

**CITY OF SALEM**  
**FEBRUARY 12, 2024**  
**REGULAR MEETING**

A Regular Meeting of the City Council was held in-person on Monday, February 12, 2024, at 7:00 P.M. for the purpose of transacting any and all business. Notice of this meeting was posted on February 8, 2024, at 9:16 A.M. This meeting is being recorded and is live on S.A.T.V. and Zoom unless technological issues interrupt the transmission. (Original meeting was to be held on Thursday, February 8, 2024 – due to technical issues with website postponed until February 12, 2024)

All Councillors were present.

Council President Hapworth presided.

Councillor Varela moved to dispense with the reading of the record of the previous meeting. It was so voted.

President Hapworth requested that everyone please rise to recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Salem City Council Land Acknowledgment**

The Salem City Council honors that this land is Naumkeag, or fishing place, where generations of Naumkeag people from the Pawtucket band of the Massachusetts Tribe lived and passed through for centuries.

We acknowledge that this is unceded Indigenous land and also acknowledge the Massachusetts Tribe, who continue to honor and hold this land into the present.

Salem's City Council is committed to having ongoing meaningful dialogue with the indigenous peoples who have presence in Salem in order to dismantle the legacies of oppression and inequities that persist today.

No one was signed up for Public Testimony.

**#54 – (#42) – COMCAST TO INSTALL CONDUITES ON CENTRAL STREET**

A hearing was held on the order from Comcast to install conduits on Central St. for service at 311 Derby St.

Dave Flewelling, a representative from Comcast, 9 Forbes Rd., Woburn appeared in favor. He stated the conduit was for service to 311 Derby Street.

Councillor Jerzylo asked about the replacement of the sidewalk panel and when will the work start. Councillor Jerzylo also requested that Comcast coordinate with the Inspector because currently there is repointing being done on Derby Street.

Dave Flewelling replied it will be replaced in kind and that the work won't begin until after April 15, 2024. That is when the moratorium ends. He stated they will coordinate efforts.

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No one appeared in opposition.

Councillor Jerzylo moved to close the public hearing. It was so voted.

Councillor Jerzylo moved that the matter be granted. It was so voted.

**#55 – (#43) – COMCAST TO INSTALL CONDUITES ON CHURCH STREET**

A hearing was held on the order from Comcast to install conduits on Church St. for service at 71 Washington St.

Dave Flewelling, a representative from Comcast, 9 Forbes Rd., Woburn appeared in favor. He stated the conduit was for service to 71 Washington Street.

Councillor Watson-Felt asked is this from the existing or new manhole.

Dave Flewelling replied the conduit is starting at an existing manhole.

Councillor Watson-Felt moved to close the Public Hearing. It was so voted.

Councillor Watson-Felt moved that the matter be Granted. It was so voted.

**#56 – (#44) – CENTERLINE TO INSTALL TELECOMMUNICATIONS ON BRIDGE STREET**

A hearing was held on the order from Centerline Communications to install telecommunications attachments in the Public Right of Way 252R Bridge Street.

Edward Pare, Attorney on behalf of AT&T appeared in favor. AT&T stated this is a small cell attachment to a pole near 252R Bridge. The pole is approximately 500' from the nearest residence. A small diameter antenna will be placed on top of the pole. The proposed pole is in conformance with National Electric Safety Code. The proposed equipment cabinet will be attached to the side of the pole.

Councillor Stott had a concern that this is in the SRA district, so she would like it to go to SRA for review. SRA was not on the routing slip.

No one appeared in opposition.

Councillor Stott moved to keep the Public Hearing open to March 28, 2024 in order to receive comment from the SRA. It was so voted.

**#60 – DONATION TO THE PARK & RECREATION DONATION FUND**

The following order submitted by the Mayor was adopted.

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**#61 – RESOLUTION FOR T.I.F. FOR A RESTAURANT AT 65 WASHINGTON STREET**

The following resolution submitted by the Mayor was referred to the Committee on Administration and Finance co-posted with the Committee of the Whole.

Councillor Varela recused himself from this matter.

Councillor Merkl stated that this matter and the next one are for a tax exemption for a retail space at 65 Washington Street for Settlers. Kate Newhall-Smith is the project planner and is happy to attend a meeting.

**RESOLUTION: A Tax Increment Finance (T.I.F) Request For Chambers Property Holdings, LLC to build out a restaurant to be located at 65 Washington Street**

**WHEREAS**, Chambers Property Holdings, LLC (hereinafter “Owner”) has purchased the commercial condominium unit at 65 Washington Street, Salem, MA, known as City of Salem Assessor’s Parcel ID 35-0600-801 (hereinafter the “Property”); and

**WHEREAS**, the Owner intends to build out the 3,212 square foot space into a 76-seat restaurant with commercial kitchen, restroom facilities, and back-of-house storage and office space (hereinafter “the Project”); and

**WHEREAS**, the Owner shall enter into a lease agreement with the Chambers Restaurant Group, LLC (hereinafter “Operator”) for the purposes of operating and managing the Project once completed and creating 27 new employment opportunities; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Salem (hereafter “City”) is willing to grant tax concessions in return for a guarantee of the realization of the Project;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Salem City Council hereby

- Incorporates the whereas clauses herein; and
- Endorses the use of Tax Increment Financing as a tool to encourage economic development at the Property; and
- Provides for a tax exemption at the Property for a period of five (5) years, beginning the first full fiscal tax year after Certificate of Occupancy is issued for the Property in accordance with the schedule below:

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Said exemption being in accordance with M.G.L. Chapter 23A, Section 3E, Chapter 40, Section 59, Section 5.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Mayor is hereby authorized, on behalf of the City, to enter into a Tax Increment Financing Agreement, a copy of which is attached hereto, with the Owner and the Operator.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the City of Salem is hereby authorized to apply to the Economic Assistance Coordinating Council (EACC) for approval of the Tax Increment Financing Agreement.

**#62 – TAX INCREMENT FINANCE AGREEMENT WITH CHAMBERS RESTAURANT GROUP FOR A RESTAURANT TO BE LOCATED A 65 WASHINGTON STREET**

The agreement submitted by the Mayor regarding a Tax Increment Finance Agreement between the City of Salem and Chambers Restaurant Group, LLC for a restaurant located at 65 Washington Street was referred to the Committee on Administration and Finance co-posted with the Committee of the Whole. (The entire agreement can be viewed at the City Clerk's office during normal business hours)

Councillor Varela recused himself from this matter.

**#63 – TRAFFIC ORDINANCE AMENDING TRAFFIC CH. 42 SECS. 51B & 57A – PLEASANT STREET**

The following traffic ordinance introduced by Councillor Watson-Felt was adopted for first passage.

Ordinance amending Traffic Ch. 42 Sec. 51B -Parking Prohibited at Certain Times on Certain Streets and 57A – Parking Time Limited: Unmetered Zones – Pleasant Street

***In the year Two Thousand and Twenty-Four***

**An Ordinance Relative to Traffic**

***Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:***

**Section 1.** Section 51B of Article V be amended by repealing the following:

Pleasant Street – Parking Prohibited at Certain Times on Certain Streets - on the easterly side, beginning thirty-eight (38) feet from the intersection of Pleasant Street and Webb Street and proceeding southerly for a distance of one hundred twenty-five (125) feet. Fifteen (15) minute parking limit. (4/13/87)

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**Section 2.** Section 57A of Article V be amended by repealing the following:

Pleasant Street – Parking Time Limited: Unmetered Zones - easterly side, starting at a point fifty-nine (59) feet from the intersection of Bridge Street in a southerly direction for a distance of eighty-four (84) feet. Two hour parking. (12/5/80 DPW 5-1905)

And inserting the following:

Pleasant Street – Parking Time Limited: Unmetered Zones - easterly side, beginning forty-five (45) feet south of the intersection with Bridge Street and extending in a southerly direction for fifty (50) feet, thirty (30) minute parking limit, Monday through Sunday, 8:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

**Section 3.** This ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.

**#64 – MEET TO DISCUSS ENCAMPMENTS CITY WIDE**

The following order introduced by Councillor Jerzylo was adopted as amended. The amendment was to include all encampments city-wide.

*Original order:*

ORDERED: That the Committee on Public, Health, Safety and Environment co-posted with the Committee of the Whole meet to discuss the encampment on the South Harbor Walkway on issues relating to but not limited to health-related concerns, public nuisance matters, public safety for all and the well-being of the people staying in that area.

*Amended order:*

ORDERED: That the Committee on Public, Health, Safety and Environment co-posted with the Committee of the Whole meet to discuss all the encampments city-wide on issues relating to but not limited to health-related concerns, public nuisance matters, public safety for all and the well-being of the people staying in that area.

Councillor Jerzylo noted that in March of 2023 the City helped to rehouse the homeless living in the encampments to Life Bridge. Some individuals refused to go. The Mayor is working on an ordinance relative to no overnight stays on non-park property.

Councillor Prosniewski stated this meeting with everyone together will help us come up with a solution. Now there is not one concrete answer. We can't keep going in this direction.

Councillor Cohen spoke with Councillor Jerzylo and the Mayor. We will coordinate with the Mayor and department heads. We need the language in front of us first and then we can send it to the Committee on Ordinances, Licenses and Legal Affairs.

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Councillor Morsillo stated that the encampments were located throughout the City. Is there a reason why we just discussing the South Harbor Walkway? Councillor Morsillo asked to amend the order to include the other encampments. It was so voted.

**#65 – (#48) – GRANTING CERTAIN LICENSES**

Councillor Morsillo offered the following report for the Committee on Ordinances, Licenses and Legal Affairs. It was voted to accept the report and adopt the recommendation.

The Committee on Ordinances, Licenses and Legal Affairs to whom was referred the matter of Granting of Certain Licenses Secondhand Valuables: Record Exchange 256 Washington St., Witch City Consignment 301 Essex St., EcoATM (Shaws) 11 Traders Way, EcoATM (Walmart) 450 Highland Ave. has considered said matter and would recommend these licenses be granted.

**#66 – (#437 OF 2023) – STUDY AND DISCUSSION OF RIGHT-ON-RED ORDINANCES**

Councillor Morsillo offered the following report for the Committee on Ordinances, Licenses and Legal Affairs co-posted with the Committee of the Whole. It was voted to accept the report and adopt the recommendation.

The Committee on Ordinances, Licenses and Legal Affairs to whom was referred the matter of Meeting to introduce a study and discussion of right-on-red ordinances and State laws for all traffic lights in the City of Salem. This meeting will introduce the data provided by the Traffic and Parking Department with additional data provided by the Police Department Traffic Division. We will also review the Federal Highway Administration's Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices guidance on right-on-red. Subsequent meetings will drill down on the data in three sections, to be determined at this meeting. The backup material contains a map of all traffic lights and the data provided, as well as a list of articles related to right-on-red, has considered said matter and would recommend that the matter remain in committee.

Councillor Morsillo stated we had a good kick off discussion. Every single traffic in the city was discussed. We will be getting new maps and data about accident and crashes due to the light itself. We want to look at the safety at the intersection. This Thursday's meeting, February 22<sup>nd</sup>, we will be discussing the lights on Highland and Loring Avenue.

Councillor Harvey asked at the next meeting will there be information on what specifically the accidents were i.e. people jaywalking, vehicles turning right on red, etc.

Councillor Morsillo replied yes. Lt. Tucker will get more information. If anyone wants data on a specific light, email David Kucharsky, the Traffic and Parking Director and/or Lt. Tucker, Police Traffic.



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Councillor Cohen stated he cannot be there on 2/29 and wanted to make sure Ward Councillors are available when the traffic lights in their ward are taken up.

Councillor Morsillo stated there are 3 meetings scheduled and we can discuss after the meeting.

Councillor Watson-Felt stated that as the Ward Two Councillor she would like to be at that meeting.

**#67 – (#12) – CREATION OF AN ELECTION COMMISSION**

Councillor Varela offered the following report for the Committee on Government Services co-posted with the Committee of the Whole. It was voted to accept the report and adopt the recommendation.

The Committee on Government Services co-posted with the Committee of the Whole to whom was referred the matter of Creating an Election Commission and the process involved, has considered said matter and would recommend the matter remain in Committee.

Councillor Varela stated we had a productive meeting discussing the creation of the Election Commission. We discussed should we be doing this and why. For the next meeting we will try to get other communities with an Election Committee to attend. The City Clerk of Everett will join us.

**#68 – (#45) – EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT**

Councillor Varela offered the following report for the Committee on Government Services co-posted with the Committee of the Whole. It was voted to accept the report and adopt the recommendation.

The Committee on Government Services co-posted with the Committee of the Whole to whom was referred the matter of a request from Eagle Scout Colin Bowker for his Eagle Scout Project to move the existing memorial of Benjamin Pierce at the rotary of Church St. and St. Peter's St., to the center island on Church St. alongside a new plaque dedicated to Major General Stephen Abbot, has considered said matter and would recommend Adoption.

Councillor Varela stated that Scout Colin Bowker attended the meeting. He also stated that the Salem Redevelopment Authority (SRA) had already reviewed the project and approved it.

Councillor Prosniewski requested that a City Seal be sent to Colin Bowker for his hard work to move this memorial to a more visible location.

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**#69 – EXEMPTION TO THE MGL CH. 268A, SEC. 20(B)**

The following order submitted by the City Solicitor relative to the exemption of MGL Ch. 268A, Sec. 20 (b) was adopted by a roll call vote of 11 yeas, 0 nays and 0 absent.
