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March Meeting Hosted by Root NS, Inc.

The March, 2018 Salem HOPE meeting was hosted by the [Root NS, Inc.](#) Representing the agency were Michael May and Beth Alaimo. Present were Jane Guy of the City of Salem DPCD, Major Dulce Fletcher and Katina Polemenako of Salvation Army, Carolyn Curwen of New Liberty Innovation School and Phil Hayes of Path Career and Connections. The Winter storm of March 7th, put a damper on attendance, but those in attendance enjoyed delicious baked goods made right on site by the agency's program participants.

Ms. Alaimo welcomed the group and explained that Root is a youth culinary career program and she is the Program Director.

Mr. May stated that he is the Associate Director of Programming and Food Service Operations. The agency is a non-profit, youth workforce readiness program which is self-supported through Harborpoint at Root special event space, The Root Café, as well as Catering by Root for on and off-site catering. The workforce development program is twelve weeks long, five days per week. Starting in week five, participants work in local restaurants one day per week for eight weeks. Along with culinary training, the program includes workforce preparedness such as interview preparation and resume writing. There is also serve safe food handler exam preparation. In addition, they have a free community meal during the holiday season.

Mr. Hayes stated that [Path Career and Connections](#) is a private pay agency that works with high functioning young adults on the autism spectrum looking to work in a professional setting to earn a living wage. He is looking for intern opportunities.

Ms. Curwen stated that New Liberty Innovation School is an alternative high school within Salem Public Schools. They are working to coordinate efforts to get students internships, coops and opportunities. The school is contingency based instead of standards based, of which employment is a part. They are working to build relationships within the business community.

Major Fletcher stated that the [Salvation Army](#) is starting a new after school digital education program called EverFi, which includes financial literacy and STEM readiness. There are twelve computers dedicated to the program.

Ms. Polemenako stated that the Salvation Army has ²Camp Wonderland for ages 6-12. There are 45 lots

that cost \$25 for one week. They also offer Backpack 69 at Collins Middle School to provide food every Friday to take home. They are reaching out to different schools in order to provide them with snacks. They have the Bridging the Gap program, which is a lifeskills course for ages 12-17 at Collins Middle School, for which they would like to start at additional schools. There is also a Steps Forward program for those out of school and a Tools for School program for teacher supplies.

Ms. Guy stated that the CDBG Action Plan process is underway and that she is awaiting for information on this year's allocations. She reminded members that they can forward information to her to be distributed to the Salem HOPE email distribution list.

These provide a training environment for the students and also generate revenue to support our mission.

Salem HOPE hosts information on reasonable accommodation

Once you have committed to hosting a Salem HOPE meeting, you are encouraged to contact Massachusetts Commission for the Deaf & Hard of Hearing to request an American Sign Language (ASL) Interpreter at least two weeks prior to the meeting date. If you do not get any requests for ASL interpreters by noon on the Monday prior to the meeting, you can cancel the request by close of business on that Monday.


