7 Gables Hosted by December Meeting

The December, 2013 Salem HOPE meeting was hosted by House of the Seven Gables. Representing the agency was Kara McLaughlin and Anna Nuncio. Present were Jane Guy of the City of Salem DPCD, Leonette Strout of the Salem YMCA, Grant Murphy of the Independent Living Center, Allyson Boyington of Pathways for Children/Headstart, Lianna Sour of Seven Hills, Anthony DiPietro of HAWC, Stephanie Tsimortos of Anchor to Windward, Anne-Marie D'Angelo Floretn of MassHealth, Phill Hyes of Journeys of Hope and Barbara St. Pierre of North Shore Infant Toddler.

Ms. McLaughlin, Executive Director, stated that The House of the Seven Gables is known mostly for its flagship property, the Turner

Mansion. Caroline emmerton used the tourism proceeds from the Turner Mansion for philanthropic uses, a dual mission that continues now. It is its own National Register Distict and landmark. The 7 Gables' new approach is a partnership model. The offer small programs and fund organizations through a grant process. They have worked with art teachers and immigrant students to make ornaments being sold on consignment. They funded the "Saelm through Hawthorne's Yes Program" and "Express Yourself", a yearly performance at the Wang. They have partnerships with Cyberspace and the Plummer Home. For any funds earned through admissions, the excees goes to the Settlement programs. They have theatrical performances on Saturdays. She noted that the Gables is a great palce for special events.

Ms. Nuncio stated that she is the Manager of Settlement Partnerships.

Ms. St. Pierre of North Shore Infant and Toddler Program, stated that they are located on Lafayette Street in Salem, as well as in Lynn. They serve 10 cities for children, age birth to three, with developmental delays. Anyone can make a referral. They have multi-disciplinary staff and serve over 600 familes per year. There are toddler groups and parent/child groups open to the community. They are looking for speech therapists.

Mr. Hayes stated that he started with <u>Journeys of Hope</u> in August and they have been around for four years. They serve 18-23 year old, homeless youth - or those at-risk of being homeless, such as those who are couch surfing or have issues of abuse, addiction or mental health. They do not have a shelter, but have an office in the First Universalist Church. They are in the process of starting up a vocational program.

Ms. D'Angelo Florent stated that she is a members education representative for MassHealth. The agency is owrking on implementing the Affordable Health Care Act for January 1st, and have been

implementing it in phases. They are taking applications. She provides education for MassHealth and will presentations at agencies.

Ms. Tsimortos stated that <u>Anchor to Windward</u> provides services to adults with special needs. They provide a social clube and social networking, such as their bowling group.

Mr. Murphy stated that the <u>Independent Living Center</u> helps people of all ages with all types of disabilities. They help people be independent. They provide a monthly workshop to help with filling out universal housing applications. They have a new communication skills group that meets Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Ms. Strout stated that she is the Director of the Girls Today Program, which is for 9th and 10th grade girls. The <u>Salem YMCA</u> offers after school programs, child care, a teen center and media center. The Y refuses no one.

Mr. DiPietro stated that <u>HAWC</u> is a 35 year old domestic violence agency. They have an office at Sheltland Park and two staff at Salem Hospital, along with a shelter located in Salem. There is a 24 hour hotline, support groups, court advocacy, parent/child training program and youth violence prevention in schools. They will be doing a strategic plan to look at gaps.

Ms. Sours stated that <u>Seven Hills</u> in locaed in North Andover but serves families all over, supportin individuals with disabilities and persons caring-giving for those aging.

Ms. Boyington stated she is a social worker the <u>Pathways for Children</u> Program. They have sites in Salem, Gloucester, Beverly and Peabody. They provide screenings, transportation and take referrals. They currently have a waitlist of over 100 children, due to budget cuts and lost classrooms.

Ms. Guy stated the <u>City of Salem</u>'s public hearing for the FY15 Action Plan for Community and Economic Development is January 16, 2014.


