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Help! Proposed CDBG Cuts Threaten Services

As this newsletter hits the digital world, there is a very real financial threat that will effect many of the programs that are run by non-profit agencies that serve Salem residents. Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds have been targeted for cuts. We can expect a minimum of a 7.5% cut in CDBG funding as provided in President Obama's budget, but some Congressional members are pushing for even deeper cuts – the latest is 66% or decimating CDBG altogether.

This year, Salem was able to provide CDBG grant funds to 28 social service programs. The programs funded included that provide food, child care, prescription assistance, emergency rental assistance, senior transportation, youth activities, extra police patrols, services for children and adults with disabilities, services for parenting teens, services for the homeless and services for those who have been abused. A 66% cut would mean approximately 18 of those 28 agencies would loose their funding from Salem CDBG.

Salem is not alone. More than 35 cities and towns in Massachusetts that directly receive CDBG funds, as well as the numerous cities and towns that receive CDBG funds through the State's competitive process, will be given funding cuts. Cuts are not limited to Massachusetts - it will effect

So what can you do? You can, <u>right now</u>, call and write your Congressional members and express your support for CDBG. Tell them how CDBG will effect programs, jobs, households and neighborhoods. Any reduction in CDBG funding would severely slow down or eliminate thousands of local and state projects and programs that are directly contributing to local and regional recovery. Tell them that CDBG provides the flexibility to fund a myriad of activities, fill gaps where needed, and leverage and attract additional resources to projects. This combination of CDBG with other resources adds to our local economy through the purchase of goods and services and adds to the betterment of the lives of our local citizenry through improved neighborhoods and services. Ask them to <u>oppose</u> <u>any legislation that would eliminate or reduce funding for CDBG</u> in FY11 or FY12. Invite them to visit you agencies, see the programs first-hand and meet some of your clients.

Call Congress Now – Go to <u>www.house.gov</u> and <u>www.senate.gov</u> or call the Capitol Hill Switchboard at 202-224-3121. Ask them to oppose any cuts to CDBG in FY11 and FY12. Ask for full funding of CDBG -- \$3.99 billion.

Representing the agency was Paul Lanzikos, Chief Executive Officer, along with Kathy Parrella, Janice Wyman, Diane Kessler, Ben Kosofsky, Gene Doughty, Donna Graves and Beverly Flanagan. Present were Jane Guy of the City of Salem DPCD, Nimmi Wadhwa of NSCAP, Kimberly Jones, Charlene Snow and Sandra Efstratiou of the North Shore Career Center, Mary Margaret Moore and

Mr. Lanzikos welcomed the group and stated that the North Shore Elder Services programmatic focus includes:

- Old and Bold LGB Coalition started a year ago with an event to bring together LGBs and their supporters. There is a supper club that meets every second Tuesday at the House of the Seven Gables
- Hoarding has become an epidemic and holds no social boundaries. It is a mental health disorder that can frequently become a public health issue. They have a hoarding specialist working at Catholic Charities and North Shore Elder

Services and have developed an inter-agency task from Middleton, Danvers, Peabody, Salem and Marblehead working on prevention and intervention.

- The North Shore Regional Elder Assistance Coordinating Team (REACT) is for first responders and is not limited to hoarders, although hoarding is a huge piece of the focus.
- Health Care Reform activities include helping persons with the first 30 days of post hospitalization to avoid re-admittance and working with people on options for long-term care and support.

Mr. Lanzikos stated that North Shore Elder Services will be having an annual Spring event on <u>April 28th at the Hawthorne</u><u>Hotel</u>. Beatlejuice will be in the main ball room and Julie Doherty will be in the restaurant area.

Ms. Jones stated that she is an Outreach Specialist with the <u>North</u> <u>Shore Career Center</u> and connects with agencies to provide materials and presentations.

Ms. Snow stated that at North Shore Career Center she works with area businesses with their employment needs.

Ms. Efstratiou stated that North Shore Career Center has Employment Express, funded with a federal grant to provide employment transportation from Peabody, Salem or Danvers from 6am to midnight at a cost of \$2 per ride to and from work.

Ms. Williamson stated that she is a vocational counselor with <u>Mass Rehabilitation Commission</u> working with people of all ages to get employment. They offer counseling, training and job coaching. They are working with young people transitioning from high school.

Ms. Foye stated that she is on the board of <u>Anchor to Windward</u>, which has been around for 2 2years. They provide independent living help and social groups for people with disabilities or Autism.

Ms. Moore stated that the <u>Independent Living Center</u> assists any person of any age of any disability with information and referral, peer guides to help learn independent living skills and peer counseling and advocacy. The help insure that the Americans With Disabilities Act is implemented. They offer a What Are Your Options for Long Term Care Program, as well as workshops such as Housing Rights in Salem.

Ms. Flanagan stated that she coordinates the Commonwealth Care Program, which is a State program similar to the Vista Program. She coordinates volunteer companions.

Mr. Kosofsky stated that he is a Commonwealth Care volunteer. He visits elders and helps them to determine benefits available and prepare the forms, such as MassHealth, Snap and Fuel Assistance.

Mr. Doughty stated that he is a Commonwealth Care specialist and also a volunteer coordinator for various programs.

Ms. Kessler stated that she is also with Commonwealth Care at North Shore Elder Services.

Ms. Graves stated that she is a volunteer.

Ms. Snow Parish stated that she runs the <u>Adult Learning Center</u> at North Shore Community College, where adult students can get a GED for free. The <u>North Shore Adult Education Partnership</u> has developed a resource website, created by Salem Cyberspace students.

Ms. St. Pierre stated that she is the Director of the North Shore Infant and Toddler Program of the <u>Cerebral Palsy of Eastern Mass</u>. They work with children age 0 to 3 who are at risk of developmental delays. They serve ten cities and are located in Salem and Lynn. The have a sliding fee scale and offer parent support groups.

Ms. Kennedy McPhee stated that <u>HealthQuarters</u> provides affordable and confidential reproductive health services and health education. Their main office is in Beverly. They will be closing their Reading clinic.

Ms. Wyman stated that for North Shore Elder Services Family Caregiver Support Program, she helps families pick resources. They will be having a series of chronic disease management workshops in April at the Peabody Council on Aging available to persons of any age.

Ms. Wadhwa stated that <u>NSCAP</u> is offering free tax services for low income people. They are also opening a new site at Beverly Bootstraps. She noted that the fuel assistance program is up and running.

Ms. Parrella stated that at North Shore Elder Services, she provides option counseling, transition counseling and the family caregiver program.

Ms. Guy of the <u>City of Salem</u> Department of Planning & Community Development reminded the group to forward event notices, job openings, etc. to her and she will either forward them on to the Salem HOPE email distribution list or include it in an upcoming newsletter. All agency websites are included as links on the city website and Ms. Guy asked agencies to notify her if their website is missing.

City of Salem CDBG-Funded Public Services that Assisted Lower Income Households Program Accomplishments For Last 5 Years

- 2884 seniors received transportation to medical appointments, senior center, shopping, hairdresser, adult day care, recreation, etc., resulting in 32,847 rides
- 841 youth of working parents received child care
- 3814 youth participated in after school programs, including music, art/crafts, basketball, science, yearbook, homework help, computer training, fitness/weight training, flag football, soccer, game tournaments, HIV/aids awareness, swimming, whiffleball, knitting, kite making, tutoring, dance, theatre, newspaper, kickball, hockey, dodgeball, leadership, cooking, yoga, MCAS prep, gang prevention and seminars
- Homeless Outreach Street Worker assisted 191 homeless persons with obtaining services including housing, detoxification, medical and/or employment/financial
- 35 youth participated in career planning program for mentally disabled high school students
- 230 medical prescriptions were filled
- 29 persons received training in medical office field
- 82 persons attended First Time Homebuyer workshops
- 22 youth participated in a juvenile firestarter intervention program
