

Resolved: Having convened in an open meeting on February 22, 2024, prior to the SOI submission closing date, the City Council of Salem, in accordance with its charter, by-laws, and ordinances, has voted to authorize the Superintendent to submit to the Massachusetts School Building Authority the Statement of Interest Form dated March 1, 2024 for the Bates Elementary School located at 53 Liberty Hill Avenue, Salem, MA 01970, which describes and explains the following deficiencies and the priority category(s) for which an application may be submitted to the Massachusetts School Building Authority in the future:

Priority 5. Replacement, renovation or modernization of school facility systems, such as roofs, windows, boilers, heating and ventilation systems, to increase energy conservation and decrease energy related costs in a school facility. The roof at the Bates Elementary School is over 25 years old and is in fair to poor condition with active leaks, ponding water due to insufficient slope drains and the EPDM patches, seams, and sealants are failing;

and hereby further specifically acknowledges that by submitting this Statement of Interest Form, the Massachusetts School Building Authority in no way guarantees the acceptance or the approval of an application, the awarding of a grant or any other funding commitment from the Massachusetts School Building Authority, or commits the City of Salem to filing an application for funding with the Massachusetts School Building Authority.

The enclosed Resolution authorizes the Salem Public Schools and the City to submit a Statement of Interest to the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) for the authority's Accelerated Repair Program (ARP). The City is seeking to advance a future capital project to replace the roof of the Bates Elementary School and the MSBA's ARP can provide partial reimbursement for projects of this nature.

At over 25 years of age, the roof at Bates is currently the oldest roof in the school district and is showing its age. It was recently evaluated as being in generally "fair to poor" condition, with failing patches, seals, and seams, substantial ponding from slope drains that are no longer aligned, and active leaks throughout.

The initial projection for this overall project cost is approximately \$2 million, but that number will be refined as it moves through the design and engineering phases. Before the project can proceed any further, however, we are hoping to enter the MSBA's ARP to leverage state support for this critical capital need to the greatest extent feasible. The deadline to enter this round of the ARP is March 1st, therefore we are asking the Council to vote on this Resolution at your meeting of February 22nd. I recommend adoption of the Resolution and invite you to contact Superintendent Zrike should you have any specific questions about this request.

The enclosed Order authorizes the City to enter into a 20-year agreement with Ameresco for the first capital projects we are proposing as a result of the company's investment grade audit of our municipal energy systems. Working with our Sustainability and Resiliency Department, School Department, and Finance Department capital projects team, Ameresco has developed a multi-phased set of capital projects to reduce the City's electrical and energy costs and help us better meet our sustainability goals.

For each project in the Ameresco study, the company will engage with the City in a long-term analysis of the cost savings and emissions reductions, to verify we are meeting these targets appropriately. The first projects proposed as part of this initiative are replacement of the system controls at the Witchcraft Heights Elementary School and Bates Elementary School, and the boilers at Bates. These projects will an estimated annual savings of \$75,000 on our utility costs and reduce our municipal greenhouse gas emissions by 220 metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent. The projects are being funded by a combination of federal grants (ESSER, IVAQ, and EECBG) and utility incentives. No City funds are being used for these important improvements. Ameresco's compensation for their monitoring services is deducted from the utility bill savings that are realized as a result of the project.

I recommend adoption of the enclosed Order and encourage passage of this matter no later than your meeting of March 14, 2024, in order for the time-limited federal grants to be fully utilized and the project to be carried out over the summer break when school is not in session. If you have additional questions about this request, please feel free to contact Sustainability and Resiliency Director Neal Duffy and Salem Public Schools Superintendent Stephen Zrike.

Please find below a City Council order authorizing Mayor Dominick Pangallo to enter into a 20-year agreement with Framingham-based Ameresco, an Energy Services Company, for HVAC improvements at the Bates and Witchcraft Heights Elementary School. The 20-year agreement ensures turnkey design, installation, commissioning, and a performance guarantee under which the energy savings resulting from the installed energy conservation projects will be guaranteed by Ameresco. As you may recall, on November 29, 2022, the City of Salem selected Ameresco to conduct an investment grade audit (IGA) of all City and School facilities, the results of which may lead to a comprehensive Energy Savings Performance Contract at multiple buildings beginning in FY25. The projects at Bates and Witchcraft Heights represent a limited scope on an accelerated timeframe to take advantage of grant and utility incentive funds that will not be available next year.

The projects include upgrading and enhancing the building controls systems in both buildings and replacing the boilers at the Bates Elementary school. The new expanded integrated controls will provide reliable control of the major HVAC infrastructure equipment and will facilitate the easy implementation of both occupied and unoccupied energy saving control strategies to this HVAC equipment infrastructure. Furthermore, the replacement of failed terminal heating unit controls will ensure reliable occupied control of the occupied spaces, ensuring occupant comfort can be reliably delivered while minimizing energy use of the equipment. Ameresco proposes installing high efficiency condensing hot water boilers to replace the existing units which are past their useful life and near failure. The boilers will supply heat to the facility using higher efficiency burner technology, and improved efficiency. In total, it is estimated that these projects will provide the city with an annual savings of \$75,000 and reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 220 MTCO₂e (about the equivalent of 27 homes).

The Salem Public Schools has authorized the use of \$1.35 million available in ESSER (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund) and IVAQ (Improving Ventilation and Air Quality) grant funds towards this project. Those funds need to be fully expended by the end of September 2024. Additionally, we plan to apply a \$76,000 EECBG (Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant) formula grant and approximately \$280,000 in National Grid incentives, some of which also expire in Fall, 2024, to the project. In short, no City funds will be expended for these needed improvements, and we need to initiate these projects as soon as possible so we can fully leverage available resources.

An Ordinance Relative to Traffic

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem, as follows:

Section 1. Section 29A of Article III be amended by inserting the following:

b) School Zones;

All school zones listed herein shall have a speed limit of 20 miles per hour between the hours of 7:30am and 8:30am and between 2:30pm and 3:30pm on days that school is in session or when children are otherwise present. The speed limit shall apply to all directions of travel.

1. Bridge Street – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Carlton Innovation School: From a point 40 feet south of Beacon Street to a point 30 feet north of Rice Street.
2. Essex Street – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Collins Middle School: From intersection with Jackson Street and Highland Avenue to a point 90 feet north of Dalton Parkway.
3. Fort Avenue – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Bentley Academy Charter School: From a point 40 feet west of Lee Fort Terrace to a point 90 feet east of Memorial Drive.
4. Frederick Street – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Witchcraft Heights Elementary School: From intersection with Belleview Avenue to school grounds.
5. Gables Circle – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone - For Witchcraft Heights Elementary School: From a point 120 feet west of Puritan Road to a point 120 feet east of Puritan Road.
6. Highland Avenue – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Collins Middle School: From a point 170 feet south of Powder House Lane to intersection with Essex Street and Jackson Street.
7. Jackson Street – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Collins Middle School: From intersection with Highland Avenue and Essex Street to intersection with Calabrese Street.
8. Lafayette Street – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Saltonstall School: From intersection with Fairfield Street and Leavitt Street to intersection with Lafayette Place.
9. Liberty Hill Avenue – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Bates Elementary School: From a point 400 feet north of Nursery Street to a point 400 feet west of Sargent Street.
10. Lynch Street – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Salem Academy Charter School: Lynch Street in its entirety.
11. Memorial Drive – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Bentley Academy Charter School: From the intersection with Larkin Street to a point 100 feet south of Victory Road.
12. Puritan Road – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Witchcraft Heights Elementary School: From intersection with Ord Street to intersection with Pioneer Circle, and from intersection with Gables Circle until intersection with Gallows Circle.

13. Salem Street – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Saltonstall School: From intersection with Chase Street to a point 310 feet north of Lafayette Place.
14. Szetela Lane – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Bentley Academy Charter School: From a point 90 feet north of Lee Fort Terrace to the intersection with Memorial Drive.
15. Willson Street – Reduced School Speed Limit Zone – For Salem High School and Horace Mann Elementary School: From intersection with Highland Avenue to a point 500 feet west of Old Road.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.

We saw this as an opportunity to formally adopt zones for several schools in the city, including the High School. During the June 14, 2023 Traffic & Parking Commission meeting, staff reviewed school locations and made recommendations on where school zones should be located, based on both State guidelines and existing signage. Mass. Gen. Laws Ch. 90, § 1

Establishes standard for speeding in a school zone as >20 mph



Mass. Gen. Laws Ch. 85, § 2

Allows towns to establish school zones given they meet state MUTCD standards
Exceptions include zones that include or intersect state roadways, zones with federally funded signage

School Zone Criteria in Mass. MUTCD (Updated 11/22)

For a school zone to be established, all the following conditions shall be met:

- A. The facility is a school (see Section 7A.01).
- B. Children walk or bicycle to or from the school and are expected to cross or enter the roadway where the school zone is proposed; or the school and related facilities (e.g., classrooms, cafeteria, gymnasium, playground, athletic fields, parking lots) are separated by the roadway and require the children to cross the roadway on foot to access the facilities.
- C. The school facility or municipality provides a plan showing the routes that students will use to walk and/or bike to the school and shows the limits of the proposed school zone.
- D. The municipality provides written documentation of their support and/or approval of the school zone.

School Zone Standards in Mass. MUTCD

- Beginning point should be at least 200 feet in advance of school grounds or school crossing
- In a special speed zone, beginning point should be at least 500 feet or one block (whichever is less) in advance of school grounds or school crossing
- Maximum length should be a quarter-mile (unless the minimum standards above are greater when including school frontage)

School Zone Signage Standards in Mass. MUTCD

- Speed limit shall be 20 M.P.H.
- No other speed limit signs shall be placed between school zone sign and school speed array
- Downstream end posted with "End School Speed Limit" sign

Pleasant Street – Parking Prohibited at Certain Times on Certain Streets - on the easterly side, beginning thirty-eight (38) feet from the intersection of Pleasant Street and Webb Street and proceeding southerly for a distance of one hundred twenty-five (125) feet. Fifteen (15) minute parking limit. (4/13/87)

Section 2. Section 57A of Article V be amended by repealing the following:

Pleasant Street – Parking Time Limited: Unmetered Zones - easterly side, starting at a point fifty-nine (59) feet from the intersection of Bridge Street in a southerly direction for a distance of eighty-four (84) feet. Two hour parking. (12/5/80 DPW 5-1905)

And inserting the following:

Pleasant Street – Parking Time Limited: Unmetered Zones - easterly side, beginning forty-five (45) feet south of the intersection with Bridge Street and extending in a southerly direction for fifty (50) feet, thirty (30) minute parking limit, Monday through Sunday, 8:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect as provided by City Charter.
