

As you are aware, at the beginning of the fiscal year we approve a budget for the Witch House, Golf Course, and Harbormaster operations that ensures these facilities are fully funded. Each of these departments collect revenues, which we then utilize when setting the tax rate. We typically "sweep" our receipts reserved accounts and apply those revenues to help keep the tax increase as low as possible.

Enclosed herewith are requests to transfer the sum of \$1,337,058 from receipts reserved to be applied to reduce the gross amount to be raised by taxation for Fiscal Year 2019. \$272,058 is derived from Witch House revenues, \$780,000 from the golf course, and \$285,000 from Harbormaster receipts.

These appropriations will help reduce the amount raised by taxation, pending adoption of the recommended tax rate by the City Council. I recommend passage of the accompanying Order so we can continue to work to keep taxes as manageable as feasible for our residents.



This memo has been prepared to request a transfer of funds from the Water/Sewer Enterprise Fund Retained Earnings to 6000-600032-5251 Utility Service Repair and Maintenance, to fund the costs of the emergency sewer replacement on Herbert Street. In early October, we found the existing 10-inch sewer in Herbert Street, between the intersection of Essex Street and #7 Herbert Street, to be failing, resulting in a number of sink holes at the surface of the street. The sewer at this location is concrete pipe that is approximately 100-years old. At that time, we made a decision not to take any corrective action until after haunted happenings; and now need to replace a section of the 10-foot plus deep sewer. Prior to replacing the sewer, the gas main, currently directly on top of the sewer, needs to be relocated. Ngrid is currently replacing the gas main.

The total estimated cost of this work will be \$150,303.25, as detailed in the attachments to this memo:







A. Planning Board Regulation Update – local share of grant

The City applied for and received a competitive grant from the Massachusetts Office of Environmental Affairs (contract attached) to retain an engineering firm to assist with the updating for the planning board regulations. We have selected Stantec (task order with scope of services attached) to provide the services. The grant requires a 25% local share from the City, equal to \$15,000. This request for free cash will fund the local share of the grant for this much needed update of the planning board regulations.

B. Door and Roof repair costs for DPS building at 5 Jefferson Ave

Recent leaks have developed in the roof of the main DPS facility that has allowed rain to enter the building in multiple locations. A roofing repair company we retained to make repairs to address the flooding. In addition, a combination of overhead doors and regular entry doors need to be replaced. The operation of the overhead door is critical to allow vehicles to be stored inside the DPS facility and the regular entry doors do not open, creating a safety issue (access and egress) with the building. Quotes and bid results for this work are attached. This request is from short-term capital.

Option 1 is the default option when performance may begin as of the Effective Date (last signature date and any required approvals). If the parties want a new Contract or renewal to begin as of the upcoming fiscal year then list the fiscal year(s) (ex. "FY2012" or "FY2012-14") in the Brief Description section. Performance starts and encumbrances reflect the default Effective Date (if no FY is listed) or the later FY start date (if a FY is listed). Use Option 2 only when the Contract will be signed well in advance of the start date and identify a specific future start date. Do not use Option 2 for a fiscal year start unless it is certain that the Contract will be signed prior to fiscal year. Option 3 is used in lieu of the Settlement and Release Form when the Contract/Amendment is signed late, and obligations have already been incurred by the Contractor prior to the Effective Date for which the Department has either requested, accepted or obtained legally eligible for reimbursement, and the Contract includes supporting documents justifying the performance or proof of eligibility, and approximate costs. Any obligations incurred outside the scope of the Effective Date under any Option listed, even if the incorrect Option is selected, shall be automatically deemed a settlement included under the terms of the Contract and upon payment to the Contractor will release the Commonwealth from further obligations for the identified performance. All settlement payments require justification and must be under same encumbrance and object codes as the Contract payments. Performance dates are subject to G.L. c.4, §9.

CONTRACT END DATE

The Department must enter the date that Contract performance will terminate. If the Contract is being amended and the Contract End Date is not changing, this date must be re-entered again here. A Contract must be signed for at least the initial duration but not longer than the period of procurement listed in the RFR, or other solicitation document (if applicable). No new performance is allowable beyond the end date without an amendment, but the Department may allow a Contractor to complete minimal close out

performance obligations if substantial performance has been made prior to the termination date of the Contract and prior to the end of the fiscal year in which payments are appropriated, provided that any close out performance is subject to appropriation and funding limits under state finance law, and CTR may adjust encumbrances and payments in the state accounting system to enable final close out payments. Performance dates are subject to G.L. c.4, §9.

Authorizing Signatory for Contractor/Date: The Authorized Contractor Signatory must (in their own handwriting and in ink) sign AND enter the date the Contract is signed. See section above under "Anticipated Contract Start Date". Acceptance of payment by the Contractor shall waive any right of the Contractor to claim the Contract/Amendment is not valid and the Contractor may not void the Contract. Rubber stamps, typed or other images are not acceptable. Proof of Contractor signature authorization on a Contractor Authorized Signatory Listing may be required by the Department if not already on file.

Contractor Name /Title: The Contractor Authorized Signatory's name and title must appear legibly as it appears on the Contractor Authorized Signatory Listing.

Authorizing Signatory For Commonwealth/Date: The Authorized Department Signatory must (in their own handwriting and in ink) sign AND enter the date the Contract is signed. See section above under "Anticipated Start Date". Rubber stamps, typed or other images are not accepted. The Authorized Signatory must be an employee within the Department legally responsible for the Contract. See Department Head Signature Authorization. The Department must have the legislative funding appropriated for all the costs of this Contract of funding allocated under an approved Interdepartmental Service Agreement (ISA). A Department may not contract for performance to be delivered to or by another state department without specific legislative authorization (unless this Contract is a Statewide Contract). For Contracts requiring Secretariat signoff, evidence of Secretariat signoff must be included in the Contract file.

Department Name /Title: Enter the Authorized Signatory's name and title legibly.

CONTRACTOR CERTIFICATIONS AND LEGAL REFERENCES

Notwithstanding verbal or other representations by the parties, the "Effective Date" of this Contract or Amendment shall be the latest date that this Contract or Amendment has been executed by an authorized signatory of the Contractor, the Department, or a later Contract or Amendment Start Date specified, subject to any required approvals. The Contractor makes all certifications required under this Contract under the pains and penalties of perjury, and agrees to provide any required documentation upon request to support compliance, and agrees that all terms governing performance of this Contract and doing business in Massachusetts are attached or incorporated by reference herein:

Commonwealth and Contractor Ownership Rights. The Contractor certifies and agrees that the Commonwealth is entitled to ownership and possession of all "deliverables" purchased or developed with Contract funds. A Department may not relinquish Commonwealth rights to deliverables nor may Contractors sell products developed with Commonwealth resources without just compensation. The Contract should detail all Commonwealth deliverables and ownership rights and any Contractor proprietary rights.

Qualifications. The Contractor certifies it is qualified and shall at all times remain qualified to perform this Contract; that performance shall be timely and meet or exceed industry standards for the performance required, including obtaining requisite licenses, registrations, permits, resources for performance, and sufficient professional, liability, and other appropriate insurance to cover the performance. If the Contractor is a business, the Contractor certifies that it is listed under the Secretary of State's website as licensed to do business in Massachusetts, as required by law.

Business Ethics and Fraud, Waste and Abuse Prevention. The Contractor certifies that performance under this Contract, in addition to meeting the terms of the Contract, will be made using ethical business standards and good stewardship of taxpayer and other public funding and resources to prevent fraud, waste and abuse.

Collusion. The Contractor certifies that this Contract has been offered in good faith and without collusion, fraud or unfair trade practices with any other person, that any actions to avoid or frustrate fair and open competition are prohibited by law, and shall be grounds for rejection or disqualification of a Response or termination of this Contract.

Public Records and Access. The Contractor shall provide full access to records related to performance and compliance to the Department and officials listed under Executive Order 125 and G.L. c. 11, s.12 seven (7) years beginning on the first day after the final payment under this Contract or such longer period necessary for the resolution of any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit or other inquiry involving this Contract. Access to view Contractor records related to any breach or allegation of fraud, waste and/or abuse may not be denied and Contractor can not claim confidentiality or trade secret protections solely for viewing but not retaining documents. Routine Contract performance compliance reports or documents related to any alleged breach or allegation of non-compliance, fraud, waste, abuse or collusion may be provided electronically and shall be provided at Contractor's own expense. Reasonable costs for copies of non-routine Contract related records shall not exceed the rates for public records under 850 C.M.R. 32.00.

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Debarment. The Contractor certifies that neither it nor any of its subcontractors are currently debarred or suspended by the federal or state government under any law or regulation including, Executive Order 1417; G.L. c. 29, s. 29F; G.L. c. 30, s. 39R; G.L. c. 149, s. 27C; G.L. c. 149, s. 44C; G.L. c. 149, s. 148B and G.L. c. 152, s. 25C.

Applicable Laws. The Contractor shall comply with all applicable state laws and regulations including but not limited to the applicable Massachusetts General Laws; the Official Code of Massachusetts Regulations; Code of Massachusetts Regulations (unofficial); 801 CMR 21.00 (Procurement of Commodity and Service Procurements, including Human and Social Services); 815 CMR 2.00 (Grants and Subsidies); 808 CMR 1.00 (Compliance, Reporting and Auditing for Human and Social Services); AICPA Standards; confidentiality of Department records under G.L. c. 68A; and the Massachusetts Constitution Article XXVI if applicable.

Invoices. The Contractor must submit invoices in accordance with the terms of the Contract and the Commonwealth Bill Paying Policy. Contractors must be able to reconcile and properly allocate concurrent payments from multiple Departments. Final invoices in any fiscal year must be submitted no later than August 15th for performance made and received (goods delivered, services completed) prior to June 30th, in order to make payment for that performance prior to the close of the fiscal year to prevent reversion of appropriated funds. Failure to submit timely invoices by August 15th or other date listed in the Contract shall authorize the Department to issue an estimated payment based upon the Department's determination of performance delivered and accepted. The Contractor's acceptance of this estimated payment releases the Commonwealth from further claims for these invoices. If budgetary funds revert due to the Contractor's failure to submit timely final invoices, or for disputing an estimated payment, the Department may deduct a penalty up to 10% from any final payment in the next fiscal year for failure to submit timely invoices.

Payments Subject To Appropriation. Pursuant to G.L. c. 29, s. 26, s. 27 and s. 29, Departments are required to expend funds only for the purposes set forth by the Legislature and within the funding limits established through appropriation, allotment and subsidiary, including mandated allotment reductions triggered by G.L. c. 29, s. 9C. A Department cannot authorize or accept performance in excess of an existing appropriation and allotment, or sufficient non-appropriated available funds. Any oral or written representations, commitments, or assurances made by the Department or any other Commonwealth representative are not binding. The Commonwealth has no legal obligation to compensate a Contractor for performance that is not requested and is intentionally delivered by a Contractor outside the scope of a Contract. Contractors should verify funding prior to beginning performance.

Intercept. Contractors may be registered as Customers in the Vendor file if the Contractor owes a Commonwealth debt. Unresolved and undeposited debts, and overpayments of Contract payments that are not reimbursed timely shall be subject to intercept pursuant to G.L. c. 7A, s. 3 and 815 CMR 9.00. Contract overpayments will be subject to immediate intercept or payment offset. The Contractor may not penalize any state Department or assess late fees, cancel a Contract or other services if amounts are intercepted or offset due to recoupment of an overpayment, outstanding taxes, child support, other overdue debts or Contract overpayments.

Tax Law Compliance. The Contractor certifies under the pains and penalties of perjury tax compliance with Federal tax laws; State tax laws including but not limited to G.L. c. 82C, G.L. c. 82C, s. 48A; compliance with all state tax laws; reporting of employees and contractors, withholding and remitting of tax withholdings and child support and is in good standing with respect to all state taxes and returns due; reporting of employees and contractors under G.L. c. 82E, withholding and remitting child support including G.L. c. 119A, s. 12; TR 05-11: New Independent Contractor Provisions and applicable TIRs.

Bankruptcy, Judgments, Potential Structural Changes, Pending Legal Matters and Conflicts. The Contractor certifies it has not been in bankruptcy and/or receivership within the last three calendar years, and the Contractor certifies that it will immediately notify the Department in writing at least 45 days prior to filing for bankruptcy and/or receivership, any potential structural change in its organization, or if there is any risk to the solvency of the Contractor that may impact the Contractor's ability to timely fulfill the terms of this Contract or Amendment. The Contractor certifies that at any time during the period of the Contract the Contractor is required to affirmatively disclose in writing to the Department Contract Manager the details of any judgment, criminal conviction, investigation or litigation pending against the Contractor or any of its officers, directors, employees, agents, or subcontractors, including any potential conflicts of interest of which the Contractor has knowledge, or learns of during the Contract term. Law firms or Attorneys providing legal services are required to identify any potential conflict with representation of any Department client in accordance with Massachusetts Board of Bar Overseers (BBO) rules.

Federal Anti-Lobbying and Other Federal Requirements. If receiving federal funds, the Contractor certifies compliance with federal anti-lobbying requirements including 31 USC 1352; other federal requirements; Executive Order 11246; Air Pollution Act; Federal Water Pollution Control Act and Federal Employment Laws.

Protection of Personal Data and Information. The Contractor certifies that all steps will be taken to ensure the security and confidentiality of all Commonwealth data for which the Contractor becomes a holder, either as part of performance or inadvertently during performance, with special attention to restricting access, use and disbursement of personal data and information under G.L. c. 93H and s. 66A and Executive Order 504. The

Contractor is required to comply with G.L. c. 93H for the proper disposal of all paper and electronic media, backups or systems containing personal data and information, provided further that the Contractor is required to ensure that any personal data or information transmitted electronically or through a portable device be properly encrypted using (at a minimum) Information Technology Division (ITD) Protection of Sensitive Information, provided further that any Contractor having access to credit card or banking information of Commonwealth customers certifies that the Contractor is PCI compliant in accordance with the Payment Card Industry Council Standards and shall provide continuous compliance during the Contract, provide further that the Contractor shall immediately notify the Department in the event of any security breach including the unauthorized access, disbursement, use or disposal of personal data or information, and in the event of a security breach, the Contractor shall cooperate fully with the Commonwealth and provide access to any information necessary for the Commonwealth to respond to the security breach and shall be fully responsible for any damages associated with the Contractor's breach including but not limited to G.L. c. 21A, s. 3B.

Corporate and Business Filings and Reports. The Contractor certifies compliance with any certification, filing, reporting and service of process requirements of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, the Office of the Attorney General or other Departments as related to its conduct of business in the Commonwealth; and with its incorporating state (or foreign entity).

Employer Requirements. Contractors that are employers certify compliance with applicable state and federal employment laws or regulations, including but not limited to G.L. c. 5, s. 1 (Prevailing Wages for Printing and Distribution of Public Documents); G.L. c. 7, s. 22 (Prevailing Wages for Contracts for Meat Products and Clothing and Apparel); minimum wages and prevailing wage programs and payments; unemployment insurance and contributions; workers' compensation and insurance; child labor laws; AGO fair labor practices; G.L. c. 149 (Labor and Industries); G.L. c. 150A (Labor Relations); G.L. c. 151 and 455 CMR 2.00 (Minimum Fair Wages); G.L. c. 151A (Employment and Training); G.L. c. 151B (Anti-WA Discrimination); G.L. c. 151E (Business Discrimination); G.L. c. 152 (Workers' Compensation); G.L. c. 153 (Liability for Injuries); 29 USC c. 6 (Federal Fair Labor Standards); 29 USC c. 26 and the Federal Family and Medical Leave Act.

Federal And State Laws And Regulations Prohibiting Discrimination including but not limited to the Federal Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) Laws the Americans with Disabilities Act; 42 U.S.C. Sec. 12101, et seq, the Rehabilitation Act, 29 USC c. 16, s. 794; 29 USC c. 16, s. 701; 29 USC c. 14, 623; the 42 USC c. 45; (Federal Fair Housing Act); G.L. c. 151B (Unlawful Discrimination); G.L. c. 151E (Business Discrimination); the Public Accommodations Law G.L. c. 272, s. 82A; G.L. c. 272, s. 98 and 98A, Massachusetts Constitution Article CXIV and G.L. c. 93, s. 103; 47 USC c. 5, s. 211, Part II, s. 255 (Telecommunication Act); Chapter 149, Section 109D, G.L. c. 151C, G.L. c. 272, Section 82A, Section 98 and Section 98A, and G.L. c. 111, Section 198A, and Massachusetts Disability-Based Non-Discrimination Standards For Executive Branch Employees, and related Standards and Guidance, authorized under Massachusetts Executive Order or any disability-based protection arising from state or federal law or precedent. See also MCAD and MCAD EEO and Resources.

Small Business Purchasing Program (SBPP). A Contractor may be eligible to participate in the SBPP, created pursuant to Executive Order 523, if qualified through the SBPP SmartBid subscription process at www.comn-pess.com and with acceptance of the terms of the SBPP participation agreement.

Limitation of Liability for Information Technology Contracts (and other Contracts as Authorized). The Information Technology Mandatory Specifications and the IT Acquisition Accessibility Contract Language are incorporated by reference into Information Technology Contracts. The following language will apply to Information Technology contracts in the U01, U02, U03, U04, U05, U06, U07, U08, U09, U10, U75, U98 object codes in the Expenditure Classification Handbook or other Contracts as approved by CTR or OSD. Pursuant to Section 11, Indemnification of the Commonwealth Terms and Conditions, the term "other damages" shall include, but shall not be limited to, the reasonable costs the Commonwealth incurs to repair, return, replace or seek cover (purchase of comparable substitute commodities and services) under a Contract. "Other damages" shall not include damages to the Commonwealth as a result of third party claims, provided, however, that the foregoing in no way limits the Commonwealth's right of recovery for personal injury or property damages or patent and copyright infringement under Section 11 nor the Commonwealth's ability to join the contractor as a third party defendant. Further, the term "other damages" shall not include, and in no event shall the contractor be liable for, damages for the Commonwealth's use of contractor provided products or services, loss of Commonwealth records, or data (or other intangible property), loss of use of equipment, lost revenue, lost savings or lost profits of the Commonwealth. In no event shall "other damages" exceed the greater of \$100,000, or two times the value of the product or service (as defined in the Contract scope of work) that is the subject of the claim. Section 11 sets forth the contractor's entire liability under a Contract. Nothing in this section shall limit the Commonwealth's ability to negotiate higher limitations of liability in a particular Contract, provided that any such limitation must specifically reference Section 11 of the Commonwealth Terms and Conditions. In the event the limitation of liability conflicts with accounting standards which mandate that there can be no cap of damages, the limitation shall be considered waived for that audit engagement. These terms may be applied to

other Contracts only with prior written confirmation from the Operational Services Division or the Office of the Comptroller. The terms in this Clarification may not be modified.

Northern Ireland Certification: Pursuant to G.L. c. 7A, 22C for state agencies, state authorities, the House of Representatives or the state Senate, by signing this Contract the Contractor certifies that it does not employ ten or more employees in an office or other facility in Northern Ireland and if the Contractor employs ten or more employees in an office or other facility located in Northern Ireland the Contractor certifies that it does not discriminate in employment, compensation, or the terms, conditions and privileges of employment on account of religious or political belief; and it promotes religious tolerance within the work place, and the eradication of any manifestations of religious and other illegal discrimination; and the Contractor is not engaged in the manufacture, distribution or sale of firearms, munitions, including rubber or plastic bullets, tear gas, armored vehicles or military aircraft for use or deployment in any activity in Northern Ireland.

Pandemic, Disaster or Emergency Performance: In the event of a serious emergency, pandemic or disaster outside the control of the Department, the Department may negotiate emergency performance from the Contractor to address the immediate needs of the Commonwealth even if not contemplated under the original Contract or procurement. Payments are subject to appropriation and other payment terms.

Consultant Contractor Certifications (For Consultant Contracts "HM" and "NM" and "UOS" object codes subject to G.L. Chapter 29A, 29A): Contractors must make required disclosures as part of the RFP Response or using the Consultant Contractor Mandatory Submission Form.

Attorneys: Attorneys or firms providing legal services or representing Commonwealth Departments may be subject to G.L. c. 30, s. 85, and if providing litigation services must be approved by the Office of the Attorney General to appear on behalf of a Department, and shall have a continuing obligation to notify the Commonwealth of any conflicts of interest arising under the Contract.

Subcontractor Performance: The Contractor certifies full responsibility for Contract performance, including subcontractors, and that comparable Contract terms will be included in subcontracts, and that the Department will not be required to directly or indirectly manage subcontractors or have any payment obligations to subcontractors.

EXECUTIVE ORDERS

For covered Executive state Departments, the Contractor certifies compliance with applicable Executive Orders (see also Massachusetts Executive Orders), including but not limited to the specific orders listed below. A breach during period of a Contract may be considered a material breach and subject Contractor to appropriate monetary or Contract sanctions.

Executive Order 481. Prohibiting the Use of Undocumented Workers on State Contracts:

For all state agencies in the Executive Branch, including all executive offices, boards, commissions, agencies, Departments, divisions, councils, bureaus, and offices, now existing and hereafter established, by signing this Contract the Contractor certifies under the pains and penalties of perjury that they shall not knowingly use undocumented workers in connection with the performance of this Contract; that, pursuant to federal requirements, shall verify the immigration status of workers assigned to a Contract without engaging in unlawful discrimination; and shall not knowingly or recklessly alter, falsify, or accept altered or falsified documents from any such worker.

Executive Order 120. Anti-Boycott: The Contractor warrants, represents and agrees that during the time this Contract is in effect, neither it nor any affiliated company, as hereafter defined, participates in or cooperates with an international boycott (See IRC § 899(b)(3)-(4) and IRS Audit Guidelines Boycotts) or engages in conduct declared to be unlawful by G.L. c. 151E, s. 2. A breach in the warranty, representation, and agreement contained in this paragraph, without limiting such other rights as it may have, the Commonwealth shall be entitled to rescind this Contract. As used herein, an affiliated company shall be any business entity of which at least 51% of the ownership interests are directly or indirectly owned by the Contractor or by a person or persons or business entity or entities directly or indirectly owning at least 51% of the ownership interests of the Contractor, or which directly or indirectly owns at least 51% of the ownership interests of the Contractor.

Executive Order 346. Hiring of State Employees By State Contractors: Contractor certifies compliance with both the conflict of interest law G.L. c. 268A specifically s. 5 (f) and this order; and includes limitations regarding the hiring of state employees by private companies contracting with the Commonwealth. A privatization contract shall be deemed to include a specific prohibition against the hiring at any time during the term of Contract, and for any position in the Contractor's company, any state management employee who is, was, or will be involved in the preparation of the RFP, the negotiations leading to the awarding of the Contract, the decision to award the Contract, and/or the supervision or oversight of performance under the Contract.

Executive Order 444. Disclosure of Family Relationships With Other State Employees: Each person applying for employment (including Contract work) within the Executive Branch under the Governor must disclose in writing the names of all immediate family related to immediate family by marriage who serve as employees or elected officials of the Commonwealth. All disclosures made by applicants hired by the Executive Branch under the Governor shall be made available for public inspection to the extent permissible by law by the official with whom such disclosure has been filed.

Executive Order 504. Regarding the Security and Confidentiality of

Personal Information. For all Contracts involving the Contractor's access to personal information, as defined in G.L. c. 93H, and personal data, as defined in G.L. c. 68A, owned or controlled by Executive Department agencies, or access to agency systems containing such information or data (herein collectively "personal information"), Contractor certifies under the pains and penalties of perjury that the Contractor (1) has read Commonwealth of Massachusetts Executive Order 504 and agrees to protect any and all personal information; and (2) has reviewed all of the Commonwealth Information Technology Division's Security Policies. Notwithstanding any contractual provision to the contrary, in connection with the Contractor's performance under this Contract, for all state agencies in the Executive Department, including all executive offices, boards, commissions, agencies, departments, divisions, councils, bureaus, and offices, now existing and hereafter established, the Contractor shall: (1) obtain a copy, review, and comply with the contracting agency's Information Security Program (ISP) and any pertinent security guidelines, standards, and policies; (2) comply with all of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Information Technology Division's "Security Policies"; (3) communicate and enforce the contracting agency's ISP and such Security Policies against all employees (whether such employees are direct or contracted) and subcontractors; (4) implement and maintain any other reasonable appropriate security procedures and practices necessary to protect personal information to which the Contractor is given access by the contracting agency from the unauthorized access, destruction, use, modification, disclosure or loss; (5) be responsible for the full or partial breach of any of these terms by its employees (whether such employees are direct or contracted) or subcontractors during or after the term of this Contract, and any breach of these terms may be regarded as a material breach of this Contract; (6) in the event of any unauthorized access, destruction, use, modification, disclosure or loss of the personal information (collectively referred to as the "unauthorized use"); (a) immediately notify the contracting agency if the Contractor becomes aware of the unauthorized use; (b) provide full cooperation and access to information necessary for the contracting agency to determine the scope of the unauthorized use; and (c) provide full cooperation and access to information necessary for the contracting agency and the Contractor to fulfill any notification requirements. Breach of these terms may be regarded as a material breach of this Contract, such that the Commonwealth may exercise any and all contractual rights and remedies, including without limitation indemnification under Section 11 of the Commonwealth's Terms and Conditions, withholding of payments, Contract suspension, or termination. In addition, the Contractor may be subject to applicable statutory or regulatory penalties, including and without limitation, those imposed pursuant to G.L. c. 93H and under G.L. c. 214, § 3B for violations under M.G.L. c. 68A. **Executive Orders 523, 524 and 526. Executive Order 526 (Order Regarding Non-Discrimination, Diversity, Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action which supersedes Executive Order 476). Executive Order 524 (Establishing the Massachusetts Supplier Diversity Program which supersedes Executive Order 390). Executive Order 523 (Establishing the Massachusetts Small Business Purchasing Program.)** All programs, activities, and services provided, performed, licensed, chartered, funded, regulated, or contracted for by the state shall be conducted without unlawful discrimination based on race, color, age, gender, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, religion, creed, ancestry, national origin, disability, veteran's status (including Vietnam-era veterans), or background. The Contractor and any subcontractors may not engage in discriminatory employment practices; and the Contractor certifies compliance with applicable federal and state laws, rules, and regulations governing fair labor and employment practices; and the Contractor commits to purchase supplies and services from certified minority or woman-owned businesses, small businesses, or businesses owned by socially or economically disadvantaged persons or persons with disabilities. These provisions shall be enforced through the contracting agency, OSD, and/or the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination. Any breach shall be regarded as a material breach of the contract that may subject the contractor to appropriate sanctions.

ATTACHMENT A - SCOPE OF SERVICES AND ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS





A. Planning Board Regulation Update – local share of grant

The City applied for and received a competitive grant from the Massachusetts Office of Environmental Affairs (contract attached) to retain an engineering firm to assist with the updating for the planning board regulations. We have selected Stantec (task order with scope of services attached) to provide the services. The grant requires a 25% local share from the City, equal to \$15,000. This request for free cash will fund the local share of the grant for this much needed update of the planning board regulations.

B. Door and Roof repair costs for DPS building at 5 Jefferson Ave

Recent leaks have developed in the roof of the main DPS facility that has allowed rain to enter the building in multiple locations. A roofing repair company we retained to make repairs to address the flooding. In addition, a combination of overhead doors and regular entry doors need to be replaced. The operation of the overhead door is critical to allow vehicles to be stored inside the DPS facility and the regular entry doors do not open, creating a safety issue (access and egress) with the building. Quotes and bid results for this work are attached. This request is from short-term capital.





Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

In anticipation of the upcoming opening of ATG for recreational marijuana sales later this month the City, the Salem Police Department, and ATG, in partnership with the City of Peabody and the MBTA, are undertaking a number of pro-active steps to try to help manage customer traffic flow and parking concerns, public safety impacts, and other related challenges. While ATG will not likely see the same volume of customers that the first two retailers did elsewhere in Massachusetts, we are nevertheless preparing for the possibility that they might.

To that end, one of the many actions we are taking is to preserve resident parking in the surrounding neighborhood and to direct customer parking to either the ATG site itself or, more preferably, to their satellite parking lot. The enclosed Order establishes temporary resident parking only zones on several of the surrounding streets. Other streets already have resident or no parking restrictions, or will be subject to temporary no parking restrictions imposed by Police order.

We will provide residents of these streets with temporary hang tags for their vehicles so that they may continue to park in these areas at their convenience. This Order will end once the Chief of Police has decided that the traffic and parking volumes from ATG's customers has diminished to a reasonable level. This Order comes with the recommendation of the Police Department's Traffic Division Commander and the Chief, and the Ward Councillor has been briefed on this plan, as well. I encourage its adoption at your meeting tonight so that we can proceed to distribute the hang tags and post these streets sufficiently in advance of ATG commencing retail sales later this month.

Re: Request for Temporary Resident Parking – Mason Street area

Dear Mayor Driscoll and City Councillors:

I am writing to you to respectfully request temporary resident parking restrictions be posted in the Mason Street area in order to assure that we minimize the volume of traffic and parking on the specific streets/areas identified below in order to provide adequate flow of traffic and adequate parking for our residents, as well as, reduce the probability of accidents due to parking congestions.

As you may be aware, Alternative Therapies Group (ATG) received their license from the Cannabis Control Commission recently and are awaiting a final inspection before proceeding with adult retail marijuana sales at their 50 Grove Street facility. It is anticipated that the approval to begin selling may occur by the second week of December. In preparation for the sales for the only adult retail marijuana facility in a 70+ mile radius, we have begun reviewing preparations plans with ATG and determining the needs in the immediate area of the facility.

During our review, we have established that the immediate neighborhoods could be impacted by patrons to the facility, not dissimilar from the experiences of Leicester, MA within the past week. The streets in the general vicinity of the facility are relatively narrow and additional vehicles parking in these areas can and will result in traffic delays and increase the probability of accidents, both vehicular and pedestrian. I believe it is prudent to address this before the accidents occur or traffic is bottlenecked in the area.

I am proposing the following areas to be posted as Temporary Resident Parking only:

Mason Street, from Grove Street to Flint Street

As it is unclear how long ATG will be the only adult retail marijuana facility within the area, I would request that the restriction remain in effect until a time when I can determine it is no longer necessary and in the best interest of the residents and City to lift the restrictions.

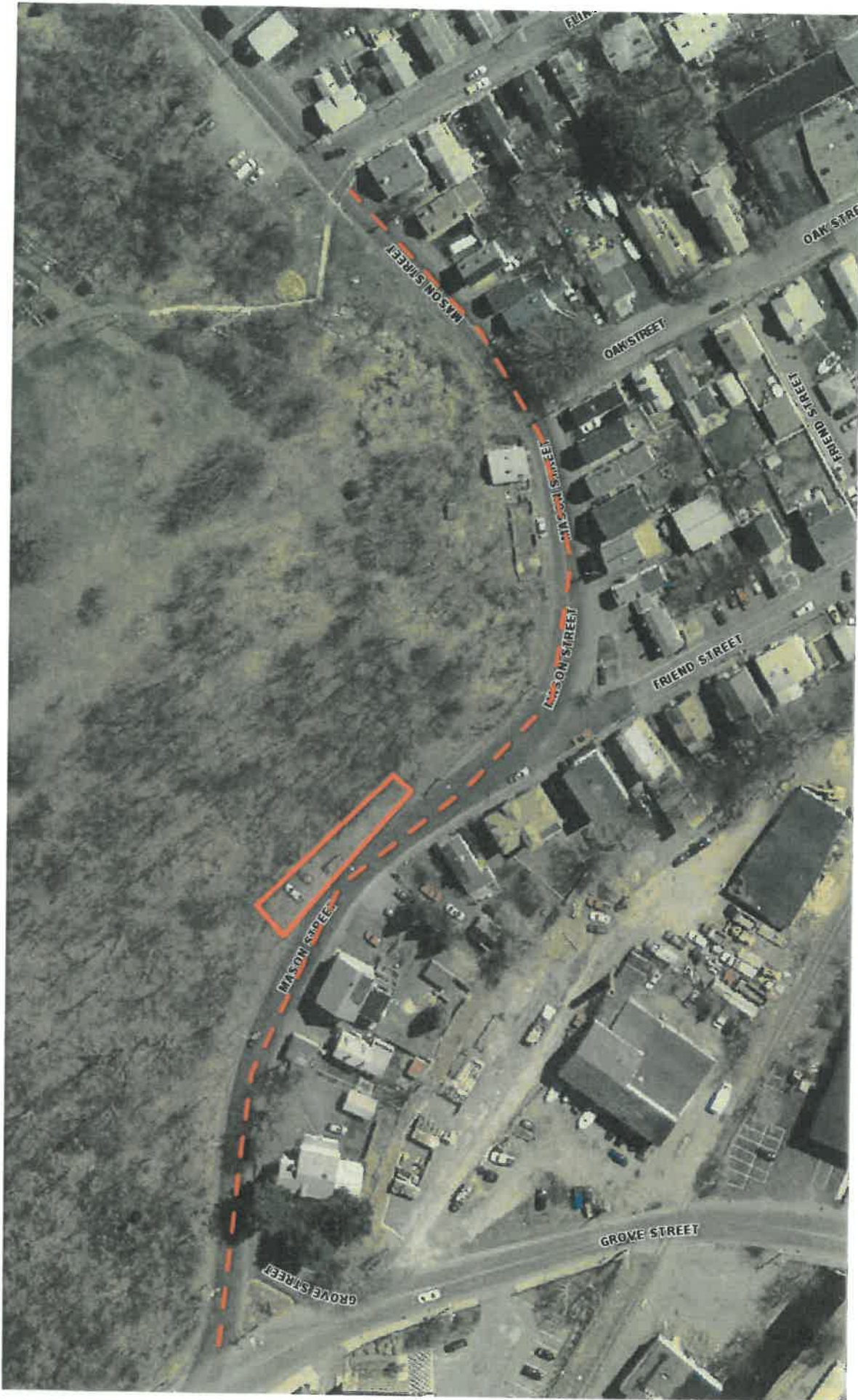

Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council

I am writing to respectfully request that you issue a resolution to authorize the City to file and accept a Parkland Acquisitions and Renovations for Communities (PARC) Grant from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to renovate Gallows Hill Park. This resolution is required by the Commonwealth in order for any PARC grant funds to be awarded for this project.

The City first identified improvements to Gallows Hill Park in its 2015 Open Space & Recreation Plan. Through subsequent consultation with the skating and baseball communities and outreach to the general public, several key upgrades have been identified. Proposed improvements include reconstruction of the Brennan Memorial Skate Park, expansion of the baseball field to high school size, and circulation and accessibility upgrades to enhance access to the park from the surrounding neighborhoods.

If awarded, the PARC Grant will reimburse the City for up to \$400,000 of the project cost. While the PARC program requires that the City commit to funding the entire project, the proposed resolution is contingent on the City being awarded the grant. We will follow up with the Council with a specific proposal for any project funding required beyond the grant amount in order to complete these planned improvements.

Ladies and Gentlemen of the City Council:

Each year the City Council must vote to set the residential tax factor and thereby set the tax rate for the fiscal year. In Massachusetts, Proposition 2 ½ caps new property taxes at no more than 2.5% of the previous year's levy. This year, the tax rate – \$15.10 for residential and \$29.54 for commercial – is once again under the City's allowable levy limit, with excess levy capacity of \$4.13 million, validating our City's responsible approach to budgeting and managing public finances. We continue to maintain a generally low tax bill increase over time, as well, with the average increase over the last nine years for the average single-family taxpayer in Salem coming in at 3.3%

Based on the rates above, the change in the average single-family tax bill will be \$230.06 (4.1%), the average condominium unit change will be \$281.04 (5.0%), the average two-family change will be \$273.18 (4.9%) per unit, and the average three-family change will be \$197.93 (3.5%) per unit. The average commercial property tax bill change will be \$400.08 (7.1%). In an effort to keep property taxes as reasonable as possible, I have also attached separate appropriation order submittals to apply revenues from free cash and receipts reserved accounts, as has been our usual practice, to help reduce the total amount to be raised through taxation and thus lessen the amount to be raised from Salem property taxpayers by \$3,237,058.

Salem is a desirable community in which to live and our strengthening property values reflect the increasing demand for property here. Property values also have an impact on tax bills and changes in those tax bills are partly reflective of changes in property values. In terms of change over the average value from the last fiscal year, single family homes average values are up 6.0%, residential condos are up by 8.9%, two-family homes are up by 5.6% per unit, 3-family homes are up by 3.7% per unit, and commercial property is up by 3.7%. Overall, property value changed by 7.9% city-wide. In all classifications, with the exception of commercial property, the change in property value outpaces the change in the average tax bill.

As you know, while Salem is seen as a leader across the Commonwealth in terms of ability to find and secure grants, it is property taxes that pay most of the cost of the City services our residents rely upon: fully staffed Police and Fire Departments, who keep us safe during routine times and emergencies; funding of our schools and our students, who continue to work hard on improving their achievements in preparation for serving as the next generation of leaders in our city, and efforts to expand maintenance of our parks, streets and sidewalks, while also supporting our fantastic library – one of the busiest in the North of Boston Library Exchange – and our new Community Life Center, which abounds with activity.

While property tax dollars help to fund the lion's share of these necessary expenditures, we always strive to manage the overall tax burden on our City's homeowners and I am proud that we have never needed or sought a Proposition 2 ½ override. We seek efficiencies and opportunities for regionalization or streamlining. We look to technology and performance improvement strategies to reduce the cost of doing business. The most powerful tool at our disposal, however, is responsible, sensible private development that adds to our tax base. This is why we have advocated for the appropriate redevelopment of sites such as the former courthouses, the vacant power plant property, and the under-utilized and vacant former industrial parcels that comprise the North River Canal Corridor. I am extremely pleased that certified new growth this fiscal year is \$1,500,919. While this new growth figure is slightly less than what we saw in FY2018, it still exceeds the growth we saw in any other year prior to that since I first took office and exceeds our sixteen-year average by a full 42%. For every dollar in new growth, that is one less dollar that is coming from existing property owners to fund local government expenditures.

We have sought to export our tax burden to visitors where possible, by supporting the development of new hotels and the extension of lodging taxes to short-term rentals. Even the new 3% adult-use cannabis local excise tax will, to a large extent, likely be borne by visitors to our community.

We have been extremely pro-active in pursuing grant opportunities whenever they become available. Since the start of my administration in 2006 we have successfully received over \$150 million in state and federal grants. Just about one-fifth of our revenues is aid from the state, however state aid is not increasing at the same rate as state assessments. State aid increased by 0.6% this year, but was outpaced by state charges, which increased by 2.3%. This is clearly not sustainable. When it comes to the unfunded charter school reimbursement by the state, Salem's aid dropped by a considerable 27%, over \$266,000, to around the same reimbursement level we saw in FY2011. We need a stronger partner at the state level, to fully fund the charter school funding formula and to push for a long overdue and more fair adjustment to the SESD PILOT to accurately reflect inflation. I know that we can count on our own legislators to be positive leaders on these important issues.

We also work to have meaningful partnerships with our anchor institutions and non-profits, including our tax agreement and CBA with Footprint, investments in our schools and neighborhoods from SSU, and discussions about expanded community support from NSMC, and our ongoing push for a nearly two decades' over-due adjustment in our SESD PILOT. Salem is a better place for our anchor institutions, which certainly have a collective positive economic

impact on our community; however, because they are tax-exempt, we must also balance the impact of around 14% of our property values being off the tax rolls. Some of that impact will be aided by negotiations on host community agreements with the forthcoming adult-use cannabis retailers that we expect will be opening in the coming year.

One of the biggest challenges we continue to face is pressure from reductions in revenues and increases in fixed costs. Our general City budget grew by only 3.6% this fiscal year, however more than half of that increase – 54% - was due to increases in fixed costs such as state charges, health insurance costs, Medicare, worker's compensation, debt payments, and municipal insurance.

As we set our tax rate for the current fiscal year, the recommendation is to set our CIP split at 1.70, making the residential factor 0.868800. Without this CIP split, our residential property taxpayers will bear a substantial and, in my view, unfair increase in their share of our property tax levy. We should not allow this to happen and, therefore, this shift in the tax split is warranted.

The vision for our City laid out in our annual budget, and continued with this tax proposal, reflects our collective desire to keep Salem a vibrant, thriving community that delivers quality public services in as efficient and affordable a manner as possible. When I took office, we faced a \$3.5 million deficit. We spent all our savings just to keep the lights on and were forced to borrow money to pay normal operating expenses. We have worked collaboratively over the last decade to eliminate prior deficits, improve city finances, and balance our books with an eye on both the needs of today and our aspirations for the future. It has not always been easy. Just as we emerged from those local fiscal trials in 2007 our national economy spiraled into a recession.

But whatever the cause of our challenges, we weathered them and are today stronger and better positioned than ever, with record growth, a vibrant local economy, record bond ratings, and award-winning balanced budgets. Our City's bond rating from Standard & Poor's was upgraded five years ago to AA, the highest in the City's history. In their most recent ratings report the agency cited our financial stability and conservative budgeting practices in affirming that strong rating. This is validation that Salem's fiscal policies are of the highest standard and that the path we have set for ourselves is the correct one for our community.

At its meeting of November 13, 2018, the Community Preservation Committee (CPC) voted (five in favor and one opposed) to recommend increased funding for the window restoration project at 211 Bridge Street (The Bridge at 211) in the amount of \$25,000 from the Community Preservation Act Fund Balance.

In compliance with MGL c.44B, the City Council is requested to take one of the following actions on each funding recommendation:

- Approve recommendation of the CPC
- Reject recommendation of the CPC
- Reduce amount recommended by the CPC
- Reserve amount recommended by the CPC to applicable reserve account, rather than approving the project

Summary:

As part of the FY18 funding round, 211 Bridge Street Corp. (d/b/a The Bridge at 211) initially submitted a request for \$121,277.50 in CPA funds for full restoration of twenty-six historic windows in the 1889 wing of 211 Bridge Street. The Bridge at 211 was able to scale down the project to \$88,077.50 and on May 5, 2018, the CPC voted to recommend to the City Council funding of \$42,647.97, which was approved by the City Council on June 14, 2018. The Bridge at 211 recently submitted a request for \$45,429.53 in additional CPA funds (attached) in order to complete the remaining 13 out of 26 windows, in order to undertake just one construction operation to avoid exposure of the interior to the elements twice and take advantage of cost effectiveness, and in order to assure consistency of carpentry.

The CPC is recommending that the City Council approve an additional \$25,000 in CPA funding over what was recommended in the *Round 5 Report on Funding Recommendations for the Salem City Council*, submitted on May 18, 2018, in order to further assist the project. The CPC encourages the Bridge at 211 to fundraise for the remainder of the proposed budget. A Preservation Restriction, which will be executed with Massachusetts Historical Commission approval, is in process.

Dear Councilors,

We wanted to touch base with you regarding The Bridge at 211's recent CPA award and respectfully ask for your support for the CPC's grant of supplemental funding. In brief:

1. The Bridge at 211 was granted \$42,647.97 in CPA funds earlier this year in order to restore windows in the 1898 Annex. This was just under one-half of our original request which would have allowed us to restore all the windows on the mid-level of the 1898 wing of the building and six windows on the lower level for a total of twenty-six windows. The Bridge at 211 considered this project as Phase I of a plan to eventually address all of the windows in building.
2. These windows were chosen to address first as, according to our architect, Robert Farley, and our contractor, Window Women of New England, they are in the worst shape and potentially will fail completely in the immediate future. As they are now, these windows are functionally inoperable and seriously deteriorated; thus exposing the interior to weather and rendering the spaces drafty and difficult and expensive to heat.
3. Because of the condition of these windows, this project was deemed critical to address first, but it is our intention to address all the windows in the building in future phases and we will be pursuing all appropriate and available funding sources in order to restore all of the windows in the building over the next few years.
4. The CPC generously granted us \$42,353.03 in May of this year. The Board of The Bridge at 211 is extremely grateful for this grant. The recommended additional \$25,000 voted on by the CPC on

November 13 will allow us to address most of the worst case windows in the mid-level of the 1898 Wing and allow The Bridge to address these worst case offenders in one continuous construction operation in order to avoid weather consequences and resulting in minimal energy loss and minimal disruption to our users.

5. We, therefore, respectfully request your support for the recommended additional \$25,000.

BACKGROUND:

1. The Salem Redevelopment Authority has held a Preservation Easement on the building's exterior since 1979. Its purpose, among other things is "the preservation and restoration of historic and architectural values associated with structures and areas within the Project Area." This easement has ensured that there is proper technical oversight by the City for any contemplated improvements to the building's exterior and has provided a "stimulus to preservation activities."
2. In addition to the Façade Easement, as a condition of the grant of any funds from the CPC, The Bridge at 211 will be required to enter into a Preservation Restriction with the Massachusetts Historical Commission, administered by the local Historical Commission. The language of that restriction is currently being finalized. This ensures additional oversight over the building.
3. The 211 Bridge Street Corporation (d/b/a "The Bridge at 211") took title to the building in 2015 in order to transform and repurpose the building to serve the greater Salem community as a new nonprofit corporation. The Bridge now serves as a cultural and community entity that is also committed to the preservation of its historic building that is located on an important Entrance Corridor to the City. We are continuing to work towards creating a meaningful presence in the community and continue to define and refine who we are and what our contribution to the community will be. We have consulted with many community members, including Mayor Driscoll and several City officials and believe we are on our way. It is critical to preserve and appropriately upgrade the building in order to continue and expand our relationship with various arts and community groups in the City. This goal is consistent with the City's Preservation Plan updated (pp. 4, "Integrating the Arts and Historic Preservation).
4. In addition to its location on an important Entrance Corridor to the downtown, The Bridge at 211 building is listed on the State and National Registers of Historic Places. Consistent with the requirements of the Façade Easement with the Salem Redevelopment Authority, the newly-drafted Preservation Restriction with the Salem Historical Commission, and the City of Salem's Preservation Plan, The Bridge at 211 is continuing to pursue their goals of preservation of the building while developing and expanding their programming to support and enhance arts and social justice in the City. Critical preservation work is needed in several areas of the building and The Bridge at 211 will be seeking funding from grant resources and pursuing fundraising through donors and other fundraising events. We are a small 100% volunteer Board who are continuing to define what our contribution as a charitable entity will be to Salem and the surrounding communities.
5. We are also stewards of the building and are working hard to preserve and maintain it while simultaneously providing public benefit to the City.

The Bridge at 211 believes the grant of the additional \$25,000 is consistent with previous supplemental grants to other non-municipal buildings in Salem which nonetheless play a critical role in the fabric of the Salem community. It is our understanding that, following the close of FY18, \$129,164.20 became available through unspent administration costs, surcharges received over the estimate and state match, interest, etc. These funds were certified by the DOR in October, making those funds available to put toward projects in November. While applicants are encouraged to apply for funds during the regular funding round, the CPC has occasionally recommended supplemental funding from these "leftover" monies in the past.

Subtracting out The Bridge's requested supplemental \$25,000, there will be \$104,164.20 left in the funding pool that will be added to the upcoming funding round.

With this additional \$25,000 (making a total grant of \$67,647.97) The Bridge at 211 will be able to move forward expeditiously with addressing most of the "worst offender" windows in the 1898 Annex thus assisting us in our goals of sustainability and energy efficiency, energizing our fundraising efforts on both the preservation and programming fronts, and continuing to provide affordable and proper spaces to arts and community users of the space. These users include, but are not limited to:

The Salem Arts Association, Neverland Theatre Company, the Salem Scottish Dancers, the Massachusetts Poetry Festival, Historic Salem, Inc., the Salem Common Neighborhood Association, the Salem Lions Club, the Salem Repair Café, the Salem Academy Charter School, the Salem Awards Foundation, the Salem Food Pantry and three separate Anonymous support groups. In addition, The Bridge provides low-cost incubator space to a small, but expanding local business (Ferreira Foods).

In consultation with Mayor Driscoll and other public and private individuals, we continue to explore additional ways to grow our programming in a manner that fills a void in the City's offerings. To this end, we are exploring supplemental fundraising opportunities with a grants consultant and with community leaders who have offered fundraising assistance to us. The Board of Directors is working hard to balance the maintenance and preservation of this fine historic building while providing a sustainable addition to the City's cultural community. The original CPC grant of \$42,647.97 together with the additional \$25,000 under consideration by the Council will be a stimulus to additional funding to achieve these goals.

The Bridge at 211 is respectfully requesting funding to supplement the recent award dated August 30, 2018.

Please recall that The Bridge at 211 originally requested \$121,277.50 in order to restore twenty-six windows in the 1898 Annex of the building at 211 Bridge Street in our application date stamped by your office on March 21, 2018. On August 30, 2018, The Bridge at 211 was notified of an award of \$42,647.97. The Board of Directors of The Bridge at 211 is extremely grateful for this award. The Memorandum of Agreement reflecting the grant of funds was executed by The Bridge at 211 Board of Directors on October 11, 2018 and by the City of Salem on October 18, 2018. An accompanying Preservation Restriction is in process.

On October 17, 2018, The Bridge met with our contractor, Window Women of New England, and our architect, Robert Farley, to develop a construction schedule and determine additional subcontractors to complete the work as approved. The \$42,647.97 award will enable us to only restore twelve (12) of the larger, most affected windows. As stated, we are very grateful for the opportunity to dig into this project.

The Bridge at 211 respectfully requests additional funds of \$45,429.53 in order to restore the remaining seven (7) large windows on the main level of the Annex and the six (6) smaller windows on the lower level in order to complete the project in accordance with the previously-submitted budget.

The reasons for this request are as follows:


- Doing the entire project as one construction operation would avoid exposure of the interior of the building to the elements twice.

- We are advised by our contractor that keeping them engaged as one continuous operation for the duration of the project would result in a more efficient, cost effective operation; thus avoiding possible "re-startup" costs.
- Keeping the entire team engaged and together for the entire project would assure consistency of carpentry and other custom aspects of the job.

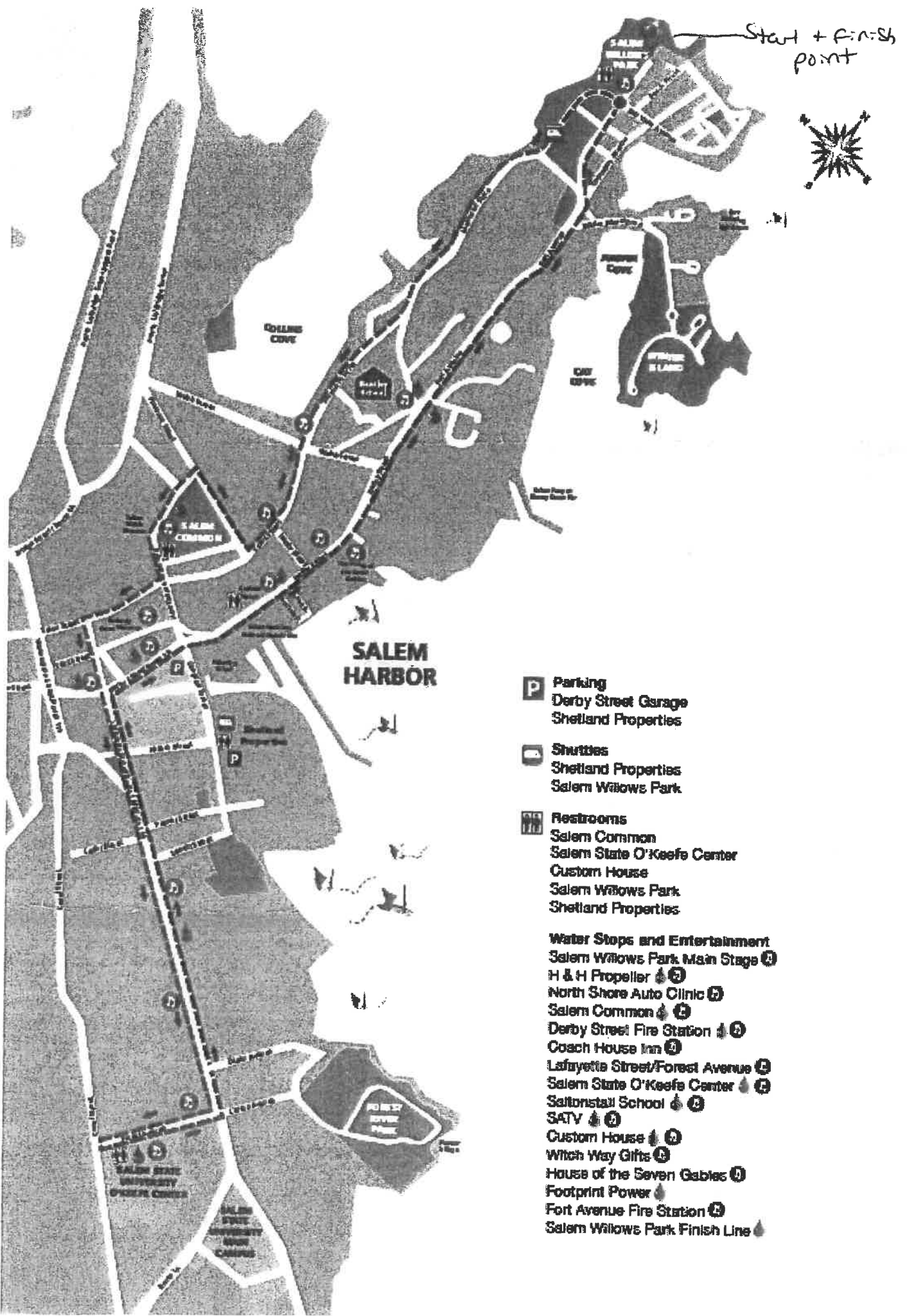

The purpose of this memo is to provide a professional review of the existing drainage infrastructure in the area of 435 Highland Avenue in Salem, MA (site) based on available record plans and photographs, the recent existing conditions land survey, observations during site visits, and an attempt to document the pipes conditions with a Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) observation. The primary focus is to understand if the existing condition of the drainage system infrastructure has facilitated recent flooding events of the site and recommend possible flooding mitigation measures.

When compared to the recent existing conditions field survey, the historic photographs illustrate a flooding event approximately up to elevation 12.9' (NGVD 88). At this elevation both Life Storage building footprints are under water. Upon review there appears to be an adequate stormwater system on site with eight (8) catch basins draining an 80,000-sf site and pipe sizes ranging between 10"-24". It was noted that the outlet pipe to the drainage ditch in the southeasterly corner of the site is partially blocked by silt and thus is reducing the capacity of the on-site drainage system. This outlet should be cleaned out, but is most likely not root cause of the flooding.

It was noted by the applicant, and illustrated in pictures and video provided, that Highland Avenue (Route 107) floods first. Catch basin #1 (CB#1), located directly in front of the site, was opened during the site visit on October 18 (Field Report #1). The outlet pipe from this catch basin was entirely clogged and unable to allow flows to leave the structure. This catch basin is a low point on Highland Avenue, collecting significant flows from both north and south of the property. These flows from the street that have nowhere else to go would pool until water reaches a level in which it spills into the site.

This street overflow could exhaust the site's stormwater capacity and lead to the experienced flooding, especially considering the silt buildup at the sites discharge point. The attached Field Report #2 provides an examination of existing stormwater infrastructure in Route 107, provides evidence of a lack of maintenance, and possibly proves a catastrophic failure of the Route 107 drainage system. A&M feels this has a significant effect of on the flooding of the site.

Field investigation and CCTV inspection of the drainage infrastructure revealed that flows from both Route 107 (Highland Avenue) and the Walmart parking lot (approximately 10 acres, mostly impervious) are routed through the 24"H x 30"H box culvert to the drainage swale. This means that the existing box culvert, which is 90% obstructed by debris (see Field Report #2, Setup#3), would be severely undersized even if it wasn't obstructed. These two large watersheds are then pushing the stormwater into the Life Storage site and overwhelming the sites drainage system leading to the flooding of the site.

Additionally, the total watershed area contributing to the drainage ditch is significantly greater than just the Walmart parking lot. The total area that flows to the drainage ditch is roughly 48.0 acres (see attached Exhibit entitled StreamStat Report Sketch). A&M recommends that at a minimum the box culvert be cleaned or repaired to its original state to allow the flows from Highland Ave and Walmart to flow unobstructed into the drainage ditch.

A&M also recommends a more in-depth watershed analysis should be undertaken to verify the extents of the watershed area to both the box culvert and drainage swale to verify the existing system is sized appropriately.

October 18 - Field/Hydrology Inspection

The intent of this site investigation was to determine the cause of the recent flooding that occurred within the property (**See Figure 1**). Upon arrival at the site, the gutter line of Highland Avenue was heavily layered with siltation and other debris such as leaves and sticks.

The Walmart across the street, which has also experienced flooding in the past, discharges their parking lot and roof flows to a manhole abutting the Highland Avenue right-of-way. This manhole, Manhole #1 (MH#1), was opened during the site visit. Flows from the Walmart parking lot are conveyed via a 30" reinforced concrete pipe (RCP) to this manhole and exit to MH#2 via a 30" corrugated metal pipe (CMP) located within the right-of-way. Upon opening this MH#1, it was discovered that there was approximately 6" of standing water within the structure.

MH#2 conveys flows across Highland Avenue to a headwall, HW#1 at the non-jurisdictional drainage ditch that abuts the Life Storage property to the south. MH#2 was unable to be opened at the time. BMC Corp and a police detail will assist in using a CCTV to camera the 30" CMP that runs from MH#1 to MH#2 and possibly the box culvert that runs from MH#2 to HW#1.

The main priority of the October 18 site visit was to get an understanding of the hydrology around the Life Storage facility, mainly understanding the drainage ditch. Record plans show a 2.5'x2.0' box culvert

running from MH#2 to HW#1 (**Figure 2**). The water within the drainage ditch was stagnant and had not flowed in quite some time.

The drainage ditch is approximately 80 feet in length and between 8-12 feet wide before it branches out to a wider area of standing water. This drainage ditch has not been maintained and there is significant debris clogging the flow path including sections of chain-link fence and a fallen tree (**Figure 3**).

At the southeast corner of the site is another headwall, HW#2. Drainage on-site consists of a catch basin to catch basin drainage system that discharges to the drainage swale via this headwall. See attached ALTA plan for on-site drainage structures and pipe, including concrete HW#2 (**Figure 4**).

The size of the outlet from the catch basin to HW#2 cannot be determined because of the standing water elevation at the headwall (**Figure 5 & 6**).

From HW#2 the wetland area veers south east through the back yards of #10-25 Clark Avenue. The wetland area was explored for possible signs of a beaver dam or some other large obstruction that would inhibit the flow of water but none were found. Standing water that was found throughout MH#1, HW#1, and HW#2 began to dry up and turn into wetland area. All evidence shows that this water rarely flows in any direction.

The grate of CB#1, located in Highland Avenue in front of the Life Storage Property, was opened. The catch basin was choked with debris. It was unable to be determined if there is a sump on this catch basin as the debris was covering the invert of the pipe. A&M feels this could be the potential origin of the flooding.

October 22 - CCTV Drainage Inspection

On October 22, Steven Lee (A&M) and Zac Caterino, a CCTV technician (BMP) conducted a closed-circuit television (CCTV) inspection of the municipal drainage system within the Highland Avenue right-of-way, as well as on-site drainage. See the attached plans for labels of structures pertaining to the CCTV Report.

Setup #1: MH#1 - MH#2

Setup#1 was conducted at MH#1, located in the Walmart parking lot across the street from the subject property. The pipe between MH#1 and MH#2 is 30" in diameter and it both corrugated metal pipe (CMP) and reinforced concrete pipe (RCP). Setup #1 shows the change in pipe material 6' from MH#1. Upon opening MH#1 between 8-12" of standing water was observed in the manhole. Setup #1 was abandoned 14.2' from MH#1 because a sizable root ball was found in the pipe which obstructed approximately 45% of the 30" CMP/RCP.

Setup #2: MH#2 - MH#1

Due to the obstruction at Setup #1, Setup#2 was performed from the downstream manhole (MH#2) to the upstream manhole (MH#1) in order to inspect the remainder of the pipe. MH#2 consists of one outlet box culvert and three inlet pipes: a 30" RCP from MH#1, an 18" RCP from MH#3, and an 18" RCP. Once opened it was observed that the two 18" inlet pipes as well as the box culvert outlet were at least 50% submerged in standing water. Setup #2 was terminated when the tractor reached the root ball (14.2' from MH#1).

Setup #3: MH#2 - HDW#1

The connection between MH#2 and HDW#1 (Headwall #1) is a 24" H x 30" W box culvert, approximately 120' long, and made of reinforced concrete. This box culvert connects the municipal drainage in Highland Avenue to the drainage channel south of the site via a headwall. The box culvert was heavily littered with trash and natural debris like sticks, rocks and dirt. It was also noted that the water in this culvert was extra opaque which caused the camera to become dirty. Setup #3 was abandoned 21.4' from MH#2 because a sizable obstruction found in the pipe which is blocking approximately 90% of the culvert. It is not clear exactly what material is blocking the culvert but it looked like piled dirt or gravel with some large rocks. A&M believes this to be the largest and most concerning blockage in the drainage system.

Setup #4: MH#3 - MH#2

Setup #4 was conducted at MH#3, which has three inlets: an 18" RCP from a MH north on Highland Avenue and two 12" RCP from CB#1 (catch basin in front of the project site) and another catch basin. The outlet pipe and connection between MH#3 and MH#2 is an 18" RCP. The 18" RCP flowing to MH#2 was 85% submerged in water. As the tractor progressed downstream through the pipe the level of standing water became less and less. Setup #4 was abandoned 5' short of MH#2 due to debris inside the pipe. It should be noted that the water within this pipe and structure had significant floatables.

Setup #5: MH#3 - CB#1

Setup #5 was again conducted at MH#3. The connection between MH#3 and CB#1 is a 12" RCP and was entirely submerged in water (**Figure 7**). Setup #5 was abandoned 5' into the pipe due to debris. Debris in the CB#1 also prevented investigating in the opposite direction (CB#1 to MH#3).

Setup #6: MH#4 - MH#2

Setup #6 was also conducted at MH#4. The connection between MH#4 and MH#2 is an 18" RCP. Upon opening MH#4 it was noted that there was no standing water within the structure. Furthermore, there were no obstructions or problems noted with any of the inlet pipes from abutting catch basins. Water was not encountered within the 18" RCP until 114.9' +/- from MH#4 and slowly increased as the tractor continued further downstream. There were also a number of cracks and infiltration stains noted during the investigation. Setup #6 was abandoned 167.2' into the pipe because of a blockage within the pipe.

Setup #7: CB#2 - CB#3 (at on-site headwall)

Setup #7 was conducted on-site. CB#2 is located next to a retaining wall and steep slope which shows signs of heavy erosion. When the grate was removed from the catch basin it was noted that the under drain for this wall ties into the catch basin. Furthermore, there was also a 6" HDPE pipe tying in (**Figure 8**). The location and direction of the HDPE pipe indicates that it should be a roof drain however there are numerous downspouts on the buildings that discharge flows to the ground to sheet flow to on-site catch basins.

The connection between CB#2 and CB#3 is an 18" HDPE pipe. Upon opening CB#2 it was noted that there was about 6" of standing water within the structure. Furthermore, there was heavy sediment within the structure and the 18" HDPE pipe. A&M believes this sediment comes from the erosion of the headwall and steep slope that abuts the catch basin.

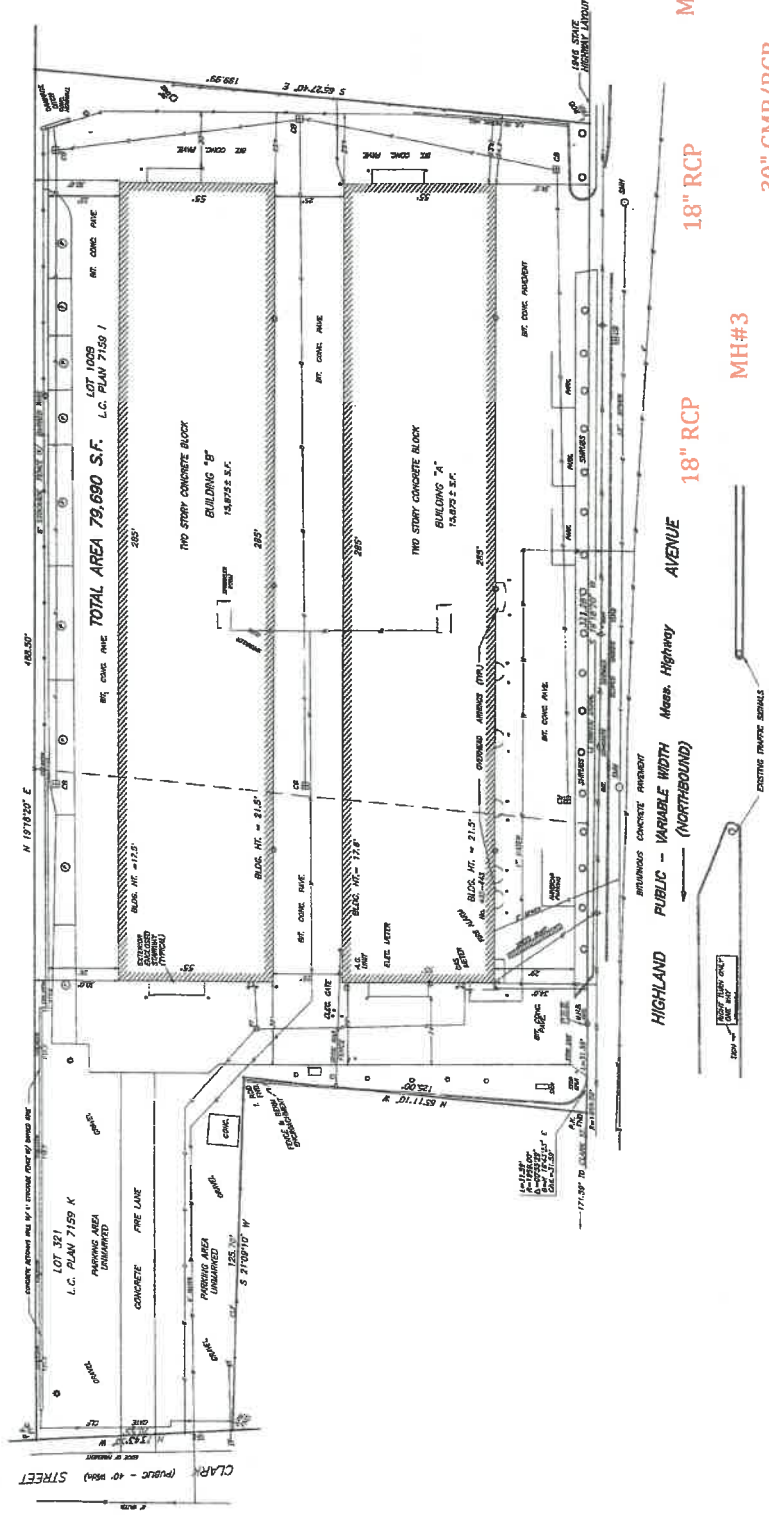

Section I. Chapter 40 – Tourism and Public Marketing, Article II, Division I.
