's portrait hung in Salem city hall, as he had no connection to Salem
C. Hapworth stated that his understanding was that it was based upon a visit to Salem, and the fact that Jackson's administration distributed a surplus to the states which allowed city hall to be built.
C. Hapworth asked Ms. Peterson and Prof Baker to discuss a brief history of indigenous people in New England and Salem specifically
Prof Baker and Ms. Peterson gave a brief overview
C. Prosniewski asked if there were any known sites in Salem where native Americans had camps or settlements
Prof Baker and Ms. Peterson listed a few sites where artifacts had been found including Pioneer Village and the North River
C. Sargent asked if Andrew Jackson had ever done anything to Native Americans outside of congressional approval

Prof. Baker stated that he wasn't aware of any

- C. Sargent asked if Jackson was a good General
- Prof. Baker stated that he was one of America's Greatest Generals
- C. Sargent stated that we should judge people by the time they lived in and that Andrew Jackson did great things for America, and that if it were not for him many of us may not be here.
- C. Hapworth stated that we're not here as a committee to pass final judgement upon Jackson, but we are here to talk about representation in our council chambers. Today we have all white males, many of whom spent very little time in Salem, and had very little impact on Salem's history.
- C. Hapworth asked Julie Barry, senior planner public art to discuss the commissioning process for the new portrait
- Julie Barry gave an overview of the process the city is going through to commission the Naumkeag Portrait
- C. Flynn asked how much it was going to cost
- Ms. Barry stated it was 30,000 from beginning to end
- C. Flynn asked if the money was already approved
- Ms. Barry stated that it was transferred from the Witch House
- C. Hapworth asked Ilene Simons to weigh in broadly on the council chambers
- Ms. Simons stated the history behind the receipt of the Jackson portrait, that she had researched, located and presented documents from the 1891 Council Records regarding why the portrait was there. An Order from the October 5, 1891, Council meeting stated that Andrew Jackson's portrait be accepted as a gift and further ordered that it be hung in the Council Chambers on the northern side of the chamber. Also that City Hall was built and furnished from the surplus that was given to the city from Andrew Jackson's administration. She stated that she felt it hung in the council chambers for a reason, and noted that a previous city clerk was descended from Jackson
- Ms. Simons also stated that Jackson adopted a Native American son.
- C. Flynn asked if it was legal for us to move a portrait, given a previous council had ordered it be placed
- Ms. Simons stated that an order to move the portrait would supercede the previous order
- C. Hapworth asked for public comment
- Steve Kapantais stated that it was great to hear from Prof. Baker. He stated that he was excited to see the new portrait but that 30,000 felt like too much, though he was unsure how much art should cost today
- Alice Merkl stated that she was fully supportive of seeing a new portrait in the council chambers, encouraged council to move forward with the order.
- C. Hapworth asked for a motion
- C. Sargent stated that he would prefer to see the question divided to allow for the portrait to go forward but to leave the Jackson portrait
- C. McCarthy stated that he felt the commissioning should move forward but that there were too many unanswered questions around the portrait of Jackson
- C. Hapworth stated that the commissioning was moving forward regardless, committee's task was to discuss moving the Jackson portrait and hanging the new portrait.
- C. McCarthy stated if that were the case, he felt it should stay in committee as there were too many questions
- C. Hapworth stated that if it were the will of the body not to move the Jackson portrait, we could divide the question so that we could allow the hanging of the new portrait, and take up it's placement, and the placement of all portraits at a later meeting to discuss councillor Furey's 2019 order.

#### **CITY HALL**

City Hall was built in 1837-38 under the supervision of Mayor Leverett Saltonstall and a committee appointed for that purpose. The cornerstone was laid on September 6, 1837. Artifacts buried beneath the cornerstone included copies of local newspapers, the Mayor's speech for the organization of City Government (May 9, 1836), and the new City Charter.

In 1837, under the administration of President Andrew Jackson, the United States Treasury held a surplus in the amount of nearly Forty Million Dollars. This surplus was distributed to the various states, which in turn distributed this money to the cities and towns. City Hall was built from this surplus revenue, as Salem's share was nearly \$34,000.00. The building and furnishings cost approximately \$22,878.00 when finished, and this is perhaps one of the few municipal structures in existence paid for without taxing the citizens. City Hall was first occupied by the City Council on the evening of May 31, 1838. A formal dedication was held on June 8, 1838.

Since 1837, the building has served as the focal point for the decision-making process in Salem, and the City Council Chamber is still used today for government meetings.

The City Hall is architecturally significant because of its excellent Greek Revival design. It is perfectly proportioned and in spite of its comparatively small size, gives a feeling of strength and dignity. The architect, Richard Bond (1797-1861), was described in contemporary reports as "an architect of great fame," "an architect of high reputation" and "a distinguished architect." He also designed Gore Hall --the old Library at Harvard, the Bowdoin Square Church in Boston, both no longer standing. The facade is reminiscent of Robert Mills, with the ceiling rosettes in the Council Chamber exact duplicates of those done by Alexander Parris for Faneuil Hall Market in Boston.

The City Hall is located on Washington Street, the main thoroughfare of Salem, with commercial structures on either side of it. Completed in 1838, this two-story building is late Greek Revival in style. The original dimensions were 32 feet high, 45 feet wide and 68 feet long. The side and rear elevations are unadorned brick while the main facade is dressed granite. Three bays wide, this facade is broken by four giant pilasters, one on each corner and one on either side of the recessed center bay. The bays are set with tall windows, 6 over 6. The central entrance is reached by a short flight of granite steps; a cast iron lamp on a bracket projects from above. The tall front double doors are made of mahogany with brass studs outlining the center panels.

The pilasters support a massive entablature whose frieze is decorated with carved stone laurel wreaths. A parapet rises from the entablature and, over the center bay, this forms a partial pediment. The latter is topped by a gold leafed eagle which is an exact copy of the original, hurricane-damaged one done by Samuel McIntire. The original eagle was part of the gateway to Salem Common.
