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Citizens Inn/Haven From Hunger Hosted June, 2019 Meeting

<u>Citizens Inn</u> hosted the June, 2019 Salem HOPE meeting at the <u>Haven From Hunger</u>. Representing the agency was Corey Jackson, Kate Benashski, Maureen Fiore and Shani Deschamps. Present were Jane Guy and Naomi Francisco of the City of Salem DPCD, Beth Alaimo of Root, Stephanie Jackson and Devin DeVasto of MA Rehabilitation Commission, Kristen Evans and Alyssa Galante of Aspire Developmental, Shantel Alix and Miriam Acevedo of North Shore CDC, Ann-Marie O'Keefe and

Charlene Snow of MassHire, Trish Kennedy of Catholic Charities, Maureen Smith, and Maria Carrasquillo of NSCAP, and Richard Sanchez and Katina Polemenako of Salvation Army, Kerry Murphy of Mass in Motion/Salem Pantry, Ashley Melanson of North Shore Physician's Group.

Mr. Jackson welcomed the group and stated that Citizens for Adequate Housing rebranded to Citizens Inn three years ago and merged with Haven From Hunger two years ago. At the Haven, they renovated the kitchen last year and rent it out when they are not using it. They have started a culinary program working with five restaurant partners to employ participants. The recently received a Cummings grant to finish the first floor

renovations and the bathrooms. For the second floor, they plan to have a large commercial kitchen with a dining hall and office space as a family success space, which is two years out. The Haven serves Salem, Peabody and Lynnfield. Mr. Jackson added that 48% of Citizens Inn/Haven From Hunger clientele are Salem residents, a total of 1581 persons.

Ms. Benashski stated that assist 75-160 families daily to access food, which is generally 60 lbs of food, or a 3-day supply. Their partners donate food that might otherwise be thrown out. She noted that the need has grown over the last couple of years. They try to build relationships and connect people with services during the community meals. The dinner serves 25-60 persons per night and it is served restaurant style. There is no ID required and any resident from any community is welcome. They are always looking for volunteers. They offer take-home

meals for families.

Ms. Fiore stated that the Inn Between and Inn Transition house 36 families experiencing homelessness, 27 from DHCD and 8 from DPH for sober living. They have one community room with a long waiting list. There are also scattered sites in Peabody and Lynn. Families stay an average of 3 months to 2 years. They partner with supportive programs. Groups and workshops are provided to increase opportunities to get jobs. They also offer credit building assistance, health and wellness groups, recovery groups, an arts program, a lifeskills group through North Shore Community College and a nurturing parenting group.

Ms. Deschamps stated that at Citizens Inn she works with the stabilization program through DHCD, which follows families for 12 months. She works with participants to help increase their income so as to be able to sustain rent. This is done through education, connecting with resources and helping them understand their rights. She also manages 12 rental units for which there is a wait list.

Ms. Alix stated that North Shore CDC is offering a summer ESL program at Espacio and there is an open house on 6/27/19.

Ms. Acevedo stated North Shore CDC will have financial wellness classes on 7/16 and 7/17/19 in Spanish, including a \$50 incentive.

Ms. Melanson stated that for <u>North Shore Physician's Group</u>, she works at Salem Hospital as a community health worker, assisting high risk patients to connect them with resources.

Ms. Carrasquillo stated that <u>North Shore Community Action Programs</u>, <u>Inc.</u> (NSCAP) offers a fuel assistance program and that applications start to be accepted in the first week of October.

Ms. Alaimo stated that she is the Program Director at <u>Root</u>, a job training program for youth 16-24. They are starting a summer session that will be two months long.

Ms. Kennedy stated that at <u>Catholic Charities</u> she is the program manager for the English language program, in partnership with the North Shore CDC. There will be a summer program open to all levels with morning and evening classes. There will also be classes in Lynn.

Ms. Snow stated that the MassHire North Shore Career Center is having a retail and hospitality career fair on June 19th at the Community Life Center. There is also a recruitment event for Ocean State Job Lot at the North Shore Community College cafeteria on 6/25.

Ms. O'Keefe stated that the <u>MassHire Youth Career Center</u> is in the midst of its subsidized summer jobs program. She asked that youth looking to work be sent to her.

Ms. Jackson stated that at MA Rehabilitation Commission, they have a new collaboration with the DTA and are hiring a vocational rehab counsellor and a job placement specialist. Starting July 1, they will provide day care and participants must have a disability.

Ms. Devasto stated to send clients her way for job driven trainings as MA Rehab. There is no waitlist.

Ms. Smith of NSCAP stated that there is funding for people moving into Salem or for Salem residents for first/last/security or for rental arrearages.

Major Sanchez stated that the <u>Salvation Army</u> is looking for partnerships. They have ESL, a backpack 68 program in the schools, community meals on Tuesday and Thursday, a Bridging the Gap program that serves at-risk groups and senior and youth to camp program.

Ms. Polemenako that the Salvation Army's backpack 68 program is with the Boys and Girls Club. They have a food pantry for Salem, Peabody and Marblehead residents on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9-11am or persons can call for an appointment. Camp Wonderland has openings for ages 6-12 and it is \$25 for the week.

Ms. Evans stated that <u>Aspire Developmental</u> has early intervention for developmentally delayed children ages 0-3. They have home visiting based services and are covered by insurance. They also offer community based play groups.

Ms. Galante stated that she provides community outreach at Aspire.

Ms. Francisco stated that the City of Salem offers <u>housing programs</u>, including a First Time Homebuyer Program and a Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program. The FTHB program provides up to \$7500 in downpayment and closing costs. The Rehab program assists with handicapped accessibility, roofs, windows, etc. They are also a Get the Lead Out service agency.

Ms. Guy stated that she is the Assistant Community Development Director for the City of Salem <u>Department of Planning and Community Development</u>, and that the comment period for the FY20 Action Plan will run through June 28th and a public hearing will be held on June 20th.

If you do not get any requests for ASL interpreters by noon on the Monday prior to the meeting, you can cancel the request by close of business on that Monday.

The NURTURING PROGRAM®

NURTURING is the ability to care for and foster growth in yourself and others.

What is the Nurturing Program®?

The Nurturing Program is a series of 15 weekly classes for families to take together. It is a strength-based program to help families incorporate new, positive, and nurturing patterns into their homes. Parents and children learn the same skills, although their teachers and classrooms are separate.

Your family will learn how to:

- · Handle feelings, recognize and communicate needs, and take charge of behavior
- Handle stress and anger
- Replace hitting and yelling with more positive discipline techniques
- Recognize the need for nurturing touch
- Establish nurturing routines like mealtimes, bedtimes, getting out of the house, chores, etc.

Pathways for Children Nurturing Program ® specifics:

- Pathways will be utilizing the Nurturing Program for Parents of Schools Aged Children curriculum.
- The program will be held at Pathways for Children located at 292 Cabot Street Beverly, MA.
- It meets on Wednesdays from September 25th January 15th from 4:30-7 pm. There is a home visit
 prior the program beginning in order to get to know your assigned facilitator and program expectations.
- There is no cost for the program and open to anyone.
- The children's groups are divided into separate groups depending on age.
- A free dinner is provided each week.
- Transportation reimbursement is available for families living in the catchment area.
