Resolution in Support of Access to Counsel in Eviction Cases and Eviction Sealing Appeals to Promote Housing Opportunity and Mobility

WHEREAS:

- Eviction case filings between January June 2023 in Housing Court statewide are surpassing the number of eviction filings pre-pandemic;
- Over 96% of tenants in the Commonwealth facing a non-payment eviction in Housing Court are unrepresented, while 90% of landlords are represented;
- Northeast Legal Aid (NLA) represents and advises Salem residents about their eviction cases, but the need is far greater than the funding for NLA permits, and many tenants are turned away;
- Most tenants are unaware of their rights and legal protections both in and out of the courtroom;
- Access to critical legal resources, guidance, and support from a legal advocate prior to an eviction proceeding can protect people from being displaced by an eviction, prevent homelessness, and create a path to housing stability;
- The following 'Access to Counsel' bills, entitled "An Act promoting access to counsel and housing stability in Massachusetts," have been refiled for the 2023 Legislative Session: S.864, which is before the Housing Committee, filed by Senator Sal N. DiDomenico and H.1731, which is before the Judiciary Committee, filed by Representatives David M. Rogers and Michael S. Day. Since 1988, over 1 million such eviction cases have been filed in Massachusetts and once filed become part of that tenant's eviction record, documenting the tenant's history of ever having sued or been sued by a landlord;

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR

- Regardless of outcome or underlying basis for a court filing, possessing any record of an eviction filing can affect a tenant's ability to secure housing, no matter how old the record is:
- In 2013, the Massachusetts Trial Court began placing eviction record information online, making a tenant's court record free and easily accessible,
- Landlords and tenant screening companies, routinely recommend rejections of tenants for having been in court, regardless of the outcome of the case or proof of clerical error; and
- Many landlords routinely file a notice to quit simply as a matter of course at the conclusion of a tenancy, and are unaware of the collateral consequences of eviction records or of the growing record of evictions they themselves are accumulating;
- Bills H. 1690 and S.956 'promoting housing opportunity and mobility through eviction sealing (HOMES),' sponsored by Representative Michael Moran and Senator Lydia Edwards respectively, are before the Judiciary Committee;
- These bills would protect tenants from being unfairly branded with an eviction record for life by allowing tenants to petition the court to seal their eviction records. .

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Salem hereby states its support of access to counsel in eviction proceedings and joins our state Senator Joan Lovely and Representative Manny Cruz who are co-sponsors, in supporting the acts establishing and ensuring those rights: S.864 and H.1731.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Salem also hereby supports with co-sponsors Senator Lydia Edwards and Representative Michael Moran S.956 and H.1690, the acts to promote housing opportunity and mobility through eviction sealing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Salem urges the Massachusetts State Legislature to enact pending "Access to Counsel" and "eviction sealing" legislation to ensure greater housing stability for Salem residents, and that a copy of this Resolution be sent by the City Clerk to Salem's State Representative and State Senator.

ORDERED: That the Committee on Ordinances, Licenses and Legal Affairs shall meet, prior to the first regular meeting of the City Council in September 2023, for the purpose of drafting, with the assistance of the Solicitor, DEI Director, Purchasing Agent and City Planner, a Wage Theft Ordinance to be filed with the Council for its first meeting in September. Wage theft, the improper withholding of payment from employees, impacts low income, immigrant, and limited English proficient workers who are most vulnerable. The Ordinance shall require City vendors to certify their compliance with federal and state wage laws, to report violations and provide a wage bond, and strengthen the City's ability to hire vendors that treat their employees fairly. It shall also prohibit City departments from contracting with debarred vendors and require that potential and current recipients of tax relief agreements and licenses issued under Massachusetts G.L. chapter 138 and chapter 140 comply with applicable wage laws.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:

Section 1. Section 75A – Parking prohibitions towing zone (October resident parking) of Article V-A is hereby amended by repealing the following Section A - Temporary October Resident Permit Parking:

Essex Street from Cambridge Street to Summer Street

And inserting the following:

Lynch Street from Congress Street to Perkins Street

Section 2. Section 75A – Parking prohibitions towing zone (October resident parking) of Article V-A is hereby amended by deleting the following:

Section D - Free Weekend Parking for Salem Residents. The Church Street West Lot and the City of Salem Lot at the MBTA Station shall be made available for use by Salem residents free of charge on weekends in October. Nonresidents seeking to park at the Church Street West Lot on weekends in October shall be charged a rate of \$30.00.

Second Passage of an Ordinance amending an Ordinance relative to traffic for Lafayette Street

In the year Two Thousand and Twenty-Three

An Ordinance Relative to Traffic

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:

Section 1. Section 51 of Article V is hereby amended by deleting the following in their entirety:

Lafayette Street – Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets – extending seventy (70) feet in a southerly direction from New Derby Street, westerly side. (4/24/79 DPW 3546)

Lafayette Street – Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets – extending sixty-five (65) feet in a northerly direction from New Derby Street, westerly side. (4/24/79 DPW 3546)

And inserting in place thereof the following:

Lafayette Street – Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets – extending fifty (50) feet in a southerly direction from New Derby Street, westerly side.

Lafayette Street – Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets – extending forty-five (45) feet in a northerly direction from New Derby Street, westerly side.

Section 2. Section 56 of Article V is hereby amended by deleting the following in their entirety:

Lafayette Street – Zones Established – westerly side from New Derby Street and Harbor Street (not including Handicap Zones or restricted areas), "Metered Zones Established", two (2) hour limit. (10/11/12)

And inserting in place thereof the following:

Church Street – Parking Meters Zones Established – southerly side, from a point beginning one-hundred and sixteen (116) feet easterly from Washington Street and extending easterly for a distance of forty (40) feet. Fifteen (15) minute limit.

Lafayette Street – Parking Meters Zones Established – westerly side from New Derby Street to Dodge Street. Two (2) hour limit.

Lafayette Street – Parking Meters Zones Established – westerly side from a point sixty-four (64) feet south of Dodge Street to Harbor Street. Two (2) hour limit.

<u>UNFINISHED BUSINESS</u>

Washington Street – Parking Meters Zones Established - easterly side, beginning from a point one-hundred and ten (110) feet south of Church Street and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of forty (40) feet. Fifteen (15) minute limit.

Washington Street - Parking Meters Zones Established - westerly side, beginning at a point 20 feet north of Lynde Street and extending in a northerly direction for a distance of forty (40) feet. Fifteen (15) minute limit.

Washington Street – Parking Meters Zones Established – easterly side, from a point fifty-five (55) feet south of Front Street, extending in a southerly direction for eighteen (18) feet (two (2) pull-in parking spaces), fifteen (15) minute parking limit.

Section 3. Section 57A of Article V is hereby amended by inserting the following:

Lafayette Street – Parking Time Limited: Unmetered Zones – westerly side, beginning at a point 20 feet south of Dodge Street and extending in a southerly direction for forty (40) feet. Fifteen (15) minute limit.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.
