City of Salem Again Receives National Award for Financial Reporting

The City of Salem has once again been awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) for the City's annual comprehensive financial report.



The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of government accounting and financial reporting. Its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management. This marks the 18th year in a row that the City of Salem has earned this Certificate of Achievement.

"This award is a reflection of the value we have placed on transparency, professionalism, and financial responsibility in government operations," said Mayor Dominick Pangallo. "It is also a credit to the hard work of our Finance Department, led by Finance Director Anna Freedman. We are especially grateful for her steady leadership of the Finance department throughout Salem's mayoral administration transitions that occurred over this past year."

In awarding this recognition, GFOA stated that Salem's annual financial report "has been judged by an impartial panel to meet the high standards of the program, which includes demonstrating a constructive 'spirit of full disclosure' to clearly communicate its financial story and motivate potential users and user groups to read the report."

The GFOA established the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting Program in 1945 to encourage and assist state and local governments to go beyond the minimum requirements of generally accepted accounting principles in preparing annual comprehensive financial reports that evidence the spirit of transparency and full disclosure. The award recognizes individual governments that succeed in achieving that goal. The goal of the program is to ensure that users of their financial statements have the information they need in order to assess the financial health of participating governments. Reports submitted to the program are reviewed by selected members of the GFOA professional staff and the GFOA Special Review Committee, which comprises individuals with expertise in public sector financial reporting and includes financial statement preparers, independent auditors, academics, and other finance professionals.

Grant Awarded to City of Salem and regional partners to Create Clean Energy Pre-Apprenticeship Training Program

A regional partnership made up by the City of Salem, MassHire North Shore, Essex County Community Foundation, UMass Amherst – Gloucester Marine Station, and the Salem Alliance for the Environment has been awarded a grant of nearly \$1.2 million from the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center (MassCEC) to support career training for the future offshore wind industry that is coming to the North Shore. With the grant the partnership will create and manage a pre-apprenticeship program that will provide training opportunities to individuals in local and regional environmental justice communities to learn trades applicable to the clean energy economy and that can lead to an apprenticeship in a union. To prepare for the program, MassHire North Shore will work with Salem High School, Lynn Technical High School, and Essex North Shore Agricultural and Technical School to begin offering the program in early 2024.

Funding will also be used to hire a program manager and an outreach worker to connect potential participants with the program and support services to overcome potential barriers to program attendance, such as transportation, childcare, language access, and documentation related challenges.

The program will run for two years and will provide several training session opportunities. Significant local and regional outreach was conducted by SAFE to bring potential project partners to the table, to provide support for the training program and to ensure that wraparound services will be provided to individuals so that they can access the program.

City of Salem Commencing Historic Preservation Projects in Two Cemeteries

The City of Salem began two new restoration projects in the city's historic cemeteries this August, continuing ongoing efforts to preserve Salem's historic burial sites.

At Broad Street Cemetery, Salem's second oldest burial ground established in 1655, conservation work will be undertaken on centuries-old slate and marble burial markers. For this new phase of conservation in the cemetery, the City has hired Ludlow Memorial Company to reset leaning headstones, consolidate and repair broken



stones and gently clean fragile markers. The project will continue through the fall season with the potential for work to continue into Spring 2024 with work stoppage during the winter season.

The City will also begin the next phase of restoration work on Dickson Memorial Chapel, a 1894 High Victorian Gothic granite and sandstone building at the entrance to Salem's youngest cemetery Greenlawn Cemetery, established in 1807. The City has hired stained glass restoration firm Sash & Solder to restore 14 floral motif stained glass windows at the Chapel (the chapel's rose window was previously restored in 2017). It is expected that restored windows will be reinstalled in late Spring 2024 after wood window frames are repaired and repainted in the building's original Essex Green trim color. Polystyrene Ban Goes into Effect September 4th Effect September 4

Polystyrene (aka Styrofoam), commonly used in food packaging such as takeout containers, is a non-biodegradable substance that cannot be recycled. In recognition of the damaging effects of polystyrene packag-ing on public health and the environment, the City of Salem has passed an ordinance prohibiting the use of foam polystyrene food and packaging containers by food service establishments and retailers.

As of September 4, 2023, restaurants will no longer be allowed to use Styrofoam clam-shell packaging for takeout orders or Styrofoam plates and cups for food service. Grocers may not use Styrofoam trays for packaging meats or produce. Retailers of all sizes may not stock and/ or sell Styrofoam packaging such as plates or cups.
