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## **Salem Council on Aging Hosted June Meeting**

The June, 2012 Salem HOPE meeting was hosted by the <u>Salem Council on Aging</u>. Representing the agency was Sharon Felton, Social Service Coordinator, along with Lynn Barrett. Present were Jane Guy of the City of Salem DPCD, Anne Marie D'Angelo Florent of MassHealth, Luz Garay of the North Shore CDC, Charlene Snow of North Shore Career Center, Keira O'Donovan of Anchor to Windward, Captain Scott McNeil of the Salvation Army, Janine Long of the Social Security Administration and Michele Chausse of HealthQuarters.

Ms. Felton welcomed the group and stated that the Salem Council on Aging (COA) merged with the Park and Recreation Department six years ago to become Park, Recreation and Community Services. The COA is the social service piece and is open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday 8-4 and Thursday 8-7, serving seniors 60+ and persons under 60 who are disabled. They provide services and support to Salem's seniors, including information and referral, scheduling appointments and home visits, help with health insurance issues, prescription problems, financial troubles, bankruptcy and foreclosures, hoarding, etc. They have a relationship with the Salem Police for seniors through 911 calls and they assist with the fuel assistance and food stamp process. They also offer transportation for medical appointments, shopping, groceries, hair salon and other necessities, including trips to and from the senior center. There is a two day notice to schedule a ride, but they try to accommodate rides with less notice when possible. Congregate meals are provided Monday through Friday at the senior center and are delivered to home bound seniors. All support services are free. They offer recreational, educational and physical programs, including tai chi, conversational Spanish, creative writing, art courses and computer labs and they issue a newsletter. The Park and Recreation Department has programs for the entire community for all ages.

Ms. Lang stated that she is the Operations Supervisor for the <u>Social Security</u> office in Salem, which services a lot of the North Shore area. They have the highest amount of internet users in New England. The site allows persons to apply for Social Security benefits and Medicare and to calculate benefits. The have started providing Spanish estimations and publications. There is no charge for applications.

Ms. Chausse stated that she is the Director of Communication and Development at <u>HealthQuarters</u>. They provide reproductive health services and serve 60 communities. They se women of child bearing years (18-44), as well as men. Services include birth control, provision of condoms, HIV testing, STD testing, gynecological exams, pap and breast exams and education for at-risk youth. They will speak at other community-based organizations or at high schools and colleges. They recently moved to the Cummings Center. They have a relationship with the Salem Family Health Center.

Ms. Garay stated that she is the Family Stabilizer at North Shore CDC and helps families in Salem to find services, such as GED in Spanish. The NSCDC provides affordable housing and recently built affordable units in Beverly. They have a program to get youth involved in order for them to have a sense of pride in the community.

Ms. D'Angelo-Florent stated that <u>MassHealth</u> is a statewide program. Her major function is to update providers on the MassHealth program eligibility and application process. They have an electronic application process at some provider offices. A person cannot apply from their home computer, but can get information on their case, change their address, and check if their documents have been received. Their caseload is 1.3 million members, which equals one sixth the population of Massachusetts. The income guidelines went up in march, so those who were previously denied should apply again. She stated that she will provide MassHealth presentations.

Ms. Snow stated that she provides business services at the <u>North Shore Career Center</u>. She works with the employers and does job fairs. The agency helps anyone who is employed or unemployed with various employment services.

Captain McNeil stated that the <u>Salvation Army</u> sends youth ages 6-12 from throughout the North Shore to summer camp at Camp Wonderland in Sharon, MA. Their residential camp is the oldest in the country. They can be contacted directly by calling 339-502-5900

Ms. O'Donovan stated that she is the Program Director for <u>Anchor to Windward</u>, located on Atlantic Avenue in Marblehead. They provide social and independent living services for adults with disabilities. Independent living services include bank/financial, shopping and medical appointments. Social services include recreational activities and social discussion.

## **Salem Council on Aging Services**

Since 1967 the Council on Aging has been offering programs, activities and services to Salem residents aged 60 and older. The Senior Center is open Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. There are no dues or membership fees. A schedule of events, information and special announcements are provided in "Senior Power," the Council on Aging's monthly newsletter, which can be delivered to your home for an annual donation of \$3.

#### **Transportation**



We offer curb-to-curb transportation to and from the Senior Center, medical appointments, food shopping, etc. Our vans are handicap-accessible (please specify when reserving a ride). Vans are available Monday through Friday. Two-day advance reservations are necessary and donations are accepted to aid with regular vehicle maintenance.

Nutrition	Hot nutritious meals are available at 11:30 a.m., Monday through Friday at the Senior Center, with prior reservation. Home Delivered Meals are also offered to homebound elders (confined to their homes by health problems). A donation is suggested to defray the cost of the meals.
Wellness Clinic	A registered nurse is available during scheduled hours for checking blood pressure, reviewing medications, and conducting a variety of health screenings. Health education programs are held regularly and flu and pneumonia shots are offered annually. We also offer podiatry services and occasional hearing clinics at pre-scheduled times.
<u>Calendar</u>	Dancing, bingo, exercise groups, yoga, chair massage, organized trips, educational programs, craft groups, woodworking, and card games are just some of the exciting activities going on at the Center. Call to see if we have what you're looking for!
Volunteer Services	We have a wonderful group of volunteers at the Center. Without these dedicated and talented individuals we would not be able to offer the services that we do. We are always in need of more volunteers to assist with a variety of programs. If you are interested in giving some of your time to help elders, please call!
Social Services	Licensed Social Workers provide information and referral, support and assistance to folks who have questions or concerns. They can assist with problems related to Social Security, health insurance, housing and many other personal issues. You may either drop in or call to schedule an appointment with a Social Worker. A home visit can also be arranged if necessary.

Non-profit organizations play a critical role in our lives and in the North Shore economy. A 2005 Mass, Inc. study reported that non-profits in Massachusetts have more than \$137 billion in assets. The Enterprise Center then conducted its own research to determine the needs of nonprofits on the North Shore of Massachusetts.

One of the key findings was that, while nonprofits do have some unique needs, they also want and need business training. Non-profits today are under tremendous pressure to demonstrate that they are well run and use funds effectively. Grant makers want to see "capacity-building" programs that will enable the recipient organization to become more financially independent. Non-profits are expected to be run like any business, and they need the appropriate business skills to do so. In the face of fierce competition for donations, they also need to be savvy fundraisers.

Our goal is to help non-profit organizations operate more efficiently and effectively. We encourage attendees to register for general business skill programs as well as those specifically for non-profits.
