Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

As you may recall, during the FY2018 budget process the Council unanimously approved the bond Order authorizing funding for a broad range of general fund capital projects. Unfortunately, the Order document for the Council and the advertisement for the Salem News, inadvertently did not include six items from the project list.

Our bond counsel has notified us that, therefore, this Order needs to be re-advertised and reapproved. In addition to the bond Order, I have enclosed, for your reference (a) a copy of the May 25, 2017 Order as it was filed by my office and (b) a copy of the May 25, 2017 Order as it appeared in the City Council's materials. Also enclosed is the advertisement from May that appeared in the Salem News. You will see both in the Order as it appeared before you and the advertisement, the following items were omitted when prepared by the City Clerk:

Passage of the enclosed bond Order does **not** add to the sum total amount that the bond authorization initially approved, which will still be \$3,842,460. It merely adds the missing rows of information specifying the projects upon which funding is being directed. Because bond Orders require two passages, I am requesting a vote for first passage at your meet of November 16 so that second passage can be voted on December 7, which is your final meeting of the year.

Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

I am writing to inform you that the Department of Revenue has certified Free Cash for the City of Salem for the current fiscal year. Our available Free Cash balance for FY2018 is \$4,922,937. As you know, Free Cash is derived from unexpended budget dollars and/or higher than anticipated revenues from prior fiscal years.

Over the last decade the City of Salem has successfully built up our reserve accounts and is in a strong financial position due, in large part, to responsible budgeting practices and professional fiscal policies. It was not that many years ago when our Free Cash account held next to nothing, putting a significant strain on our ability to appropriately save for the future.

Prior to the recommended allocations here, our reserve accounts currently total just over \$7.6 million: our Stabilization Fund holds \$5,455,945, our Capital Improvement Program fund is at \$164,699, and our OPEB Trust Fund is at \$2,057,097.

Given the ever-present fiscal uncertainties related to changes in federal funding programs, reductions in local aid from the state, and increasing liabilities relative to pensions and our aging infrastructure, it is as critical as ever for the City to continue to save wisely and plan appropriately for these upcoming challenges. In addition to building up our rainy-day fund balance, we have continued to implement routine regular financial forecasting and improved our operational and capital budget procedures.

Evidence of our success in these efforts can be found in the recognition we have received annually over the last several years through the Government Finance Officials Association "Certificate of Excellence" for Salem's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report and receipt of the organization's "Distinguished Budget Presentation Award." Salem is one of only a handful of communities in the

Commonwealth to be recognized annually for both of these distinctions. It is also apparent from Standard & Poor's affirmation of our current AA bond rating, the highest credit rating on record in the City's history. In explaining what prompted the rating, the agency has specifically cited our strong financial management practices and conservative budgeting. The hard work of our finance team has been supported by the City Council's foresight and adoption of sound fiscal policies, in particular the goals we set for growing our stabilization, capital, and OPEB accounts specifically.

Therefore, consistent with our previously adopted fiscal policy, I am submitting the enclosed Order to appropriate 20% of the FY2016 Free Cash balance to the Stabilization Fund, 20% to the Capital Improvement Program Fund, and 5% to the OPEB Trust Fund. In all, these amounts direct \$2.2 million to our reserve accounts, bringing them collectively to a very healthy \$9,893,062 in all.

- \$984,587 to the Stabilization Fund, bringing that fund to \$6,440,532
- \$984,587 to the Capital Improvement Program Fund, bringing that fund total to \$1,149,286
- \$246,147 to the OPEB Trust Fund, bringing that fund total to \$2,303,244

Thank you for your consideration of these important requests and for your continued commitment to supporting sound fiscal policies for our City. I respectfully request your adoption of the accompanying Order, which will continue our positive work together in this regard.

The enclosed Order appropriates \$20,000 from free cash to fund the implementation of a few of the year one projects of the Salem for All Ages initiative. Salem's age-friendly action plan was certified by the AARP last year and over the course of 2017 a task force of representatives from a variety of City departments, agencies, and organizations worked to implement the first set of action items from that plan.

Salem's Age Friendly initiative began in 2016 when the City was added to the AARP's national network of Age Friendly communities. Salem was the first city on the North Shore to join the network and only the third in Massachusetts. Acceptance to the network meant Salem committed to developing an action plan that focuses on establishing a vision for each of what the AARP calls the "eight domains" of an age-friendly community: civic participation and employment, communication and information, community support and health services, outdoor space and buildings, transportation, housing, social participation, and respect and social inclusion.

To prepare the Action Plan, we worked with experts from the Center for Social & Demographic Research on Aging at the Gerontology Institute of UMass Boston. Those experts, along with a working group made up of City officials and local volunteers, developed the plan using multiple public listening session and meetings, three focus groups, an exhaustive document review of existing plans and reports, and a survey completed by over 400 residents over the age of 50.

Within each domain, a vision statement for the future of an Age-Friendly Salem is described, followed by a series of recommendations, and corresponding specific action steps that should be taken. Following approval of the final report a permanent community stakeholders group formed to monitor implementation of the plan, evaluate its effectiveness, and update it as necessary. This funding makes the first year of that work possible.



The overtime budget currently stands at -\$216.82 (Org: 15101, Object: 5131). The budget has been exhausted due to increased overtime for the inspectional staff. There is a marked increase in the number of temporary events on weekends. We anticipate that there will be events every weekend, and with six and a half months to go in FY2018 we anticipate overtime costs to rise by \$2,000.00.

The Department overtime costs were typically related to haunted happenings and a few summer events and health fairs. The increase in pop-up activity as Salem increases its visibility as a food destination and the department's mandate to ensure that the public's health is protected at the temporary events; I would be grateful if the line can be increased by another \$2,00.00, to cover the rest of FY2018.

Again, I will be grateful if we can have an increase in this line to cover this much needed service.

In accordance with Chapter 32, Article 5, Section 32-121 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Salem, the Salem Police Department respectfully requests authority to install video surveillance cameras at the following four (4) locations:

In and around Mary Jane Lee Park (Prince St., Palmer St., & Salem St.) allowing the Department to monitor the park to deter, detect and document criminal activity in the park and respond accordingly. Funding for this project is available through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and the Police Department budget.

In and around Pickering and Central Wharfs (160 Derby St.) allowing the Department the ability to monitor the large crowds, especially during special events (i.e. July 4th, Halloween, festivals and road races), the Salem Harbor and maritime approaches. This project is fully funded from the 2015 Port Security Grant.

Installation of an additional camera at Remond Park (1 Bridge St.) allowing the Department the ability to monitor the Salem Channel, the Salem/Beverly Bridge and the adjacent park area. This project is also fully funded through the 2015 Port Security Grant.

Installation of a camera at Proctor's Ledge (7 Pope St.) allowing the Department to monitor the memorial. This project will be funded from the Police Department budget.

Per the Ordinance, the above listed security cameras will record video feed only; audio recording will not be conducted. Additionally, public notice of the installation and operation of video cameras will be published on social media and through the installation of signage at the specific locations identified above.

It is my belief that installation of video surveillance cameras at the above listed locations will assist this Department in preventing criminal acts and should such acts occur, to take appropriate action.




