## HAWC Hosted June Meeting

The June, 2014 Salem HOPE meeting was hosted by [Healing Abuse Working for Change \(HAWC\)](#). Representing the agency Anthony DiPietro and Peg Tiberio. Present were Jane Guy of the City of Salem DPCD, Anne-Marie D'Angelo Florent of MassHealth, Leonette Strout of the Salem YMCA, Deric LePard of NSCAP, Jill Bowen of Catholic Charities, Pam Foye of Anchor to Windward, Stephanie Sladen of Children's Friend and Family Services and Jennifer Laudani of MRC Salem.

Mr. DiPietro stated that HAWC is a 36 year old organization serving 23 cities and towns with domestic violence advocacy and services. They

have 3 locations in Salem.

Ms. Tiberio stated that HAWC's mission is to serve the victims, survivors and loved ones of domestic violence and to eliminate forms of oppression relating to violence. She described the Crossroads program and stated that they provide community education including health care response to domestic violence at North Shore Medical Center and for teens at North Shore Children's Hospital. There is a 24 hour hotline staffed by volunteers, many of which are survivors. It has a 40 hour training. They offer support groups, as well as legal advocacy and services (such as accompanying clients to court or help with obtaining restraining orders). They have advocates that speak Spanish and Portuguese.

Ms. Strout stated that she works with teens at the [Salem YMCA](#). They recently refurbished the teen center, which has media services. It is open to members or non-members. She works with Salem Community Charter School to teach media skills and they, in turn, work at events. They recently opened a music studio with instruments, and they provide music lessons. The City has allowed the tennis courts at Palmer Cove to be taken over as a community garden. A farmers market at Rainbow Terrace is coming. She stated that they are always looking for volunteers.

Mr. LePard state that [NSCAP](#) offers a fuel assistance program to six communities. Households can apply even if heat is included in the rent. They have a home care program for elderly and disabled. They recently moved to off of Foster Street in Peabody. They operate a scattered sites shelter. They have a housing law project for people going to court with the threat of eviction. The run a HOPWA program, as well as Adult Basic Education. They also have Salem Cyberspace, an energy conservation program and emergency rent and utility assistance.

Ms. Bowen stated that she works at [Catholic Charities'](#) Salem office, providing basic needs. They have funds to prevent eviction and utility shut-off. They offer English Language Learners classes in partnership with North Shore CDC. They offer food gift cards for Market Basket. They have a Little Lambs program to provide pampers and wipes monthly for Salem residents.

Ms. Foye stated that [Anchor to Windward](#) has a new brochure and is located at 74 Atlantic Avenue in Marblehead. They provide independent living and social networking services to adults with disabilities. They have a bowling league, life skills reinforcement and active social groups.

Ms. D'Angelo-Florent stated that she is a member education representative for [MassHealth](#). She can give presentations and program updates on MassHealth. They are in the final stages of the Affordable Care Act, which went into effect January 1, 2014. She stated that it is important to call a MassHealth member with address changes.

Ms. Sladen stated that she is new to [Children's Friend and Family](#). They were founded in Salem and have been in business 177 years. They have clinics, outpatient therapy, in home therapy, intensive case coordination, volunteer youth mentoring program, teen parent program at Salem High School and court clinic services.

Ms. Laudani stated that she is a counselor with [MA Rehabilitation Commission](#). They help persons with any disability to get and keep a job. They provide housing and vehicle modification. They offer a Good News Garage where people donate a vehicle and once a client has a job, they can access a vehicle.

#### **Good News Garage**

The Good News Garage Donated Vehicle Program, in cooperation with the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission (MRC), provides refurbished donated vehicles to people with disabilities in Massachusetts who otherwise could not afford to purchase their own. Cars will be used to transport the client to employment.

The current program will help 24 individuals per year to obtain cars. In total, this program has assisted more than 100 clients over a number of years. Qualified applicants must be clients of MRC and must have a written Individual Plan for Employment.

Anyone interested in applying to this program must request a referral from their MRC Counselor. Completed referrals should be faxed to 603.626.7763.

Ms. Guy of the [City of Salem](#) Dept. of Planning & Community Development posed a question. She asked if Salem has a need for a program similar to the Women's Friend Society, but for men in school (SRO, sliding scale).

The responses from the group agreed that this was a need. It was stated that the rules at the WFS include no opposite sex allowed outside common areas and no liquor or cigarettes and there is a shared bathroom.

There are also needs for kids aging out of the system. The Washington Square Residence in Lynn is a good model, as is the River House in Beverly run by Harborlight.

Something similar could also be for males fleeing violence, a sober house, trans-friendly.

## HAWC Services

HAWC services include a 24-hour hotline, support groups, individual advocacy, legal advocacy, and hospital advocacy, children's services, a shelter program, community education, and a Parent-Child Trauma Recovery Program.

- Intakes are available at any of our offices to begin receiving HAWC's short term crisis intervention services.
- Advocates support individuals in their safety.
- Advocates meet with individuals one-on-one to support them with identifying their needs and accessing resources.
- Referrals may be made to HAWC programs including support groups, Parent Child Trauma Recovery Program, or High Risk Teams.
- Referrals to outside agency programs include housing, lawyers, or financial support.

Domestic violence feeds on silence. Our support groups allow those who have been affected by abuse to come together, gain knowledge about domestic violence, connect to their inner strength, gain decision-making strength from each other, and break the isolation that some have endured for years.

HAWC facilitates support groups throughout our service area. Individuals may be referred to attend these after completing an intake.

### Crossroads Program

A collaboration of the North Shore Medical Center and HAWC, Crossroads offers free, confidential crisis intervention and safety planning services for patients and employees experiencing domestic violence. All services are free, voluntary, and confidential.

## Museum of Science Welcomes Witch City Residents for Fifth Annual *September Salem Days*

—Salem Residents to Receive Free Exhibit Halls, Planetarium, and Omni Theater Passes  
Thanks to the Norman H. Read Trust—

This September, Salem residents will have the opportunity to transport themselves through the solar system, fall in love with pandas, explore an exhibition that will revolutionize how you engage with your biology and manage your health, stand before one of the world's most complete *Triceratops* fossils, and much more, all free of charge, when the Museum of Science hosts **September Salem Days**. This program, generously funded by the Norman H. Read Trust, will allow Salem residents to explore more than 700 exhibits, four Planetarium shows, and three giant-screen films in the Mugar Omni Theater. This is the fifth year that the Norman H. Read Trust is providing this exclusive opportunity for Salem residents at the Museum of Science.

"We are thrilled to welcome Salem visitors free of charge this September, thanks to the generosity of the Norman H. Read Trust," said Joan Hadly, the Museum's senior vice president of advancement. "**September Salem Days** offers Salem residents an opportunity to embark on an exciting science adventure, and this year, for the first time, explore more than 70 interactive components in the *Hall of Human Life*."

The Norman H. Read Trust will also subsidize two free MBTA train rides to and from North Station. The first train ride will take place on Saturday, September 6. The second train ride, led by Mayor Kimberley Driscoll and family, will be held on Saturday, September 27. Both train rides will depart from Salem and the offer is only valid for the 10:38 a.m. North Station bound trains on each day. Museum of Science staff and volunteers will accompany passengers on both train rides to provide interpretive and hands-on science activities during the rides. Museum of Science volunteers will guide train riders from North Station to the Museum of Science.

"As a Trustee of the Norman H. Read Trust, I am thrilled to be part of this, the fifth year of the remarkably successful and unique program, September Salem Days. Designed for residents of Salem of all ages, this Program in partnership with the Museum of Science, allows for those students and families of Salem to enjoy free admissions to the Museum as many times as desired for the entire month of September," said Trustee Dr. Nile Albright. "I am especially thrilled that Salem residents will have free admission to all exhibits, including the Museum's newest permanent exhibit, the *Hall of Human Life*, in addition to the Charles Hayden Planetarium and the Mugar Omni Theater. The Read Trust is an innovative supporter of science education city wide also with Science Discovery Centers in all the city schools and Salem High School. The donor, Norman H. Norman H. Read was a close friend and colleague of Museum founder Bradford Washburn.. It was Dr. Albright who joined Read and Washburn for an expedition to the summit of Mount McKinley in 1955 to research who made the first successful ascent of the 20,300-foot mountain in 1907.



### **September Salem Days Program Information**

The program includes free Exhibit Halls, Planetarium, and Omni Theater passes for all Salem families, individuals, and children. Passes have been mailed to each Salem household and will admit up to four individuals. To obtain additional passes, residents can visit one of three distribution centers, which include Salem City Hall, Salem Public Library, and the Salem Parks and Recreation Department. Passes will also be distributed in classrooms at the Salem charter and public schools. Exhibit Hall passes can be presented at the Museum entrance with a valid Massachusetts driver's license or identification card indicating Salem residence. Charles Hayden Planetarium and Mugar Omni Theater passes must be exchanged for a timed ticket with valid identification. Salem residents must obtain passes in the mail or from a distribution center prior to arriving at the Museum. The Museum of Science will be closed on Tuesday, September 2.

Throughout the month of September, the Charles Hayden Planetarium will show *Magic Tree House: Space Mission*, *Wonders of the Night Sky*, *Explore the Universe: Live!*, and *Moons: Worlds of Mystery*. The Mugar Omni Theater will show *Grand Canyon Adventure: River at Risk*, *Journey to the South Pacific*, and *Pandas: The Journey Home*. Exhibit Halls highlights include the brand new *Hall of Human Life*, *Gordon Current Science & Technology Center* presentations, design challenges, and much more. 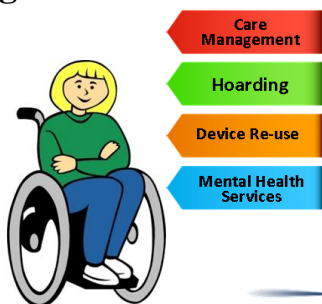
