September Meeting Hosted by Morgan Memorial Goodwill Industries

The September, 2012 Salem HOPE meeting was hosted by <u>Morgan</u> <u>Memorial Goodwill Industries</u> (Goodwill). Representing the agency was Patricia Maynard, Kim Rosenberg, Gail Kelly and Lucy Boggiatto. Present were Jane Guy of the City of Salem DPCD, VeAnne Campbell of the North Shore Moving Market, Jill Bowen of Catholic Charities, Anne Marie D'Angelo Florent of MassHealth, Luz Garay of the North Shore CDC, Salem State University Students Candace Chiacchia and Stephanie Charles, Merry Hill of Cerebral Palsy of Eastern Mass. North Shore, Charlene Snow of North Shore Career Center and Jennifer Laudani of Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission.

Ms. Maynard welcomed the group and stated that Goodwill's emphasis is on job placement for individuals with barriers to employment. They have short and long term programs. The training center provides light packaging work for clients. They offer job placement within the community and work on how to get and keep a job through classroom training, computers, interview practice and dress for success. They have 13 staff.

Mf. Kelly stated that on Fridays, they run a job club for job searching. She does placement and develops business relationships within the community.

Ms. Snow stated that the <u>North Shore Career Center</u> provides business services, job fairs and recruitment. They have a Workforce Training Fund Program that provides grants for skills training for workers.

Ms. Laudani stated that <u>Mass Rehabilitation Commission</u> helps individuals with disabilities get work. The also have student programs. They are in the process of getting more computers for job searching.

Ms. Campbell stated that the <u>North Shore Moving Market</u> delivers groceries to home bound elderly, disabled and disadvantaged persons.

Ms. Bowen stated that <u>Catholic Charities</u>' Lynn office is in the process of moving. The Salem office has an initial response program for people behind in rent or utilities. They also have a food card program for Market Basket, as well as a GED program.

Ms. Boggiatto stated that she is the Dayhab Manager at Goodwill, which is for those 22+ and is MassHealth funded. They offer daily and independent living, motor, communication and social skills. They will have a new program in October to transition from school to work called Will to Work.

Ms. Garay stated that <u>North Shore CDC</u> is working on a voting drive and they are expanding their offices. Their English classes currently have a waiting list.

Ms. D'Angelo Florent stated that she is the <u>MassHealth</u> member education representative, providing training and presentations on eligibility and the process. Due to the passage of the Affordable Care Act, they are charged with implementing it fully by January 1, 2014. They will be changing the application system.

Ms. Hill stated that <u>North Shore Infant & Toddler Program</u> provides toddler groups and guidance for families of children with any delay in developmental areas. She noted that Maureen Fiore stepped down. They welcome referrals.

Ms. Maynard stated that they have a new janitorial training program. They are also working to set up a food service program.

Ms. Rosenberg stated that Goodwill offers two school programs. The program at Salem High School is funded with CDBG and includes classroom, mock interviews, customer service and soft skills and skills assessment. They also have a School to Work program in Lynn for those 18-22. They work with individuals referred from DDS.

Ms. Chiacchia and Ms. Charles stated that NSCAP has a stabilization program for the homeless, home care<u>http://www.nscap.org/</u> services for elders, a homecare program and fuel assistance.

Ms. Guy stated that the Draft CDBG end of year report (CAPER) is available for comment through September 26th and can be viewed on <u>www.salem.com</u>.

Janitorial & Building Maintenance Program

The **Janitorial & Building Maintenance Program** is an exciting, new initiative that prepares trainees to become entry-level professionals in the fields of Environmental Services, General Cleaning, Housekeeping, and Grounds-keeping. Trainees learn the essentials of the field through intensive training and instruction that focuses on two phases, each of which are three weeks of training. Phase 1 is designed to teach trainees the practical skills associated with Porter/Housekeeping. In this phase, trainees learn how to sweep, mop, vacuum, remove trash from offices, dust and spot clean furnishings, and clean restrooms. Phase 2 of the training program is a more advanced component designed to teach trainees the essentials of a Janitor/Custodian. In this phase, trainees learn how to operate machinery and tools to strip, wax, and polish floors, clean and shampoo carpet, detail offices and bathrooms, and work as part of a team to set up for meetings and functions. Upon successful completion, trainees are awarded a certificate and receive assistance from Goodwill staff to obtain and retain competitive employment.

The **Will to Work** Program is an exciting new training opportunity for individuals with disabilities between the ages of 22 and 25. This dynamic program guides candidates as they make the transition from high school to adult life and work.

Participants in this program spend part of their week in a structured learning environment where they will acquire and further develop life and pre-vocational skills as well as job readiness. Participants also spend part of their week applying the skills they have learned in one of Goodwill's integrated on-the-job training programs.

Successful candidates should expect to complete the program within one year and transition to full-time supported employment and ultimately to competitive, community-based employment.
