Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

The enclosed Order transfers \$246,427.18 from Free Cash to the Transportation Enhancement Fund (TEF). This represents the amount for this fiscal year to date contributed by marijuana establishments pursuant to their current community host agreements intended for supporting transportation mitigation and alternative transportation modes. Pursuant to state law, these contributions are collected as general fund revenues and must therefore be appropriated by vote to the intended fund.

The TEF is supported by a variety of sources, including these contributions, payments from developer agreements, and the City's share of transportation network fees collected by the Commonwealth. TEF funds are used to support a number of valuable City programs including Salem Skipper, Blue Bikes bike share, and the new Getaround Salem car share program.

As these funds are provided to the City expressly for this purpose within our current agreements, this transfer is simply a housekeeping measure to place the funds into the appropriate account for these purposes. Dear Honorable Mayor Driscoll:

Enclosed herewith is a request to transfer \$246,427.18 from Free Cash to the Transportation Enhancement Fund (TEF). This amount represents the 1% of gross recreational marijuana sales paid to date in FY2022 to the city of Salem from marijuana retail establishments pursuant to the Cannabis Host Agreements (CBAs), that have not yet transferred to the TEF. As set forth in those CBAs, the 1% in gross sales is to be transferred to the TEF to support transportation initiatives in Salem. To date, funds in the TEF have predominantly supported the Salem Skipper service.

The CBAs require recreational marijuana establishments to annually submit payments to the city within 30 days of 12/31 and 6/30 for recreational sales from the preceding six months. Because Salem has already set its "tax recap" for FY2022, under municipal finance law, we cannot simply appropriate and transfer the 1% amount from the General Fund to the TEF when the payments arrive after 12/31. The amount must be moved from what is known as "Other Available Funds." Thus, this transfer request would move the amount from Free Cash to the TEF. Once we close out FY2022, the amount collected in the General Fund for the 1% of gross recreational marijuana sales will close out to Free Cash, which will thus replenish the amount transferred herein from Free Cash due to the timing dynamic for this transfer.

As you know, in 1996, the City Council voted by Council Order to accept a large number of streets, but did not take the proper steps to legally accept certain streets shown on the Order. One such street is Restaurant Row, a way within the Salem Willows Park.

The acceptance of Restaurant Row did not follow the required process for street acceptance as provided in City Ordinance at Chapter 38, Sections 51 through 57 and 91 and Massachusetts General Law Chapter 82. The City Council record indicates that the Council failed to take any of the steps, as shown on the attached Street Acceptance Procedure Summary, when accepting this street.

Recently, a request was made to rename this way and it was discovered the Row was not properly accepted as a public street and that it is entirely within the grounds of the Willows Park. After speaking with the Ward Councilor, Robert McCarthy, I respectfully submit the enclosed Order to remove Restaurant Row from the list of accepted City streets.

## **STREET ACCEPTANCE PROCEDURE SUMMARY**

- The city council may with approval of the city solicitor lay out a street. City Ordinance Section 38-51.
- At least seven days prior to the laying out of a street, the city council must provide written notice of its intention to lay out the street. Such notice must be left at the dwelling house of owners of land over which such street is proposed to be laid out. Further, the notice shall specify the time and place appointed by the city council for a meeting for all interested parties who wish to be heard regarding the proposed laying out of the street. City Ordinance Section 38-52.
- The notice in Section 38-52 may not be issued until a detailed plan of the proposed laying out...drawn by a competent engineer has been filed in the office of the city clerk. City Ordinance Section 38-53. Further, such plan shall show the present length, width, lines and grade of the street to be laid out; the abutting lands, with the fences and buildings thereon, and the length of frontage of each estate; the lands to be taken and the names of the owners of such lands; and also showing in red ink the proposed lines and grade of such street. City Ordinance Section 38-91.
- The city council shall hold a hearing for all parties who wish to be heard regarding the proposed laying out. If the city council, in its judgment, deems that the common convenience and benefit of the city inhabitants requires such street to be laid out, it may proceed to lay out such street and shall fix the boundaries and measurement of the street and determine what damages, if any, are sustained by any person in his property by the laying out of such street; shall determine the amount of compensation such person shall receive; shall specify the manner in which such laying out shall be completed; and shall determine the time allowed the owner of the land through which street may pass to take off trees, fences and other property that may obstruct the building of such street. City Ordinance Section 38-55.
- All costs, including the engineer's plan, are paid by the developer or proponent.

That a petition to the General Court, accompanied by a bill as set forth below, be filed with an attested copy of this Order be, and hereby is, approved under Clause (1) of Section 8 of Article 2, as amended, of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, to the end that the following legislation be adopted, except for amendments by the Senate or House of Representatives which conform to intent of this home rule petition:

### AN ACT RELATIVE TO BIDDING REQUIREMENTS FOR A CERTAIN AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECT IN THE CITY OF SALEM

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:*

SECTION 1. Construction and development activity related to redevelopment by the Salem Housing Authority of the state-funded public housing project known as Lee Fort Terrace, at 1 Lee Fort Terrace and 2 Lee Fort Terrace in the City of Salem or any part thereof, shall not be subject to any general or special law related to the procurement and award of contracts for the planning, design, construction management, construction, reconstruction, installation, demolition, maintenance or repair of buildings by a public agency but shall be subject to sections 26 to 27H, inclusive, of chapter 149 of the General Laws. Contracts for the construction, reconstruction, alteration, remodeling or repair of any publicly-owned public works that service this project and that would otherwise be subject to section 39M of chapter 30 of the General Laws shall be subject to said section 39M if the redevelopment of the project is funded in part by a state or federal low-income housing tax credit, grant, or loan or pursuant to the issuance of tax-exempt bonds authorized by general law. A conveyance of the project, whether by leasehold or fee estate, shall be subject to chapter 30B of the General Laws to the extent that the project is conveyed to an entity that is not owned, controlled or managed by the Salem housing authority on the date of the conveyance. Subject to compliance with the requirements of chapter 30B, the project may be conveyed to and may be owned, maintained and operated by an entity that is not owned, controlled or managed by the Salem housing authority; provided, that such entity enters into a binding legal contract and land use restriction with the Salem housing authority and with the department of housing and community development that requires such entity to preserve or construct the required portion of public housing units and operate such units subject to compliance with chapter 121B of the General Laws and 760 CMR 4.00 et seq., 5.00 et seq. and 6.00 et seq. in the same manner and to the same effect as if such entity were a housing authority, subject to such regulatory waivers given by the department of housing and community development as may be necessary to secure financing.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

The Board of the Salem Housing Authority (SHA) hereby requests that the Salem City Council approve and adopt the submitted Home Rule Petition related to the redevelopment of the Leefort Terrace state public housing site at 1 and 2 Lee Fort Terrace. As you are aware, SHA is working with its chosen development partner, Beacon Communities, to convert the existing 50 units serving elderly and disabled households, which are functionally obsolete and at risk of total loss due to flooding, into a new 124- unit permanently affordable, climate resilient, Passive House certified, all-electric intergenerational community.

In order to expedite the redevelopment process without undue financial burden, we are submitting the enclosed Home Rule Petition. The Petition will allow the construction and development activity to not be subject to any general or special law related to the procurement and award of contracts for the planning, design, construction management, construction, reconstruction, installation, demolition, maintenance, or repair of buildings by a public agency. As described in the Petition, the redevelopment will remain subject to sections 26 to 27H, inclusive, of chapter 149 of the Generals Laws, which among other things requires that prevailing wages rates be paid to the construction workers.

Home Rule Petition of this type are commonly approved in private-public partnerships to rebuild or renovate public housing, such as we are engaged in at Leefort Terrace. The form of Home Rule Petition is consistent with previously approved petitions in other municipalities and has been reviewed by counsel at the State House.

We are happy to answer any questions that you may have, and respectfully request that you adopt this Home Rule Petition.

**An Ordinance** to amend an Ordinance relative to Sustainable Food Ware and Packaging  
*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Salem as follows:*

**Section I.** Chapter 14 Business Licenses and Fees is hereby amended by adding the following new Article:

“Article VIII. Sustainable Food Containers and Packaging

**Sec. 14-510. Purpose; findings; scope.**

Whereas, the City has a duty to protect the health of its citizens and the natural environment;

Whereas, Styrofoam is the brand name for polystyrene (Dow Chemical Co.), a synthetic plastic that biodegrades so slowly (hundreds of years) it is considered to be non-biodegradable;

Whereas, styrene, the key ingredient in expanded polystyrene, was recently added to the National Toxicology Program’s list of carcinogens (U.S. Depart. of Health and Human Services). Styrene can leach from polystyrene containers into food and beverages. It has become a major component of plastic debris in the ocean and animals often mistake it for food. It is also hazardous to marine life, transferring toxic chemicals to the food chain;

Whereas, expanded polystyrene containers are not part of the City’s regular recycling program;

Whereas, appropriate alternative products are readily available from vendors and are already being used by many of our businesses; and

Whereas, the elimination of trash on the ocean floor and floating in the water is our collective responsibility as stewards of Salem’s coastline and ocean waters;

Now therefore, the City Council finds that the prohibition on the use of foam polystyrene food and packaging containers by food service establishments and the sale of these products by retail businesses in the City of Salem is a public purpose that protects the public health, welfare and environment, advances solid waste reduction, protects waterways and aids the City in its fight against climate change.

**Sec. 14-511. Definitions.**

The following words shall, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, have the following meanings:

COMPOSTABLE — Bioplastic materials certified to meet the American Society for Testing and Materials International Standards D6400 or D6868, as those standards may be amended. ASTM D6400 is the specification for plastics designed for compostability in municipal or industrial aerobic composting facilities. D6868 is the specification for aerobic compostability of plastics

used as coatings on a compostable substrate. Compostable materials shall also include products that conform to ASTM or other third party standards (such as Vincotte) for home composting. Any compostable product must be clearly labeled with the applicable standard on the product.

**DISPOSABLE FOOD CONTAINER** — All food and beverage containers, bowls, plates, trays, cartons, cups, designed for one-time or nondurable uses on or in which any food vendor directly places or packages prepared foods on the food provider's premises or which are used to consume foods. This includes, but is not limited to, food service ware for takeout foods and leftover food from partially consumed meals prepared at food establishments, including hospitals, food trucks, grocery stores, institutional food service, temporary food vendors.

**FOAM POLYSTYRENE** — A nonbiodegradable petrochemical thermoplastic made from aerated forms of polystyrene and includes several methods of manufacture. Expanded polystyrene (EPS) or extruded polystyrene (XPS) are forms of polystyrene "Styrofoam" is a Dow Chemical Co. trademarked form of extruded polystyrene and is commonly used to refer to foam polystyrene. These are generally used to make insulated cups, bowls, trays, clamshell containers, meat trays, foam packing materials and egg cartons. The products are sometimes recognized by a No. 6 resin code on the bottom.

**FOOD ESTABLISHMENT** — A business or governmental establishment that stores, prepares, packages, serves, vends, or otherwise provides food for consumption, including but not limited to any establishment requiring a permit to operate in accordance with the state food code.

**PREPARED FOOD** — Any food or beverage packaged or prepared for consumption on the food provider's premises, using any cooking or food preparation technique or provided for further food preparation.

**RECYCLE** — Refers to material that can be sorted, cleansed, and reconstituted using Salem's curbside municipal collection programs for the purpose of using the altered form in the manufacture of a new product. "Recycling" does not include burning, incinerating, converting, or otherwise thermally destroying solid waste.

**RETAIL ESTABLISHMENT** — A business establishment engaged in the retail sale of goods directly to consumers.

**REUSABLE** — Refers to products that will be used more than once in its same form by a food establishment. Reusable food service ware includes tableware, flatware, food or beverage containers, packages or trays, such as, but not limited to, soft drink bottles and milk containers that are designed to be returned to the distributor.

**Sec. 14-512. Prohibited use and distribution of food ware and packaging.**

A. Food establishments are prohibited from dispensing food or beverages to any person in disposable food containers made from foam polystyrene (Styrofoam).

B. All food establishments are strongly encouraged to use reusable food service ware in place of using disposable food service ware for all food served on the premises. Food establishments

using any disposable food service ware are strongly encouraged to use biodegradable, compostable, reusable or recyclable food service ware.

C. Retail establishments are prohibited from selling or distributing disposable food and beverage containers made from foam polystyrene (Styrofoam) to customers, e.g. coolers, cups, and plates.

**Sec. 14-513. Enforcement; violations and penalties.**

A. Fine. Any food or retail establishment which violates any provision of this article or any regulation established by the Board of Health shall be liable for a fine as follows: first offense, warning; second offense, \$100; and subsequent offenses, \$100. Each day a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

B. Whoever violates any provision of this article or any regulation established by the Board of Health, which may include an exemption of the provisions of this Ordinance for no more than one year if the Board finds the business has demonstrated that strict application of the specific requirement would cause undue hardship, may be penalized by a noncriminal disposition as provided in MGL c. 40.

C. This article shall be enforced by the Health Agent or their designee.

**Sec. 14-514. Severability.**

Each separate provision of this article shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and if any provision of this article be declared to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of this article shall remain valid and enforceable.

**Sec. 14-515. Effective date.**

This article shall take effect one year after first passage.”

**Section II.** This ordinance shall take effect one year after first passage.
