## Commuter Rail Adding More October Service than Ever to and from Salem for Haunted Happenings



The MBTA and Keolis Commuter Services (Keolis), the

agency's operating partner for Commuter Rail, announced last week that train frequency will increase to two trains an hour to and from Salem during the month of October, which is the most weekend Commuter Rail service ever. This increase in service is to accommodate visitors to Salem during Haunted Happenings. The schedule is available online at <u>MBTA.com/CR.</u>

Last year during Haunted Happenings, weekend ridership on the Newburyport Rockport Line was the highest it has ever been, exceeding more than 400% of the pre-COVID ridership.

For Haunted Happenings, there will be 10 more inbound trains from Salem to North Station, with at least 10 trains after 6:00PM. There will also be 8 additional outbound trains from North Station to Salem, and 7 more outbound trains from Salem to Beverly.

In the temporary Haunted Happenings schedule, passengers will have more flexibility with trains arriving in Salem from North Station about every 40 minutes throughout the day.

This year, in addition to the existing all-day service, the 2023 Fall/Winter schedule also saw the return of late-night service. This has been by far the most requested change among riders on all Commuter Rail lines. Passengers looking to attend evening events in Salem can benefit from late weekday and weekend trains. In the Fall/Winter schedule, the last weekday outbound train to Salem departs North Station at 11:50PM – 50 minutes later than in the current Spring/Summer schedule.

The last weekend outbound train to Salem departs North Station at 11:50PM – 50 minutes later than in the current weekend schedule. The last weekend inbound train to North Station departs Salem at 12:35AM – nearly two hours later than in the current weekend schedule.

Passengers can utilize the <u>\$10 Weekend Commuter Rail Pass</u> for their journey to and from Salem. For Indigenous People's Day (Monday, October 9), we will operate regular Monday weekday service.

Now that the City of Salem has concluded our celebration of National Banned Book Week, we extend an open invitation to the community to share their own books. Contributions can be made by dropping off books directly within our Banned Book Little Library situated directly in front of City Hall.

In a climate where books dealing with themes of gender, sexuality, and racism are often challenged, it's important to note the alarming statistics. According to Pen America, the previous school year witnessed a staggering 1,477 instances of book bans across the United States. Furthermore, across the country, there have been over 147 bills introduced this year aimed at restricting access to books.

"In communities nationwide, books face challenges and bans," said Mayor Dominick Pangallo. "Salem stands firm in our commitment to intellectual freedom and the right to read. The City of Salem Banned Book Little Library is yet another small way we can come together as a community to support that freedom and right. I hope that everyone will consider contributing a book they are no longer reading, or choose a new one to take home."

While all books are welcome at this little library, books that have been banned or challenged are especially welcome and in keeping with the spirit of this project. Unsure if the books in your home library are on the list of banned titles? Numerous online resources provide comprehensive lists of challenged books.



Whether it's classics like Fahrenheit 451 and The Great Gatsby or more contemporary works such as Looking for Alaska and Gender Queer, you can verify the status of your personal collection.

Repair volunteers will be available to mend clothing, sew buttons, sharpen knives, tinker with or rewire electronics and lamps, computer diagnostics, glue wooden furniture and ceramics and more. This Repair Café is scheduled for Saturday, November 4th from 9:00 AM - 12:00 PM at the Community Life Center at 401 Bridge Street in Salem. This Repair Café and Terracycle Collection is a free

event designed to help attendees repair broken items so that they do not end up in the waste stream. In addition to repairing broken items, attendees will also be able to recycle six terracycle brigades of otherwise hard-to-recycle items. Swiffers, razors, dental care items, deoderant containers and caps, Rubbermaid and other brands of plastic or glass containers and lids, and Brita brand dispensers, pitchers and filters are being collected.

"As a certified Green Community, Salem has worked hard to protect our local environment, lessen our contributions to the climate crisis, and reduce the amount of waste we send to landfills," Mayor Dominick Pangallo said, "I am proud of our community's ongoing commitment to addressing the challenges before us and view this is as another important step in that ongoing work. # **Don't Mulch Your Trees to Death!**

### **Tree Mulching Tips from the Salem Tree Commission**



The City of Salem Tree Commission is sharing an easy tree care tip today that can go a long way toward sustaining the health of trees here in Salem.

It is possible to use too much mulch around the base of the tree, which can rot the bark, and strangle the tree. This can happen when the mulch takes on the appearance of a mound at the tree base. Instead, a healthier approach for a tree is to aim for a smaller amount of mulch that shows the tree root flare. This will protect the roots and let the tree breathe, helping ensure a longer, healthier life for the tree.
