Poles shall be of sound timber, and reasonable straight, and shall be set substantially at the
points indicated upon the plan marked – Ferry St and Waite St - Salem – Massachusetts.

There may be attached to said poles by Massachusetts Electric Company d/b/a National Grid and Verizon New England Inc. such wires, cables, and fixtures as needed in their business and all of said wires and cables shall be placed at a height of not less than twenty (20) feet from the ground.

The following are the public ways or part of ways along which the poles above referred to may be erected, and the number of poles which may be erected thereon under this order:

Ferry St and Waite St - National Grid to install 2 JO Poles (1) on Ferry St and (1) on Waite St and relocate 1 JO Pole on Ferry St beginning at a point approximately 100 feet SE of the centerline of the intersection of Bridge St and continuing approximately 150 feet in a SE direction. National Grid to install 2 new JO Poles, 1 on Ferry St and 1 on Waite St and the relocation of 1 pole approximately 10' feet.

Also for permission to lay and maintain underground laterals, cables, and wires in the above or intersecting public ways for the purpose of making connections with such poles and buildings as each of said petitioners may desire for distributing purposes.

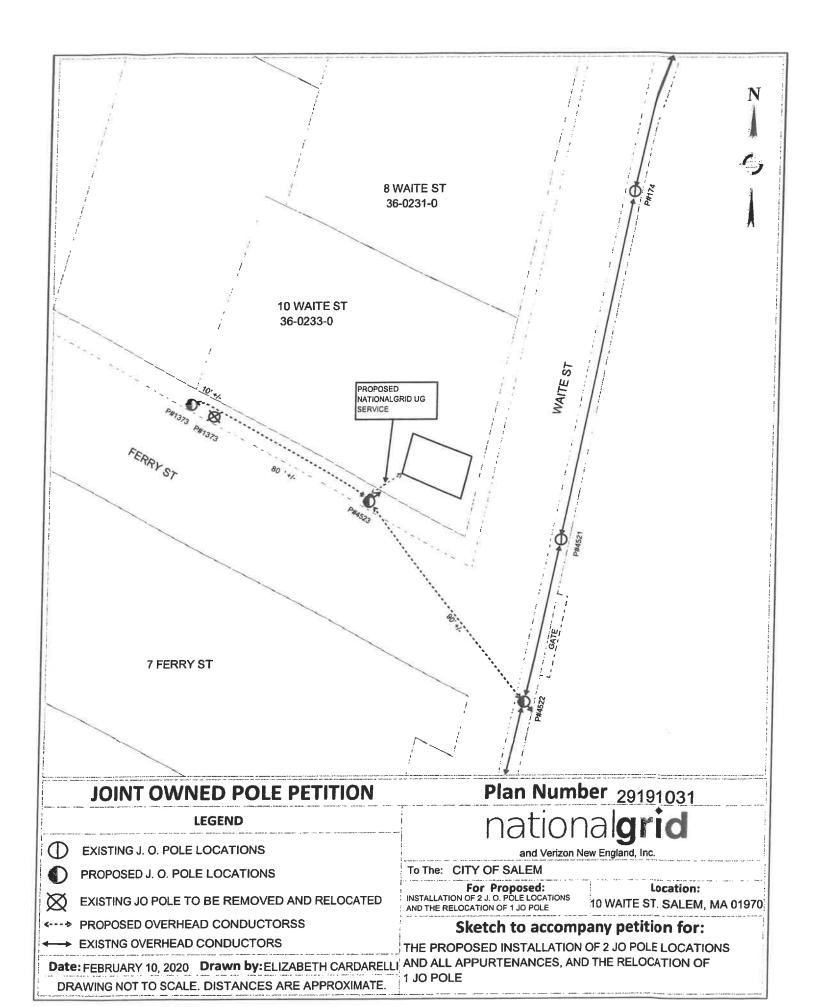

That permission be and hereby is granted to Comcast Cable Communications Management LCC., to lay and maintain underground conduits, manholes and poles, with the wires and cables to be placed therein, under and above the surface of the following public way or ways as requested in petition of said Company dated October 15,2020

Bridge Street: Locating the existing Comcast Conduit and excavating to place a 3'x3' manhole over the existing Comcast Conduit. From the newly placed manhole excavating to place (2) 4"PVC Conduits 103'+/_ to a proposed 2'x 3' vault on Osgood Street. Continuing with the excavation in a Northerly direction from the newly placed manhole. To install (2) 4" PVC Conduits 355'+/_ to a 3'x3' Manhole on Ferry Street and continuing to the Utility Pole 1373.

Ferry Street: Excavating to place (1) 4" PVC conduit 88'+/- to number 36 Bridge Street.

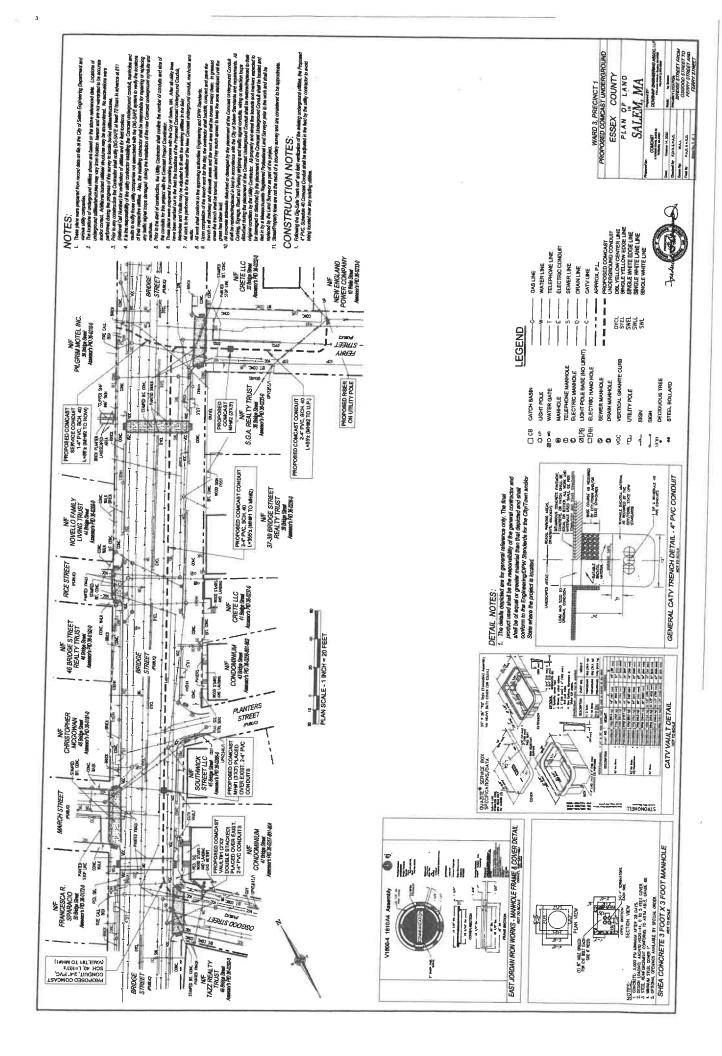

Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

As you are aware, at the beginning of the fiscal year we approve a budget for the Witch House, Golf Course, and Harbormaster operations that ensures these facilities are fully funded. Each of these departments collect revenues, which we then utilize when setting the tax rate. We typically "sweep" our receipts reserved accounts and apply those revenues to help keep the tax increase as low as possible.

Enclosed herewith are requests to transfer the sum of \$975,000 from receipts reserved to be applied to reduce the gross amount to be raised by taxation for Fiscal Year 2021. \$175,000 is derived from Witch House revenues, \$600,000 from the golf course, and \$200,000 from Harbormaster receipts.

These appropriations will help reduce the amount raised by taxation, pending adoption of the recommended tax rate by the City Council. I recommend passage of the accompanying Order so we can continue to work to keep taxes as manageable as possible for our residents.

Enclosed is an Order to accept the provisions of Section 4, Chapter 73, of the Acts of 1986 for Fiscal Year 2021.

The section of state law allows for additional tax exemptions to be granted to widows, elderly, veterans, and blind property owners. In accordance with this section of the special acts, acceptance by the local appropriation authority is required each year in order to maintain these exemptions for the qualifying eligible groups.

Salem has accepted these exemptions every year since FY2009 and in that time period we have enabled about 3,500 exemptions to be claimed by veterans, widows, and certain elderly and disabled residents. Those exemptions have resulted in these most needy of our population saving around \$3 million on their tax bills.

I strongly recommend adoption of the attached Order so that we may continue to provide the maximum benefit allowable under state law for our residents who are most in need.

Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

Each year the City Council must vote to set the residential tax factor and thereby set the tax rate for the fiscal year. In Massachusetts, Proposition 2 ½ caps new property taxes at no more than 2.5% of the previous year's levy. This year, the tax rate – \$13.80 for residential and \$27.60 for commercial – is once again under the City's allowable levy limit, with excess levy capacity of approximately \$4.6 million dollars remaining, validating our City's responsible approach to budgeting and managing public finances. We continue to maintain a generally low tax bill increase over time, as well, with the average increase over the last 10 years for the average single-family taxpayer in Salem coming in at a reasonable 3.1% or \$160 per year.

Based on the rates above, the change in the average single-family tax bill will be \$144 (2.42%), the average condominium unit change will be \$0 (0%), the average two-family change will be \$102 per unit (3.08%), the average three-family change will be \$179 per unit (7.33%). As you may recall, average percentage increases do change from year to year within residential categories and the residential tax rate is the same regardless of the type of residential property within this classification. Increases vary based on valuation and growth increases year to year, which is driven by market price fluctuations approximately 12-18 months prior. Given the range of commercial properties in Salem, from small shops to hotels to large office complexes, it is hard to identify a truly "average commercial property," however the average commercial property increase is estimated at 3.21%. Appropriation orders submitted separately applies receipts reserved and free cash to help hold down the increase in property taxes, reducing the total amount raised by taxation and saving Salem property owners from an additional \$1.475 million in taxes to be collected.

Despite an active housing market increasing values and despite increases in fixed costs for delivering local services this fiscal year, we have managed to keep tax increases relatively low. The reason for this is simple: growth matters. As we grow our tax base, we have been able to

successfully distribute the burden of funding critical local services to more taxpayers, alleviating the burden on existing property owners. This is why – in addition to the housing need and the desire to great good, local jobs – it is so very important we consider new growth opportunities with an open mind and strategic approach. We cannot cut our way to stabilized taxes or better services; we can, however, broaden the size of the base that funds our local government, thereby stabilizing taxes and improving services. FY2021 once again demonstrates that exact strategy at work.

We always strive to manage the overall tax burden on our City's homeowners and I am proud that we have never needed or sought a Proposition 2½ override. We seek efficiencies and opportunities for regionalization or streamlining. We look to technology and performance improvement strategies to reduce the cost of doing business. We shift the cost of government off property taxpayers by pursuing a substantial number of grant opportunities and by looking to tax options that shift those costs to visitors when possible by supporting the development of new hotels, the extension of lodging taxes to short-term rentals, and the responsible growth of the recreational cannabis industry.

The most powerful tool at our disposal, however, is responsible, sensible private development that adds to our tax base. Therefore, we have advocated for the appropriate redevelopment of sites such as the former courthouses, the vacant power plant property, and other under-utilized and vacant former industrial parcels. I am extremely pleased that certified new growth this fiscal year is \$1.6 million, which is of significant assistance as we work together to provide much needed services in the areas of public safety, schools and public services, at a reasonable cost to property owners.

We have also been extremely pro-active in pursuing grant opportunities whenever they become available. Since the start of my administration in 2006 we have successfully received over \$150 million in state and federal grants. Just about one-fifth of our revenues is aid from the state, and we still rely on and require a strong state partnership to make much needed infrastructure investments. We also work to have meaningful partnerships with our anchor institutions and non-profits, including our tax agreement and CBA with Footprint, investments in our schools and neighborhoods from SSU, expanded community support from NSMC, and our ongoing push for a nearly two decades' over-due adjustment in our SESD PILOT.

One of the biggest challenges we continue to face is pressure from reductions in revenues and increases in fixed costs. Fixed costs for FY2021, such as state charges, health insurance costs, Medicare, worker's compensation, debt payments, and municipal insurance, increased by \$1.6 million over last year. As you might recall, the FY2021 budget we filed included \$1.4 million in cuts due to the uncertainty of the economy this past spring.

When it comes to non-tax revenues, local aid for FY2021 was level funded by the state, and, as you may be aware, we have seen considerable reductions in our hotel and meals excise revenues and parking receipts, due to the pandemic's economic impacts. While growth and cannabis excise are up, collectively our parking, meals, and hotel receipts for the first quarter of FY2021 were down by 35%, meaning we took in close to \$845,000 less that quarter than we did in the same quarter of FY2020.

As we set our tax rate for the current fiscal year, the recommendation is to set the residential factor at .849947 and CIP split to 1.7.

The vision for our City laid out in our annual budget, and continued with this tax proposal, reflects our collective desire to keep Salem a vibrant, thriving community that delivers quality public services in as efficient and affordable a manner as possible. When I took office, we faced a \$3.5 million deficit. We spent all our savings just to keep the lights on and were forced to borrow money to pay normal operating expenses. We have worked collaboratively over the years to eliminate prior deficits, improve city finances, and balance our books with an eye on both the needs of today and our aspirations for the future. It has not always been easy. Just as we emerged from those local fiscal trials in 2007 our national economy spiraled into a recession and, just as we were building back from that crisis the current pandemic brought a sharp decline in our economy.

But whatever the cause of our challenges, we weathered them and are today still resiliently positioned for success, with strong growth, a declining unemployment rate, still record bond ratings, and award-winning balanced budgets. Our City's bond rating from Standard & Poor's was upgraded seven years ago to AA, the highest in the City's history. In their most recent ratings report the agency cited our financial stability and conservative budgeting practices in affirming that strong rating. This is validation that Salem's fiscal policies are of the highest standard and that the path we have set for ourselves is the correct one for our community.

I am grateful for our partnership in securing a healthy municipal fiscal environment and recommend adoption of the proposed residential factor which will enable us to finalize property tax rates for this fiscal year.

During the FY2021 budget process we indicated that we would return to the City Council to request changes to the appropriations for certain budget areas as the City had additional clarity around local aid and receipts.

Now that we are about five months into the fiscal year and the level of these revenue sources are more clear, we are requesting additional appropriations to fill several public safety positions that had previously been held un-filled in the summer due to the uncertainty around the budget. The enclosed Order adjusts the appropriations for FY2021 for the Fire Department personnel budget by \$128,511.78 to account for filling four vacant positions.

Appropriating the funds requested here will allow these positions to be posted and, hopefully, filled. These positions existed in the FY2020 budget and therefore this request does not represent a net increase in personnel, just an increase in personnel expenses to be able to fill these important positions for the remainder of this fiscal year.

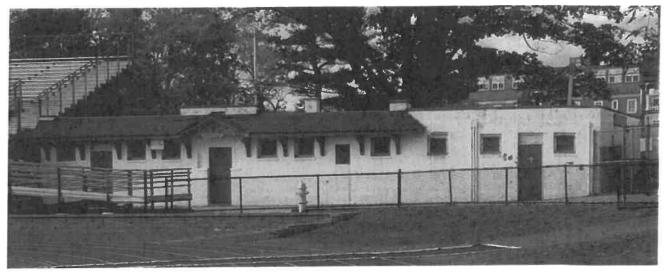

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The City of Salem requested funding to demolish the existing field house and build an accessible and sustainable field house, amenities building, press box, and concessions building, along with upgraded entrances and utilities to Bertram Field. The initial request was for a \$2.5 million bond repayment over 15-20 years under the Community Preservation Act M.G.L. Chapter 44, B, toward the approximately \$6 million project, with CIP bonds and donations covering the remainder.

The project is needed because the existing field house is beyond repair, does not meet code, and it continues to be a liability. The buildings currently are beyond maintenance: paint peels off, the boiler is down, the roof is leaking, the concrete is crumbling, and the sewer lines are broken. The current facility was designed for all male teams and lacks adequate accessibility. The current facility does not support girls' teams, transgender, or families with needs. If the current facility closes, then temporary facilities will need to be brought in, or other arrangements made. Without a locker and amenities building, the field cannot be used for games, band camp, and practices would be limited to times when a restroom would not be needed.

This facility serves tens of thousands of residents and visitors, including athletes, students, coaches, parents, volunteers, and neighbors. It supports football, soccer, lacrosse, track and field, for the schools, as well as the community youth groups. This field holds important functions for the City, and brings the City together. It is Salem's only adult regulation football, soccer, or lacrosse field. It is the only track and field facility. There are over 250 games and practices there a year. The facility serves the entire City and can also host games and tournaments for the region. It is also used for walkers and joggers.

The proposal is for the existing buildings to be removed, and a modern amenities building and a new locker facility building to be built. There will be storage integrated into the facilities. The new restrooms will be gender equal, and there will be a family restroom for all visitors that will be heated. The buildings will be accessible and directly on grade. All bathrooms will have a handicapped stall. New accessible parking will be provided. The parking area, entrance, and circulation around the facility will be improved to increase accessibility and create bicycle and pedestrian access and bring in better walking/cycling opportunities for the neighborhood. All of these new facilities will meet modern code, be LEED and sustainable, and fully updated. Security cameras will be integrated into the project.

New buildings will show our residents, visitors, and neighbors that we care for our youth, our students, and our teams. The project will promote team recreation and neighborhood walking and jogging. It will provide improved bicycle and pedestrian access to the Bertram Field and the Collins Middle School. These connect Jefferson area and Highland area. The new facility will provide opportunities for regional games and tournaments, which will bring visitors to our City.

Included were letters of support by Mayor Kimberley Driscoll, Fire Chief John Giunta, Ron Miano of Salem Youth Football & Cheering, Simeen Brown and Andrew Douglass. Also submitting was Scott Connolly, Salem Public Schools' Director of Athletics with a petition of support with 211 signatures.

We are fortunate to be assisted in this effort by the North Shore-based firms Ryan Strategic Group and John Guilfoil Public Relations, who have extensive experience in conducting police chief and other executive level search and assessment projects, including for the Cities of Revere, Lowell, and Taunton and the Towns of Andover, Arlington, and Winthrop, among others.

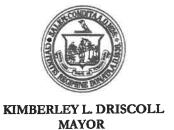

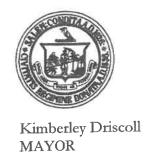

Ordered: That the sum of Sixteen Million One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$16,100,000) is hereby appropriated to pay costs of a signature parks improvement program that includes one or more of the following types of capital improvements at Forest River Park, Salem Willows, Salem Common, Pioneer Village, Winter Island, and Palmer Cove and any costs incidental and related thereto: (a) construction, reconstruction and/or relocation of, and extraordinary repairs and improvements to, buildings, structures, recreational facilities and landscape infrastructure, (b) construction and reconstruction of, and improvements to, roadways, sidewalks and pathways, and (c) acquisition and installation of lighting, fencing, benches, signage and other equipment; that to meet this appropriation, the Treasurer, with the approval of the Mayor, is authorized to borrow said amount under and pursuant to Chapter 44, Section 7(1) of the General Laws, or pursuant to any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the City therefor; that the Mayor is authorized to apply for, accept and expend any grants, donations or other aid to pay additional costs of the signature parks improvement program; that the Mayor is authorized to take any action necessary to carry out the signature parks improvement program; and that any premium received by the City upon the sale of any bonds or notes approved by this order, less any such premium applied to the payment of the costs of issuance of such bonds or notes, may be applied to the payment of costs approved by this order in accordance with Chapter 44, Section 20 of the General Laws, thereby reducing the amount authorized to be borrowed to pay such costs by a like amount.

Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

Enclosed please find a bond Order authorizing up to \$16.1 million in borrowing in order to carry out the City's Signature Parks Initiative over the next six years. Accompanying the Order and this letter you will also find an FAQ, a copy of a presentation summarizing the initiative, and the bond schedule. As you know, a bond authorization allows the City to incur future debt to carry out these projects, however the full \$16.1 million is not borrowed all at once, but is instead spread out over years as needed to implement the work on the planned schedule.

As has been discussed for the last few years, the Signature Parks Initiative is a key component of our community's quadricentennial planning, for when Salem turns 400 years old in 2026. This initiative is focused on planning and carrying out improvements and preservation work in six of Salem's busies and most beloved public parks and open spaces, ensuring they will remain available and enjoyable for future generations to come: Forest River Park, Palmer Cove Park, Pioneer Village, Salem Common, Salem Willows, and Winter Island.

The work to plan for these improvements has been carried out, in most cases, over the last several years through extensive engagement with neighbors, park users, and other stakeholders. These signature spaces serve the neighborhoods in which they are located, but also the entire Salem community and beyond, providing recreational, cultural, and aesthetic value to the City. In many respects, these spaces show their age and how well-loved they have been by generations of Salem residents. The Salem Signature Parks Initiative will implement the designed improvements, preserve historic features, upgrade spaces to address climate change, and expand access and creative use of the parks. The planning for each space also provides for sustainable revenues, to provide for the on-going maintenance and care of the spaces after the projects are complete.

While the bond authorization is \$16.1 million, the full cost of these projects is estimated to be closer to \$30.43 million. The remainder of the funds needed to carry out the work, \$14.33

million in all, consists of existing funds (\$6.68 million) and future anticipated grants, donations, and one-time revenue sources (\$7.65 million).

We are not only advancing this request now because 2026 is rapidly approaching, but also because we currently can borrow at a historically low interest rate, most likely under 2.0%. That interest rate, combined with our historically strong bond rating, means we now could fund these projects at a considerable savings. Deferring this authorization to a future year would be financially irresponsible, as it would mean borrowing when interest rates will almost certainly be much higher and additionally result in an increase in the cost of construction, which escalates over time.

Financially, we believe Salem is strongly situated to take on this debt, which will be spread out over the next several years as the funding is needed for each project. In their most recent ratings report, Standard and Poor's specifically lauded the City's debt liability and "low overall net debt" levels. This is a continuation of our fiscally responsible practices and policies that have, since 2006, resulted in the share of our City budget that is our annual debt payment being reduced by a third. Enclosed in this package you will find the bond schedule for this authorization, as well as a listing of the City's existing debt and when it will be coming off the books, to illustrate our debt capacity level and how this authorization is compatible with our long-range capital plans.

Because the City Council only has one further meeting in 2020 and bond Orders require two passages, we are asking that the Council consider granting first passage at this evening's meeting as a provisional matter only, to allow for the possibility that second passage could take place at your only meeting in December. We recommend that, after first passage, the matter be referred to the Committee on Administration and Finance, for a meeting on the request to take place between now and your December 3rd regular City Council meeting.

Salem Signature Parks Frequently Asked Questions November 19, 2020

Projects

• Why are we doing these projects now?

These are all necessary improvements to existing facilities that are identified in larger capital plans or studies. Each of these facilities needs capital investment to ensure its use and enjoyment over the next few decades. Over the years, our parks have seen increased use and, as a result, increased needs. These parks are much loved but need important upgrades to ensure they are around for future generations to enjoy. Authorizing these funds will allow the six signature parks projects to advance on a timetable that will enable them to be completed by 2026, Salem's 400th anniversary. Interest rates are at historic lows and the City's bond rating is at its strongest, meaning these funds can be borrowed now at far less cost than they may be in the future, especially as deferred construction costs will only increase with time.

• Are we only doing these because the City hasn't invested in maintenance of these parks?

No, all these parks have enjoyed both regular maintenance and smaller capital investments in the past. These projects are not a replacement for those routine more routine efforts but are rather instead major upgrades intended to address larger needs including accessibility, climate change resiliency, historic preservation, and other major improvements that will extend their lifespans substantially. In this case, these are large capital investments needed because the park infrastructure is beyond its useful life or close to it, regardless of the level of past maintenance. All of the projects are designed to support ongoing maintenance in the future, to ensure these improvements are able to be enjoyed by Salem residents for decades to come.

• Are the improvements for these parks already designed? Who decided what went into them?

In some of these cases, the projects have been designed over the past few years through public, transparent processes that involved stakeholder groups that consisted of park users, City officials, neighborhood associations, and others. In the typical process, design concepts were developed through a public input and engagement process that relied on those community stakeholders to provide feedback to a project consultant. The designed plans are then turned into engineering and construction drawings, which are then subsequently bid for construction, based on the availability of funding, which this effort would provide. Each project is in various phases of this process.

- Forest River Park is designed and in final construction document stage.
- The larger project at Willows is in final design stage, but other smaller improvements, such as additional paths, building improvements, etc. have just been identified but not prioritized or designed.
- On the Common, the bandstand and fence components of the project are designed and only need final design and construction documents. Other improvements that are considered such as walkways, landscaping, curb cuts, playground work, and others have been identified, but not designed.

- For Pioneer Village/Camp Naumkeag, a feasibility study has been completed and the initial study/design started this Fall.
- The Palmer Cove Park design process is completed, and construction of Phase 1 is close to ready to commence.
- With Winter Island, studies have identified potential improvements, but no design has started.

When will the projects be completed?

- Forest River Park Summer 2021
- Willows Hill area, parking, and tennis courts Summer 2021 (some plantings will require another season). Other improvements (accessible upgrades to buildings, tree plantings, path restoration, other improvements) will be ongoing through 2025.
- Palmer Cove Phase 1 (community gardens, harbor walk, basketball court) in 2022, Phase 2 (placemaking) in 2023, and Phase 3 (athletics fields, walkways and entry points) in 2025.
- Common Bandstand Phase 2 restoration including windows, masonry, electrical, etc. Spring 2022. Next phase of fence 2024-2025. Other landscape and hardscape improvements ongoing through 2025.
- Pioneer Village Site layout and plantings and moving or rebuilding existing
 Pioneer Village structures Summer 2022. Phase 2: New Visitor Center Spring 2026.
- Winter Island Start work in 2022 and finish work by Summer 2026. The phasing would depend upon the priority of elements within the overall project.
- Will these projects include accessibility upgrades? Climate change resiliency? Yes, each project was intentionally designed to address accessibility problems at the parks, many of which were identified through the City's ADA Transition Plan, but others that were found before that plan was conducted. They also include climate resiliency and flood inundation measures, which are essential and required as many of these projects are coastal or close to the shore.
- Do the projects include plans for ongoing maintenance and operations? Yes, the project plans include opportunities for sustainable revenue generation that can be used to provide ongoing funding for maintenance and operations. In addition, with the completion of each project, the City's Capital Projects team will ensure a maintenance plan and schedule is provided to the responsible department, incorporated into the City's capital assets management system, and accounted for in future budgets.

Financing

• How much does this add to our City's debt? Do we have existing debt coming off the books?

This bond authorization is for \$16.1 million over 28 years. Since this initiative is a multiyear project, the \$16.1 million will not be borrowed at the outset of the authorization, but in increments over six years. The total debt with interest, is projected to be approximately \$25.4 million through FY2056. This borrowing will add approximately \$900,000 per year to the annual debt payment schedule, but the existing annual debt payments will decrease by approximately \$2.4 million by the end of FY2027.

• How much will those debt payments increase my tax bill?

It's impossible to estimate precisely how this debt will impact individual taxpayers for a few reasons. First, it's possible that the park-generated revenues will also help offset the bond costs to some extent. In those cases, users will help fund some of the debt, reducing the burden on taxpayers. Second, because taxes reflect home values as well as the cost of government, and it's not possible to predict what future values may be, it's likewise not possible to estimate what a future tax bill might be. In all, Salem has reduced the total share of the City budget that is its annual debt payment by one-third since 2006, however.

• Are there any non-tax revenues that can be used to pay the debt?

Yes, it's possible that park-generated revenues may be able to be used toward the debt payments for these bonds. Those revenues might include parking fees, pool memberships, room rentals, gift shop and ticket revenues, and more.

• Why not wait until the economy has improved and the City budget is in a better position before taking this on?

Salem has the best bond rating in its history now, and interest rates are at a near record low. Taken together, that means the City can borrow money now at possibly the lowest cost than it ever will again for quite some time. When that is combined with the fact that construction costs escalate over time and the City's annual debt payments of existing debt over the next six years will be reduced by \$2.4 million, it makes it apparent that now is an opportune and financially responsible time to take on this work.

• What happens if costs increase and the bonds aren't enough to pay for the projects to be finished?

The intention for each project is to bring in additional funding through grants and even private donations to meet some of the anticipated costs. Most of the projects are designed to be scalable, so costs can be reduced by forgoing certain improvements if costs increase dramatically or if other revenue sources are not able to be secured. In addition, in the future, if the cost of any of project increases, future City Councils could act to increase the bond authorization.

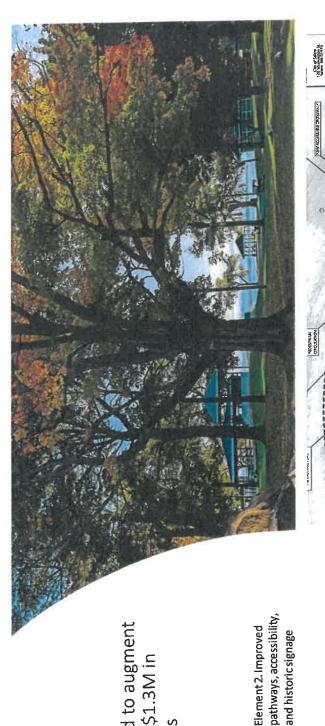

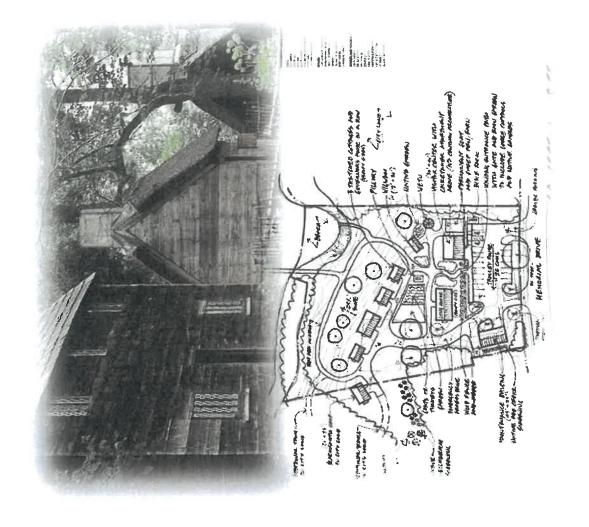

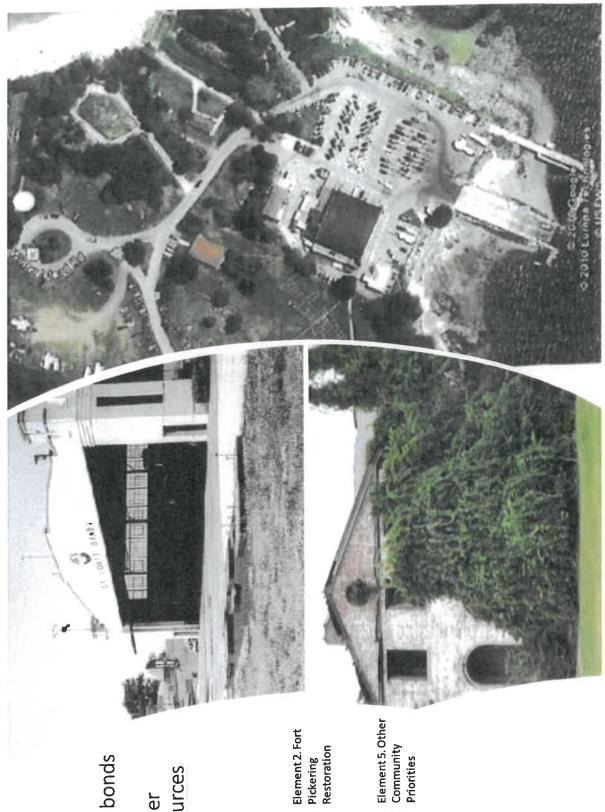
